Biography

Admiral "Bud" Zumwalt was born and raised in Tulare, California, the son of two doctors. He originally planned to attend the U.S. Military Academy, but a family friend's stories of adventures at sea persuaded him that he belonged at the U.S. Naval Academy. He never lacked for adventures at sea -- or elsewhere.

Graduating *cum laude* from the Naval Academy in 1942 (a year ahead of schedule due to the war), he participated in all of the Pacific theater campaigns beginning with Guadalcanal. He was decorated for courage and professionalism in the Battle of the Surigao Straits.

At the end of the war, Lieutenant Zumwalt was given command of a Japanese gunboat. He sailed up the Yangtze River to lead the occupation of Shanghai. It was in Shanghai that Miss Mouza Coutelais-du-Roché, a "white Russian" who had escaped with her family to China from the revolution in Russia, met Lieutenant Zumwalt on Oct. 1, 1945. Ever a man of action, he proposed on Oct. 7, and they were married two weeks later. That whirlwind romance was the foundation of a beautiful fifty-four year marriage.

Numerous challenging assignments at sea and ashore followed. In 1968 Admiral Zumwalt assumed command of all Navy forces in Vietnam, and developed significantly more aggressive and successful naval tactics and strategy. He was then appointed by President Nixon to become, at age 49, the youngest Chief of Naval Operations in history. His service as CNO took the Navy through extraordinarily challenging times, and marked dramatic advances in providing equal opportunities for all Navy personnel to serve their country.

Following his retirement from the Navy in 1974, he forged another distinguished career of public service. He was a founder of the Marrow Foundation, and a director of the National Marrow Donor Program. Active in the study of the effects of Agent Orange, he was also a director of the Vietnam Assistance to the Handicapped Foundation. His active involvement has been crucial to the success of the Vietnam Center at Texas Tech University in helping future generations learn from our past. In 1998, President Clinton awarded him the Medal of Freedom, our nation's highest civilian honor.

Admiral Zumwalt is survived by his wife, Mouza; his three children, James Zumwalt, Ann Zumwalt Coppola, and Mouzetta Zumwalt-Weathers; his brother, James Zumwalt; his sister, Saralee Crowe; and six grandchildren.

Colonel Mike Spiro, II, USMC (Ret.), served on Admiral Zumwalt's staff in Vietnam and was his aide when he was Chief of Naval Operations. Colonel Spiro has graciously continued his faithful service to the Zumwalt family by accompanying Admiral Zumwalt's body throughout the journey from North Carolina to the U.S. Naval Academy.

Seated near the family are four midshipmen, four chief petty officers, and four enlisted personnel. Together they represent the heart, soul, and future of the greatest navy in the world.

The family wishes to express particular appreciation to Admiral Zumwalt's classmates from the Class of 1943, and gratefully salutes their generation for the heroism they routinely displayed and the incomparable sacrifices they made for the sake of our country.
