
Reference our October 17, 1991 letter, forwarding Army records to you in response to your Freedom of Information Act request concerning Project 5310-06-E.

Reference our October 17, 1991 letter, forwarding Army records to you in response to your Freedom of Information Act request for records concerning Project 5310-06-E.

As noted in our letter, excerpts of information contained in the Army records (encl 1), which originated with other government agencies was deleted. As also noted, the release of the excerpts and other information (encl 2) was being coordinated with the agencies concerned and we would inform you of their decision.

Coordination has been completed with one of the agencies, the Defense Intelligence Agency (DIA), and we have been informed by them that their information (bracketed in red in the records) is releasable except for the portions highlighted in black which are exempt from the public disclosure provisions of the Freedom of Information Act as provided under Title 5 U.S. Code 552 (b)(1), (b)(2), and (b)(6) and Sections 1.3(a)(1), (a)(4), (a)(5), and (a)(9) of Executive Order 12356.

The withholding of the information by the DIA constitutes a partial denial of your request and you have the right to appeal this decision directly to the DIA. If you decide to file an appeal, it should be forwarded to the Director, Defense Intelligence Agency, ATTN: CAO (FOIA), Washington, DC 20301.

Portions of the records, at enclosure 1, which are not bracketed in red were addressed in our letter of October 17, 1991.

In addition, we have completed a mandatory declassification review of the Army-originated records at encl 2, in accordance with Executive Order (EO) 12356. As a result of this review, it has been determined that these records are partially releasable to you.

Information has been sanitized from these records which is currently and properly classified CONFIDENTIAL according to Sections 1.1(a)(3) and 1.3(a)(4) of Executive Order 12356. This information is exempt from the public disclosure provisions of the Freedom of Information Act pursuant to Title 5 U.S. Code 552 (b)(1).

Section 1.1(a)(3) of Executive Order 12356 provided that information shall be classified CONFIDENTIAL if its unauthorized disclosure reasonably could be expected to cause damage to the national security.

Section 1.3(a)(4) of Executive Order 12356 provides that information concerning intelligence activities, sources, or methods shall be considered for classification protection.

Information has also been deleted from these records which is administrative in nature, to include internal report numbers, reference numbers, and access numbers, which are for internal agency use only. The release of this information would significantly risk circumvention of agency regulations, and is exempt from the public disclosure under Title 5 U.S. Code 552 (b)(2) of the Freedom of Information Act.

The withholding of the Army-originated information highlighted in black constitutes a partial denial of your request. This denial is made on behalf of the Commanding General, U.S. Army Intelligence and Security Command, who is the Initial Denial Authority for Army intelligence investigative and security records under the Freedom of Information Act. You have the right to appeal this decision to the Secretary of the Army. If you wish to file an appeal, you should forward it to this office for necessary processing so that it reaches the appellate authority no later than 60 calendar days from the date of this letter. Your appeal will then be processed to the appellate authority. After the 60-day period, the case may be considered closed; however, such closure does not preclude you from filing litigation in the courts.

Dear Mr. Tourison:

This responds to your letters of 8 December and 27 December 1991, appealing DIA's decision, under exemptions to the Freedom of Information Act, to withhold certain DIA-originated information contained in Army documents which are responsive to your requests for information about Project 5310-02-E and Project 5310-06-E. In response to your initial request, DIA notes that the Army Intelligence and Security Command released various Army records concerning the specified projects.

In considering your appeal, appropriate DIA classification authorities have again reviewed the responsive documents. That review determined that certain additional DIA information concerning the specified projects may be released. Copies of those 12 partially redacted records are enclosed. With this release, all reasonably segregable portions of the documents have now been provided to you.

The legal basis for continuing to withhold other DIA-originated parts of these documents are the exemptions provided in 5 U.S.C. 552(b)(1) and (b)(2), Freedom of Information Act. Subsection (b)(1) applies to information properly classified under the criteria specified in Executive Order 12356. Subsection (b)(2) exempts information which relates solely to DIA's internal rules and practices concerning sensitive communications and organizational relationships.

Accordingly, your appeal is granted in part and denied in part. You are further advised of your right to seek judicial review of this matter before a United States District Court.

1. Withholding date time group from relevant message.

Dossier ZF011307 for Project 5310-06-E has withheld from declassification the date time group from certain electrical messages. The authority cited in the October 17, 1991 USATNSCOM FOIA/Private Office decision to not release this information is given as Title 5 U.S. Code 552 (b) (2) of the FOIA in that the information is exempt from disclosure because it is administrative in nature, is for internal agency use only and that the release of this information would adversely circumvent agency regulations.

