Since the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington, D.C. opened in 1982, it has provided millions of visitors with a symbolic focal point. The memorial honors all veterans. The Vietnam Veterans Memorial represents the work of many thousands of people, but one person in particular deserves a special word of thanks. 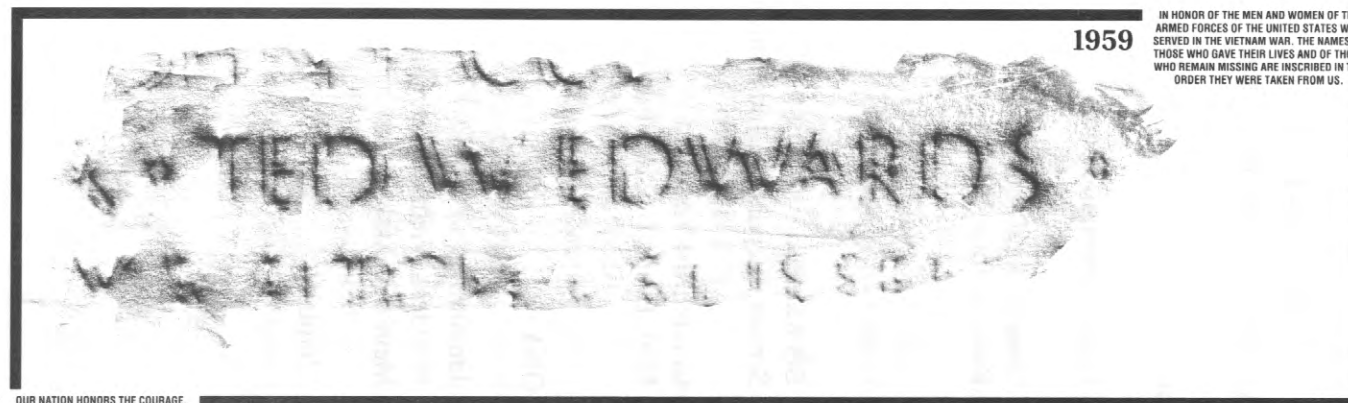
