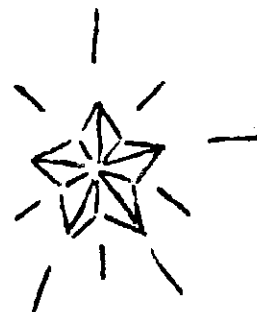

# LEGIONNAIRES CLAIM 50

LZ ROSS — "Legionnaires" of the 2nd Battalion, 1st Division during the past forty days saw action which yielded 50 enemy KIA's, five NVA/VC captured, 139 detained and the capture of 63 mortar rounds, three rockets and two crew-served weapons.

Operation Golden Fleece, concluded 17 November, took more than two million pounds of rice from starving enemy forces and was termed the most ambitious and successful rice denial program in the history of I Corps.

## ALPHA COMPANY

Alpha company accounted for 16 KIA's, 120 detainees and three rockets captured.

The company spent the first weeks of November on road security in joint operations with the Moc Bai group, a PF platoon securing the new Phu Tho village relocation. Rifle squads daily accompanied the PF's to insure communications and artillery support.

Medic Sp4 Donald Williams was recommended for the Silver Star for his efforts in caring for the wounded under fire when the company's night lodger was hit on 18 November by heavy small arms fire and grenades.

On 30 November, the Moc Bai PF's and Sgt. James Carter's squad were patrolling along the old national railroad when they were engaged by some 20 VC. The US/PF force killed nine and captured three. Kit Carson scout Kong Bai was fatally wounded in the action and was recommended by Carter for the Silver Star. Men of Alpha company later contributed toward the purchase of his grave monument.

On a patrol on 3 December, a squad under Sp4 Dale Breach killed five VC and took one Chu Hoi from a cave complex. Documents showed the dead to be a VC village chief and two hamlet chiefs and a VC cadre.

Second platoon, led by SFC Charles Broadhead, on 9 December was CAed into the valley between Dragon base and the river, killing one VC and taking 116 detainees.

## BRAVO COMPANY

Bravo killed four NVA/VC, took five detainees and captured 63 mortar rounds.

Two men were recommended for the Bronze Star with V device. Sp4 Marvin Owens and Orgelio Rendon, on a search and destroy mission on 6 December, with their element pinned down by enemy fire, charged the position killing two VC.

The day before, a patrol discovered an enemy mortar position with 63 stockpiled rounds. They also destroyed ten bunkers northeast of LZ Ross.

Sgt. Robert McCoy's squad bagged another VC on 19 November during a sweep through sugar cane fields north of Ross. Earlier, a squad led by Sgt. Garland Noodhan killed one VC in an ambush in Happy Valley.

A tripped flare outside the Ross perimeter on the night of 11 December generated a "mad minute" which lasted a full half-hour. When the flare ignited in front of bunker 25, two VC with weapons were seen within 50 meters of the wire. Bravo opened up. One VC went down in the fusillade, but a patrol at dawn revealed nothing.

## CHARLIE COMPANY

In action since 7 November, Charlie company produced five enemy KIA's, three prisoners and one weapon captured. Six men were recommended for Bronze Stars. OPCONed to the 1st Bn., 1st Cavalry from 7 to 17 November, Charlie "Legionnaires" participated in a mechanized sweep of Cigar Island to the South China Sea.

On 13 November, under heavy enemy fire, Sgt. George Torresi was wounded in an attempt to take an enemy position. Sp4 Donald Alexander grabbed his wounded buddy and began dragging him back across the open rice paddy when he too was wounded. Alexander had to be given an order and pulled loose from his burden before he himself could be carried from the field, according to third platoon sergeant SSgt. Roger Littoral. Both were recommended for the Bronze Star with V device.

Also named for Bronze Stars with V were Sgt. Ernest Eastorday, Sp4 Clyde "Doc" Sovy and PFC Olin Noal.

On a patrol north of Ross the day before Thanksgiving, one VC was killed and three captured. Questioning revealed the action had aborted a planned VC probe of Fire Support Base Dragon.

On 29 November, Charlie company was CAed atop LZ Rydor to secure and rebuild the old fire support base for pending operations.

Delta company accounted for four enemy kills and six captured, including an NVI doctor and squad leader, and two crew-served and four individual weapons.

On 18 November, during an operation in the Gia Cat 3 area, LT David "Lofty" Parker's third platoon killed two VC and captured three and discovered a VC district cadre depot and weapons including one light and one heavy machinegun and an AK47.

In concurrent action, Sp4 Walter Cline's ambushing machinegun team killed 3 VC when they crossed an open rice paddy. Documents on the bodies indicated they were important members of the local VC infrastructure.

Conducting a recon in force at the base of fire support base Dragon on 23 November, an element killed one VC and captured another. While Delta was OPCON to the 4th Bn., 31st Infantry from 28 November to 12 December for the Nui Chan mountain operation, LT David Parker and PSgt Julius Williams captured an NVI squad leader. Sgt. Bruce Nelson's squad discovered an abandoned observation post with a 50 caliber machinegun.

On the same operation, while conducting reconnaissance in force in the vicinity of old fire support base Sooner, LT Aubrey Sholton's platoon captured a military age Vietnamese male who questioning revealed to be an NVI doctor with seven years education in Hanoi.