I appeal this decision for the following reasons:

Message date time groups are a routine part of all U.S. government electrical communications and are the signal communications equivalent of the basic date appearing on all dated material of an official and private nature. Date time groups are unclassified by themselves and reference to them is necessary to all legitimate historical research which seeks to trace actions from one point in time to the next.

USATNSCOM's action to withhold these date times groups is inconsistent with the practices of U.S. government agencies engaged in declassification. For example, the U.S. National Archives does not routinely excise date time groups from Viet Nam war era material released as declassified and the U.S. Government's standard quarterly list of declassified material, the U.S. Department of State's periodic declassifications in the Foreign Relation series, and other U.S. government publications quoting specific source documents always focus on the information and do not routinely withhold date time groups. While date time groups might be viewed by some as administrative material with might be withheld within the parameters that certain administration administrative material can be legitimately withheld, there is an equally compelling need within the spirit and intent of the FOIA for researchers to be able to reasonably locate, retrieve and document U.S. government actions.

In short, if dates per se are eligible to be withheld as a blanket rule, bonafide researchers would be left with a mass of information which is undated and functionally useless. Adding the time to the date does not make the information any more withholdable. In fact, as shown in various U.S. military history writings by the Naval Historical Center, the U.S. Army Center for Military History and other agencies, the date time groups are routinely made available to a verifiable chain of decisions and information transmittal. Clearly, no element of the U.S. government, not even USATNSCOM, has ever routinely removed either dates or date time groups from material eligible for declassification. In fact, such material is routinely released unless there are compelling reasons justifiable on the grounds of national security, a matter USATNSCOM has not raised in this refusal.

USATNSCOM's decision not to release certain date time groups may have come from a conclusion that there is something in the date time groups withheld which would have indirectly led to further discovery and compromise of information which it did not want to have released. If this was the intent, it is not supported by the rationale employed and for several compelling reasons: first, there is nothing in the date time groups themselves which is classified. In several cases, the substance of messages was generally declassified but the date time group was withheld.

Second, the requirement for having a date time group is not a USAINSCOM peculiar administrative item but is the result of a decades old Army communications system practice and regulation. USATNSCOM might have refused to release such information because of a blanket policy, something which does not exist, or could have referred the request to another agency and in line with FOIA practices currently in place within the USATNSCOM FOIA/Privacy Office when there is a question about information originated or controlled by another agency, something USATNSCOM did not do.

Examining the substance of the documents from which date time groups was removed, some date time groups were withheld from release while classified information in the message was properly reviewed and either totally or partially declassified. Thus, the withholding of the date time groups appears to represent a fundamental contradiction in methodology and an action totally contrary to the spirit and intent of the FOIA, to take that which is classified and reasonably declassify it while in effect taking something which is unclassified and conveying on it a level of protection which is normally only authorized for the protection of classified material.

In other cases, the date time groups withheld could be argued as relate to information referred to another agency for consideration for release. This does not appear to be the case in these date time groups. But, if that is USATNSCOM's position, it errs excessively on the side of unnecessary restriction by again applying an unreasonable new protection to something which, if released, will not lead to inadvertent compromise since it is the information in the document of interest which is classified, not the date time group. Failure to release message date time groups could the result of unreasonably restricting access to information which is eligible for declassification consideration under the FOIA by preventing authorized requestors from complying with the need to ensure that requests can be answered within a reasonable time (Executive Order 12356, Sec 3.4. (a) (2)).

Therefore, I contend that the release of this information would not adversely circumvent agency regulations, is not administrative in nature and reference (b) (2) does not apply.

I appeal the decision to not release for declassification the date time groups of the following messages:

-Page 007, basic message and message refs A and B.

- Page 024, basic message.
- Page 074, Message in Para. 1, line 3.
- Page 068, basic message.
- Page 070, basic message and message ref A.
- Page 074, basic message and item in Para. 1, line 1.

2. Withholding previously declassified information.

Dossier ZF011307 for Project 5310-06-E has withheld from declassification an item previously declassified by USATNSCOM. The authority cited in the October 17, 1991 USATNSCOM FOIA/Privacy Office decision to not release this information is given as Title 5 U.S. Code 552 (b) (2) of the FOIA in that the information is exempt from disclosure because it is administrative in nature, are for internal agency use only and that the release of this information would adversely circumvent agency regulations.

