RECORDS

The expression of political views through song has a long tradition in the United States. It was particularly evident during the 1960s, when several social movements (each giving birth to its own cultural expressions) occurred simultaneously. Often popular songs reflected these multiple concerns with lyrics that addressed war, drugs, civil rights, and revolution all at once. Our list is limited to songs that are explicitly about Vietnam and will lend themselves to provocative classroom discussion.

For the words and music of hundreds of anti-war songs, there are two valuable sources. Barbara Dane and Irwin Silber's **The Vietnam Songbook** (New York: Monthly Review Press, 1969) contains over 100 songs from a dozen countries. Over the past 30 years, **Sing Out!** magazine has been the major outlet for the publication of topical and traditional folk songs; an index is available for the years 1952-1979. (Write to: Box 1071, Easton PA 18042.)

The two most prolific anti-war songwriters were Phil Ochs and Tom Paxton; each of their albums of the period contains several anti-war songs:

Music was less a force in the pro-war cause; but one song, **"The Ballad of the Green Beret"** (RCA Gold Standard Series 447-787), composed and sung by Sgt. Barry Sadler, was a hit record in 1966.