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## R.S.V.P., GI

The invitation was "come as you are" and the men of Bravo company accepted, but they were unable to thank their hostess. She was remaining incognito.

The "invitation" actually came a little late. During a patrol on 12 December, F Troop discovered a document notifying district VC cadre of a meeting to be held the following night "at Mrs. Trinh's house." The message considerably listed date, time and location of the lady's residence, some ten kilometers northwest of LZ Ross. The Second of the First decided to add its own surprise to the proceedings.

At dusk the following evening and one-half hour before the appointed hour to avoid the complications of total darkness, Bravo "Legionnaires," ready for a party, cordoned the hill below Mrs. Trinh's and swept up to the dooryard.

Alas, they were too early. The other guests had not yet arrived, and only five Vietnamese ladies met them.

With the aid of daylight the next morning, searchers found in a nearby cave such "party favors" as new black PJ's, deeds to land, pictures of Ho Chi Minh and a red and blue flag with yellow star.

None of the five women would admit to being the most hospitable Mrs. Trinh.

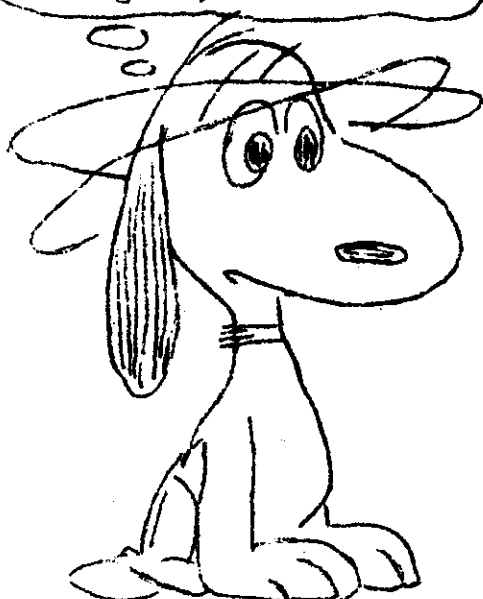

## GETS NEW C.O.

In ceremonies on 20 November, LTC Sinclair L. Melner accepted command of the 1st Battalion, 1st Infantry from outgoing commander LTC Robert "Buck" Nelson.

A nineteen-year veteran of the Army, Col. Melner was brigade executive officer for three months before assuming command of the 1st, 196th Infantry Brigade. He is serving his first tour in Viet Nam.

Col. Melner's latest assignment before coming to Viet Nam was as a student at the National War College at Fort McNair, Washington, D.C. He also took advantage of his tour in the nation's capital to earn his degree in International Affairs at George Washington University.

Prior to his War College studies, Col. Melner spent three years with US NATO forces in Germany. He served fifteen months with the 3rd Army G-3 as Chief of Manoeuvres in Heidelberg. He then became battalion commander of the 1st Battalion, 30th Mechanized Infantry Brigade in Scheinfurst. He was there 21 months.

Born and raised in Reno, Nevada, the colonel and his wife, Roma, still maintain their home there. They have three children, Cathy, 16, a freshman education major at the University of Nevada, Mike, 16, a junior in high school, and Joan, 6.

Colonel Melner is an enthusiastic golfer and handball player.

Several special Christmas events are planned for men of the Second of the First, both in the field and on LZ Ross.

Catholic and Protestant chaplains will be making special efforts to visit every fire support base and company in the field during the week before Christmas. An always-welcome treat, three-day stand downs at the Charger Hilton in Chu Lai, will begin shortly before Christmas and extend into the New Year.

On Ross, Protestant worshipers will observe midnight services Christmas Eve in the new battalion chapel. Catholics will celebrate Christmas Day Mass Christmas morning.

The church is a protestant congregation associated with the Christian and Missionary Alliance.

Christmas afternoon, the Vietnamese will return the visit bringing a choir of 50 to 75 children to carol GI's outside the base chapel. "Santa Claus" is expected to make an appearance for the youngsters' benefit.

## I WISH I'D SAID THAT

### "WHAT IT TAKES TO BE NUMBER ONE"

"Winning is not a sometime thing; it's an all-the-time thing. You don't win once in a while, you don't do things right once in a while, you do them right all the time. Winning is a habit. Unfortunately, so is losing."

"Every time a football player goes out to ply his trade he's got to play from the ground up — from the soles of his feet right up to his head. Some guys play with their heads. That's OK. You've got to be smart to be No. 1 in any business. But more important, you've got to play with your heart. If you're lucky enough to find a guy with a lot of head and heart, he's never going to come off the field second."

"It's a reality of life that men are competitive and the most competitive games draw the most competitive men. They know the rules and the objectives when they get in the game. The objective is to win — fairly, squarely, by the rules — but to win."

"And in truth, I've never known a man worth his salt who in the long run, deep down in his heart, didn't appreciate the grind, the discipline. There is something in good men that really yearns for, needs, discipline and the harsh reality of a challenge."

"I don't say these things because I believe in the 'brute' nature of men or that men must be brutalized to be combative. I believe in God, and I believe in human decency. But I firmly believe that any man's finest hour — his greatest fulfillment to all that he holds dear — is that moment when he has worked his heart out in a good cause and lies exhausted in the field of battle — victorious."