The specific item of interest is on Page 002 of the project dossier which documents the submission of specific change requests for this project and an allied project, 5310-03-E, withholding the information "5310-03-E" from release under the authority cited.

The dossier for Project 5310-03-E was previously partially declassified by USATNSCOM in August 1991 under FOIA Case 1159F-91. This same document appears in Case 1159F-91 but with the project number 5310-06-E removed.

This requestor fully recognizes the need for each FOIA request to be considered on its own merit and does not argue that USATNSCOM should have been aware that 5310-03-E was already partially declassified as of October 1991 when this case was partially declassified. However, the specific item appealed was in fact declassified and released in August 1991 in an allied case. Thus, USATNSCOM's position appears to be that information previously declassified can be automatically reclassified on procedural, not substantive grounds. This appears to be fundamentally contrary to the spirit and intent of EO 12356.

3. Withholding of certain non-substantive information.

Dossier ZF011307 for Project 5310-06-E has withheld from declassification certain information, the substance of which can be readily discerned from one or more of the following: (a) the document either totally or partially declassified, (b) information previously declassified (see Enclosure 1, attached), (c) information which does not appear to be classified, and (d) information which, if declassified, might harm the national security interests of the United States. In all cases, the material withheld appears to have been withheld in an unreasonably narrow interpretation of declassification guidelines and on procedural, not substantive grounds, which appears contrary to the spirit and intent of EO 12356. The authority cited in the October 17, 1991 USATNSCOM FOIA/Private Office decision to not release this information is given as Title 5 U.S. Code 552 (b) (1) but it is unclear which particular aspect of (b) (1) is being applied in this case.

I appeal this decision for the following reasons and with regard to the items specified:

Project 5310-06-E was a human intelligence (HUMINT) project which never reached its full fruition due to a variety of factors. Some are described in the partially declassified project file while others are either a matter of public record or were previously declassified by USATNSCOM; all played a role in the inability of the 500th MI Group to get this project fully "off the ground" within the bounds of what the project concept designers had hoped, although not all facts are well documented in the partially declassified project file.

Information about Project 5310-06-E contained in previously declassified intelligence information reports (See Enclosure 1, attached) provides a somewhat different picture of this project's operations compared to that shown in the recently declassified project dossier.

For example, previously declassified intelligence information reports (See Enclosure 1, attached) from Colonel Burnell, the U.S. Defense Attache, Phnom Penh, during 1974, clearly describe the interrogation of prisoners and ralliers in Phnom Penh as taking place at an SRF interrogation facility in an operation designated Project 5310-06 and further described as a joint project of the USDAO Phnom Penh and Detachment K, 500th MI Group. As shown in these previously declassified ITRs, Project 5310-06-E did not report its intelligence information using the separate activity designator 918 and joint prefix 6 used by the USDAO, Phnom Penh, but employed instead, activity designator 816 and with the joint services prefix 6.

The issuance of activity designators used in intelligence information reports is controlled by and issued only under the authority of DTAM 58-11. While the Defense Intelligence Agency and its role is not particularly mentioned in the declassified

project documents, it is clear that this project was a full blown project in 1974 and involved recurring visits by Detachment K personnel based in Saigon with the full and complete authorization of the Defense Intelligence Agency as a joint service operation with the USDAO, Phnom Penh. Missing from the partially declassified project file are the normal semi-annual project evaluations routinely prepared by Detachment K, coordination for project operations at the SRF Phnom Penh interrogation facility and other necessary coordination documents. But, the file contains reference to a message that certain project documents were ordered destroyed in the spring of 1975 and this could account for certain missing documents.

However, the information in the material partially declassified shows only that this project was an effort which attempted as early as 1973 to establish a joint intelligence debriefing center operation in Phnom Penh, Cambodia and in conjunction with the Cambodian Army (FANK) G-2 while previously declassified IIRs document that during 1974 the project was conducting its operations at an SRF interrogation facility in Phnom Penh.

