THE BRONZE STAR MEDAL

MURKIE D. HUTCHINSON

Senior Master Sergeant Murkie D. Hutchinson distinguished himself by meritorious service as Maintenance Superintendent for the 12th Air Commando Squadron while engaged in ground operations against an opposing armed force at Bien Hoa Air Base, Republic of Vietnam, from 9 July 1967 to 4 July 1968. During this period while exposed to the hazards of hostile rocket, mortar, and ground attacks, Sergeant Hutchinson established an outstanding record of performance while supervising all maintenance. The exemplary leadership, personal courage, and devotion to duty displayed by Sergeant Hutchinson in this responsible position reflect great credit upon himself and the United States Air Force.

7. Took maintenance personnel 6 several places for special missions, but cannot recollect what they were. Also at Ranch Hand - We went several places (mostly unfriendly) to get aircraft back to base. These involved aircraft that generally went down on strips, with maintenance problems and battle damage.

8. Bronze Star - copy attached.

9. Yes, I was there during TET Offensive could write a book on this. Over run by V.C, but being I had my people armed, we held our own.

10. Yes, In Delta One LTC, Major and Engineer was killed. The Major was from South Carolina. I do not remember his name, but he and I had attended A/E School at Chanute AFB back in 1949 together. He was one of my technical advisers along with LTC Kellogg. This happened around May 1968.

? 11. or 12. Yes, We repaired our own battle, replaced fuel tanks and such. Damage - Except in cases where extensive then aircraft was released by me for one time flight to Iran and Tiawan.

13. Mission planning was done by ? operation, but I was briefed everyday on what was happening. The personnel on operations was elite in the fact by keeping me well informed maintenance schedules and flying schedules were easily maintained. Of course our average day was sometimes eighteen to twenty hours a day.

14. Unknown - just assigned Form #7444. Did not know that such an organization existed.

15. Never was informed till after arriving in Ranch-Hand. Then was never informed of any possible after affects. We maintained all the herbicide equipment not only in the aircraft - but even entered the tanks and deslugged them at times. Who could ever forget the smell. Of course, now we find out later that the Agent Orange could be dangerous. Most of my people no doubt had more contract day-day with the agent than anyone.

16. ~~16~~ Christmas Day 1967 - All the troops came from ~~Dan~~ ^{Ang} and we all got together and sang Christmas carols.
