
SUBJECT: Letter of Commendation

1. Sergeant Wolf's performance as assistant crew chief on UC-123K aircraft serial number 54-693 during the TDY period of 31 August 1969 thru 9 September 1969 was outstanding. His knowledge of the aircraft was excellent and his willingness to accomplish the job demands recognition.

2. While deployed TDY to a forward operating location requiring him to function with minimum maintenance support, Sergeant Wolf daily delivered his aircraft in an operational readiness status.