The documents in the partially declassified project file establish the fact that the proposed joint project with the FANK G-2 encountered a nearly two year series of delays which and by the eventual refusal in 1975 by SRF Bangkok and SRF Phnom Penh to concur with the proposed arrangements. That ended the OVOP concept irrevocably. Thus, the partially declassified project file raises the issue that the project's possible lack of success may have stemmed more from political infighting over SRF's efforts to keep this project operating only within a facility which it, SRF, controlled. Such an arrangement would not have been unique to Cambodia but was a repeat of a similar arrangement in South Viet Nam and elsewhere in Southeast Asia.

Project 5310-06-E was a logical extension of U.S. intelligence information collection operations targeted against hostile forces operating inside Cambodia and in response to validated national, theater and local intelligence information needs. Prior to the Paris Peace Accords of January 28, 1973 and based on documents previously declassified by the Department of Defense on December 15, 1978, there existed a pattern of routine joint interrogation operations by U.S. Army and U.S. Army teams from the Combined Military Interrogation Center (CMIC), Saigon, which routinely traveled from South Viet Nam to Phnom Penh, Cambodia, to interrogate prisoners and ralliers in the custody of the FANK G-2.

After the signing of the Paris Peace Accords, U.S. intelligence operations targeted against the threat posed by North Vietnamese and Khmer Rouge forces inside Cambodia were conducted under the authority of the Pacific Command's theater approved Human Resources Collection Directive (HRCDD) 00290 (FAST PASS). As described in the partially declassified dossier and further documented in intelligence information reports previously declassified on December 15, 1978 (See Enclosure 1, attached),

members of this conceptual project did travel on temporary duty to Cambodia during 1973. However, those visits during 1974 involved interrogation at an SRF facility while Detachment K was attempting to have the FANK G-2 develop its own resources, an action not inconsistent with approved Congressional funding for Cambodia but with certain limitations on U.S. advisors.

Prior to the start of the Project 5310-06-E OVOP concept for the FANK G-2 Interrogation Center, this requestor was in Phnom Penh in February 1973 and then again perhaps two more occasions in 1973 and/or 1974 to participated briefly in such short term interrogation of North Vietnamese Army POWs at a rudimentary FANK G-2 facility which was not the facility at which CAMEX was required to operate during 1974. This was part of the national, theater and local U.S. mission recognized need to be aware of the nature and extent of hostile forces in Cambodia and the threat they posed to Viet Nam, Laos, Cambodia and Thailand. The events of the late spring of 1975 demonstrate that those concerns were valid.

The declassified project material describes the fact that U.S. Army Lt. Rizzo, was one of the three principals involved in this project and there was never any questions as to his role as Chief of the Cambodian Exploitation Team because of his fluency in the Khmer language. Previously declassified documents identify CWO Timothy A. Nelson as another team member.

While the partially declassified project file might lead one to believe that the OVOP 5310-06-E was never implemented, in point of fact, the project was in full swing in 1974, project documents which could document this are missing and may have been deliberately destroyed or withheld, and the only aspect of the OVOP which never came to full fruition but was a "concept in progress" was an effort which was aimed at establishing a broader relationship with the FANK G-2 and in line with both U.S. Army doctrine and HRCO 00290 but possibly inconsistent with 1971 Congressional limitations of the Church Amendment to the Defense Supplemental Authorization Bill.

The project file has withheld various documents referred to other agencies for release. The project file has also withheld certain information pertaining to the FANK G-2 interrogation center which was in the planning stage but never approved or implemented and was then overtaken by events, an unclassified position title of LTC Kramer as the ICF Advisor and any reference to intelligence contingency funds, any reference to the use of intelligence contingency funds (ICF) which were discussed for a concept never implemented, and certain funding mechanisms, fund projects and related costs for an OVOP which was never put into effect. Other material withheld pertains to how the theater command and 500th Group envisioned this project would operate and develop this project which was never in fact implemented.

In short, the USAINSCOM decision to withhold from declassification under the authority cited pertains to some items of information which were not classified at the time, some information known to the FANK G-2 and his staff, all of whom were

captured and executed by the Khmer Rouge in April 1975 and may have been the substance of their own documents which were also captured and compromised in toto, pertains to events which never went further than the planning stage and are now merely of historical interest, and may represent a procedural denial if information which the history of the project and events in Cambodia do not fully justify.

Therefore, it is with the above rationale that I appeal the decision not to release the following material withheld on the pages indicated:

4. Withholding of certain associated project numbers.

Dossier ZF011307 for Project 5310-06-E has withheld from declassification certain information pertaining to follow on U.S. Army intelligence projects after the termination of Project 5310-06-E. There is compelling reason to believe were either (a) while not identified in previously declassified documents, they were in fact terminated shortly after their inception and were never fully operational, and/or (b) have already been declassified, in the public domain and not reclassified (See Enclosure 2, attached.)

