ITEM 7: I volunteer for this special assignment in Aug 1961 while station at Langley AFB, VA. I had the experience required as a Hydraulic Spec. and was willing to go where ever they were sending us. We left for Pope AFB, NC, where we fitted the 'six' C-123's with the armor plates and in flying condition, on thanksgiving day in 1961. Remain one week at Pope and then departed for the Phillipines in C-124's loaded with all our equipment and personnel. Spent X-Mass and New Years at Clark AFB pulling maintenance on our aircrafts and then departed for Vietnam, which at this time we had an idea where we were headed. There were also a crew from Pope AFB handling the cargo hauling. I can recall SSgt YALE, MESSICK, Capt Marshall, Major Robinson, who got his wallet stolen while in Clark AFB. which he got kidded about alot, having no money. A Sgt Hawkins another Hydraulic man from another base, TSgt Rathamel from Pope, our line chief, SSgt Coghill, Eng. killed at Nam after plane crashed.

Item 8: No decoration received for that volunteer action.

Item 9: Two instantance come to mind, once when we went to work at 0500 hours the Vietnam guard that was guarding our planes and work shed, had his throat cut. the other time was when we found all the flight control turnbuckles cut in half and we had to replace all the turnbuckles.

Item 10: On this particular day we had two missions in the air, one was spraying and the other plane had a group of Vietnam soldiers and Americans, when we got the word that one of our airplanes had been shot down. We did not know for a long time, a couple hours at least before the plane carrying all these people landed and then was determine it was SSgt Coghill's plane that was down. We then had to strip the downed aircraft of all useable parts and there we found the pilot and co-pilot had been layed outside the plane but SSGT Coghill had burned in the plane. Also Sgt Bill King's plane landed in the wrong field (North Vietnam field) and when they realized they had landed in the wrong field they tried to take off before they got caught but all they ended doing was to push the nose wheel strut through the cockpit just behind the pilot but through where the steps were to get in the cockpit and bill was barely missed because he was on these steps at that moment. The aircraft was lost and had to be left and the crew made it back with no problem.

Item 14; I volunteer, but had no idea where we were going, except that it was overseas and that we would get \$16.00 a day, which we never got.

Item 15: Nothing at first but in Vietnam we were told it was a chemical used to kill the leaves in the trees so the north Vietnam which were hiding in them.

Item 16: When we were playing cards one night and this airman from Pope got drund and vomit into Sgt Yale's boots and then after this kid went to bed the guys put the heavy table and chairs on top of him while he was sleeping. The sadest was when we heard SSgt Coghill's death.

17. after we found the dead guard, we had to pull our own guard duty. The first night there was myself and this black sergeant (I forget his name) pulling guard duty and of course at time you could hear the shells from a distance, well anyway every little noise he heard, he was forever jumping up and pointing the rifle at me and was extremely nervous. I finally took the rifle away from

him and told him to go to sleep before he kills me. I stood guard duty the rest of the night.

18. I answered # 16, the first part should be in this sentence. So I will say the happiest memories of Nam was when we would all get together after work and talk of home and our families.

19. Our quarters were eight man tents, with the first week pretty bad due to not enough water for baths or washing. Almost everyone got the G's. Our day was getting up early and getting to work about 0500 - 0530 AM. get our places set up for the spraying job and waiting their returns to do any repairs and refueling. We all worked as a team even though each one of us was a specialist in our fields we all help in refueling the A/C or an electrician or anybody else. After the missions were over and everything was completed we would return to the tents. We had play cards, drink and talked about Nam and our families.

20. My own views are that we were unique because we were about the first military group there in Nam. We were all volunteers and wanted to do something for our country and I think we helped in that war and I think all Ranch Hand personnel should have been/should be recognized for their willingness and their abilities to help in that war. The original Ranch Hands broke the way for the rest of the people that followed but we were the first M & T, L & L, M & L, L & L. I do have pictures and old slides. Ranch Hand 61
