

The Rocky Versace Plaza and Vietnam Veterans' Memorial



The Rocky Versace Plaza and Vietnam Veterans' Memorial will be built at the entrance to the Mount Vernon Recreation Center at the intersection of Mount Vernon and Commonwealth Avenues. Present plans are to wrap up fundraising by early summer 2001, complete construction of the memorial by the end of October and to dedicate the Memorial on Veteran's Day, November 11th, of this year.

Background on Rocky Versace

Humbert Roque "Rocky" Versace was born in Hawaii on July 2nd, 1937. As the son of a West Point graduate (WP '33) and a career Army officer, Rocky and his family moved frequently, but since spending five years on Forest Street, Rocky always considered Alexandria his home. The Versace family was very active in Saint Rita's Catholic Church where Rocky was an Altar Boy.

After graduating from the U.S. Military Academy at West Point in 1959, Rocky served in Korea, and later as an officer with the Old Guard at Arlington National Cemetery. By 1962, Rocky was serving as a military advisor in South Vietnam, where he was well known for his off-duty humanitarian efforts, especially projects benefiting the Vietnamese children. During the summer of 1963, serving his second tour in Vietnam, Rocky had decided to leave the Army to prepare for the priesthood as a member of the Maryknoll Order. His plans were to become a Missionary and return to Vietnam to work with the children of that war-torn country.

On October 29, 1963, just weeks short of his return, Rocky was captured with two other Americans during a fierce firefight. For the next 23 months, Rocky Versace was confined to a bamboo cage about the size of a coffin. Despite regular torture and the deplorable conditions he experienced, Rocky refused to cooperate with the enemy and lived strictly by the Military POW Code of Conduct. Ignoring three bullet wounds to his left leg, he attempted escape three times. For his refusal to cooperate or make statements against the United States, Rocky was executed in September of 1965. In 1970, Major Nick Rowe, one of Rocky's fellow captives who has recently escaped, recommended an award for valor for Versace. The Army presented the Silver Star. In 2000, the Army Special Forces Command, in a complete review of Capt. Versace's heroism, resubmitted his award recommendation.

In January of this year, Secretary of the Army Luis Caldera approved the Medal of Honor for Rocky Versace. The Versace family will receive the posthumous award of the Medal of Honor sometime this spring or early summer.

Remembering Alexandrians Who Did Not Return