The authority cited in the October 17, 1991 USAINSCOM FOIA/Private Office decision to not release this information for one item, the project number of Project 0710-08, is given as Title 5 U.S. Code 552 (b) (1) but it is unclear which particular aspect of (b) (1) is being applied in this case while the authority of (b) (2) is given in the case of two CIOP project numbers.

The specific information appealed for release describes two categories of projects: a bilateral project with the Royal Thai Army Armed Forces Intelligence Operations Center (AFIOC) known as Project 0710-08 (0710-08-K) previously identified in Department of Defense declassified documents and two U.S. Army Intelligence Agency (USAINTA) CIOPs which were in their infancy in 1975. While the existence of the two CIOP projects may not have been previously declassified, historical events in Cambodia and after April 1975 would mitigate against either of these projects having performed any useful function in the Khmer Rouge reign of terror.

The history of Detachment K demonstrates that in 1977 the Detachment's operations were generally shut down and nearly all their files retired to USAINTA at Ft. Meade, MD, by 1976. After 1975, the residual U.S. Army capability in Thailand was through a token five person element with collection tasking through the Military Liaison Officer at the U.S. Embassy, Bangkok. But, the reality was that nearly all U.S. Army HUMINT with a capability to collect against Indochina had functionally ceased to exist with the exception of the Joint Casualty Resolution Center and DTA's Special Office for POW/MIA Affairs which focused solely on POW/MIA matters.

After 1979 and the invasion of the Socialist Republic of Viet Nam, U.S. policy turned once again back to Indochina and it was our public national policy to provide non-lethal assistance to the Cambodian resistance opposed to the People's Republic of Cambodia. All these actions were rendered mute by the October 23, 1991 agreements in Paris which eventually led to the reestablishment of Prince Sihanouk as Chief of State of the Republic of Cambodia.

The existence of Project 0710-08 and the full scope of its operations has been previously declassified (See Enclosure 2, attached) and never reclassified. As to the embryonic CIOPs targeted against Cambodia, the realities of the murderous regime of Pol Pot in Cambodia and the lack of U.S. Army resources argues

that both CTOPS were terminated almost immediately after their inception. Their identification and what they may have attempted to obtain is now of interest only to military historians researching the end of U.S. Army HUMINT in Southeast Asia.

There is nothing in the project and CTOP numbers themselves which is classified per se. Whatever may continue to remain classified must be tested by a reasonable and legitimate FOIA request but that determination can only be made in response to a declassification request under the FOIA. It can be reasonably argued that if the numbers are not classified, then the decision to withhold them is arbitrary and unreasonable.

Therefore, I appeal USATNSCOM's decision to withhold information relating to the project and CTOP numbers on the pages identified below:

-Page 003, Lines 1 and 2.



The IRR is the Army's official storage facility for all intelligence investigative records.) As a result of these searches, we have located the enclosed Operational File for Project 5310-06-E.

We have completed a mandatory declassification review in accordance with Executive Order (EO) 12356. As a result of this review, it has been determined that the information contained in these records is partially releasable to you.

Information has been sanitized from these records which is currently and properly classified and CONFIDENTIAL according to Sections 1.1(a)(3), 1.3(a)(1), and 1.3(a)(4) of EO 12356. 

The records (pages 5 and 6) have been returned for our disposition.

We have completed a mandatory declassification review in accordance with Executive Order (EO) 12356. As a result of this review, information has been sanitized from these records that is currently and properly classified CONFIDENTIAL according to Sections 1.1(a)(3) and 1.3(a)(4) of EO 12356. This information is exempt from the public disclosure provisions of the FOIA pursuant to Title 5 U.S. Code 552 (b)(1). A copy of the records is enclosed (Enclosure 1). Duplication fees of \$.30 are waived.

Section 1.1(a)(3) of EO 12356 provides that information shall be classified CONFIDENTIAL if its unauthorized disclosure reasonably could be expected to cause damage to the national security.

Section 1.3(a)(4) of EO 12356 provides that information pertaining to intelligence activities, sources, or methods shall be considered for classification protection.

