9. Yes Nev '67 Piggy 15 Rounds of 60mm Mortars hit the hangar and hangar area - Hit a 55GAL drum - 1 Round came through hangar roof and did not explode (Dud) No damage to aircraft or personnel

JAN 31, 1968 TET! Rocket & Ground Attack "Charlie" infiltrated both east & west end of Bien Hoa Air Base - most activity was on east end. The attack began at approx 3 AM I understood they penetrated to the Run up Pad on the east end of runway and the attack was broken around 8 AM with a body count of 154

Hardly any infiltrators were on the west end (Ranch Hand) After the "All Clear" Siren sounded at approx 3:30 I went to the hangar with the Line Chief and some others. Security police told us to arm ourselves as there were infiltrators in the area. I did not see any "Charlie" nor were we shot at till after daylight. I saw some running toward the River and they were being shot at by personnel closer than I was. Our aircraft sustained some damage from .122 Rockets (^{charged}) but no direct hits after the 3:30 alarm ~~we~~ we were told hit every site or every other site till I rotated 5 was told

A flock of these bats were disturbed by fighters escorting the spray area - They rose up out of the jungle and one was hit by the lead aircraft. cutting thru the radio Ant. in the nose. When the plane landed we reversed the course and I took pictures of it being held stretched out by crew members (I have pictures if you want it it's in slide 36mm)