Other information was withheld because it concerns "matters that are related solely to the internal personnel rules and practices of an agency." 5 U.S.C. § 552(b)(2). Material withheld under this exemption relates primarily to internal file numbers and was therefore properly determined to be exempt from release. See Founding Church of Scientology v. Smith, 721 F.2d 828, 830 n.4 (D.C. Cir. 1983) ("[I]f the material relates to trivial administrative matters of no genuine public interest, exemption [is] automatic under the statute."); id. at 831 (protecting sensitive instructions regarding administrative handling of documents). In addition, release of these internal reference numbers could impede the Department of the Army's regulatory responsibilities to collect and analyze foreign intelligence. See generally Crooker v. Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco & Firearms, 670 F.2d 1051, 1074 (D.C. Cir. 1981) (en banc). However, one page was found to have information that was improperly withheld under exemption 2, and that page is enclosed with this letter.

Your appeal is accordingly granted in part and denied in part. This letter constitutes final action on behalf of the General Counsel, who has been designated by the Secretary of the Army to consider appeals under FOIA. You may, if you so desire, seek judicial review of this determination in accordance with statutory provisions.

These portions were thus properly withheld under FOIA, which exempts from disclosure matters that have been accurately classified "in the interest of national defense or foreign policy." 5 U.S.C. § 552(b)(1).

Section 1.3(a)(5) of Executive Order 12356 provides that classification protection shall be considered for information pertaining to foreign relations matters or foreign activities of the United States.





TERMS OF REFERENCE FOR THE MILITARY EQUIPMENT
DELIVERY TEAM, CAMBODIA (U)

1. (C) Purpose. These terms of reference govern the command relationships, organization, and operations for the Military Equipment Delivery Team, Cambodia, hereinafter referred to as MEDTC.
2. (C) Mission. The mission of the MEDTC is to administer and direct the Military Assistance Program (MAP) for Cambodia.
3. (C) Command Relationships, Organization, and Support.
 - a. Command Relationships.
 - (1) The Chief of the MEDTC commands the MEDTC. During the absence of the Chief, MEDTC, the next senior officer assigned to the MEDTC, and eligible to command under regulations of his own Service, will act as Chief, MEDTC.
 - (2) The Chief, MEDTC, serves under the military command of CINCPAC and is immediately subordinate to him.
 - (3) The Chief, MEDTC, functions under the overall supervision of the Chief of the U.S. Diplomatic Mission in accordance with the President's letter of December 1969 on the responsibilities of the Chiefs of Diplomatic Missions and such other instructions as the President may from time to time promulgate. As Chief of an element of the U.S. Diplomatic Mission, he will coordinate MEDTC activities with other appropriate U.S. governmental agencies represented in the U.S. Diplomatic Mission, Cambodia. The Chief, MEDTC, will assure that the Chief of the U.S. Diplomatic Mission, Cambodia is kept informed concerning MEDTC activities. Unresolved differences between the Chief, MEDTC, and the Chief of the U.S. Diplomatic Mission, Cambodia, will be referred through CINCPAC, to the Secretary of Defense.

(4) The Chief, MEDTC, is the representative of the Secretary of Defense to the Ministry of Defense, Cambodia, for military security assistance matters.

(5) Personnel of the MEDTC who are domiciled in Cambodia will be attached to the staff of the US Embassy, Phnom Penh.

b. Organization. The organization of the MEDTC will be as recommended by the Chief, MEDTC, and as approved by proper authority.

c. Support.

(1) Administrative and logistical support for the MEDTC will be provided as directed by CINCPAC.

(2) With respect to administrative support and technical and other nonpolicy matters primarily of interest to the separate US Services, direct liaison is authorized between the Chief, MEDTC, the US Military Departments, and the PACOM component commanders.

(3) Actions and recommendations concerning budgeting, funding, and manpower requirements of the MEDTC will be submitted to CINCPAC.

(4) The foregoing support arrangements will be further refined as agreed between the parties concerned and approved by higher authority.

4. (C) Functions and Responsibilities.

a. Functions. The Chief, MEDTC, will perform the following functions:

(1) Establish a relationship of mutual trust and

(2) Evaluate requirements and, in coordination with the Chief, US Diplomatic Mission, Cambodia, make recommendations to CINCPAC concerning military assistance to Cambodia.

(3) Observe, assess and report on the utilization of US materiel and services and Cambodian personnel trained by the United States and by third countries at US expense.

(4) When directed by appropriate authority, cooperate with representatives of specified US firms in furthering sales of US produced military equipment to meet valid country requirements.

(5) Work directly with the US Military Departments and appropriate US military area commands in arranging for receipt and transfer of military assistance materiel and services to Cambodia.

(6) Provide liaison with respect to weapons production and offshore procurement matters.

(7) Provide the point of contact for exchange of information on forces, budgets, weapons, and capabilities, as required.

(8) Provide liaison with the Ministry of Defense, Cambodia, with respect to any other military assistance requirements or logistic matters of the Department of Defense and perform such other functions as may be required under foreign assistance legislation.

(9) Maintain liaison with COMUSMACTHAI as required concerning logistic and administrative support of the MEDTC, the receipt of Cambodian military assistance materiel in Thailand, and in matters concerning onward shipment of materiel to Cambodia.

(10) Maintain liaison with the DAO, Saigon in all US military assistance matters concerning both RVN and Cambodia.

(11) Develop military assistance plans and programs for Cambodia, and after coordination with the Chief, US Diplomatic Mission, Cambodia, submit them to CINCPAC.

(12) As directed by the Chief of the US Mission, through cooperation with appropriate representatives of third countries, and in concert with the appropriate USG officials, provide liaison, services, and other authorized assistance to Cambodia, including training assistance and military assistance purchases.

(13) The functions of training and advising Cambodian units (in Cambodia) will not be performed by US military personnel.

(14) With regard to Cambodia's implementation of that portion of its military program financed by other US agencies with US-owned local currency, develop and execute a program of review and observation to serve as a basis for rendering an appropriate report to the Chief, US Diplomatic Mission, Cambodia and other concerned US agencies.

b. Responsibilities.

(1) In discharging the foregoing functions, the MEDTC will be guided by the policies and procedures set forth in the Military Assistance and Sales Manual, applicable DOD and CINCPAC directives and instructions, and such other directives as may be issued from time to time by the Chief, US Diplomatic Mission, Cambodia, and other appropriate authority.

(2) No classified US military information of any nature, the release authority for which is not contained in appropriate directives, will be released to representatives of the Government of

Cambodia without approval of CINCPAC. In the event that Cambodian authorities request information of a strategic nature from the Chief, MEDTC, such requests will be referred to CINCPAC. US War Plans will not be divulged to Cambodian Nationals without the specific authority of CINCPAC. CINCPAC, COMUSSAG/7AF, COMUSMACTHAI and DAO, Saigon, as appropriate, will be advised by the Chief, MEDTC, of any action taken by Cambodian Government authorities as a result of receiving strategic information from the United States or from any other source, if known.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Two congressional reports yesterday sharply criticized the policies of U.S. Ambassador to Vietnam Graham Martin and his counterpart in Cambodia, John G. Dean.

The reports, written by Senate and House staff analysts who visited Indochina earlier this year, charge that Martin has altered or withheld from Washington field reports that would have cast the South Vietnamese government in a bad light.

They charged that Dean has systematically violated congressional restrictions on the size of his embassy and has given military advice to the Phnom Penh government in the face of a congressional ban.

BOTH REPORTS painted a generally bleak picture of military and economic prospects in the two countries.

Both also were critical of Martin's public statements that a major boost in aid to Saigon for the next two years would lay the basis for an economic "takeoff" there while discouraging Hanoi from further attempts at military victory.

The Senate report, by Richard Moose and Charles Meissner, did not name Martin directly. But Moose, during a Foreign Relations Committee hearing two weeks ago, engaged in a personal exchange with the ambassador on the alleged inaccuracy of the embassy's reporting.

The report charged that embassy reports to Washington either distorted or deleted information on deliberate cease-fire violations by the South Vietnamese army, on deteriorating security and poor performance by South Vietnamese troops, and on the actual course of some military actions.

MARTIN ANSWERED the charges after his exchange with Moose, saying deletions were made because he did not believe it necessary to report some actions more than once, and that military information

was reaching Washington through Pentagon channels.

The House report, by John J. Brady and John H. Sullivan, said Dean has been boosting the size of his mission by an average of 15 to 22 military and civilians per day above the 200-man limit imposed by Congress.

To do so, it said, Dean has been flying personnel into Cambodia in the morning and out again at night so that no more than 200 are actually present when counts were taken.

In addition, it said, Dean "by his own admission . . . does not hesitate to give . . . military advice" to the Cambodian government, but maintains that Congress did not intend to preclude advising "at the level at which he performs."

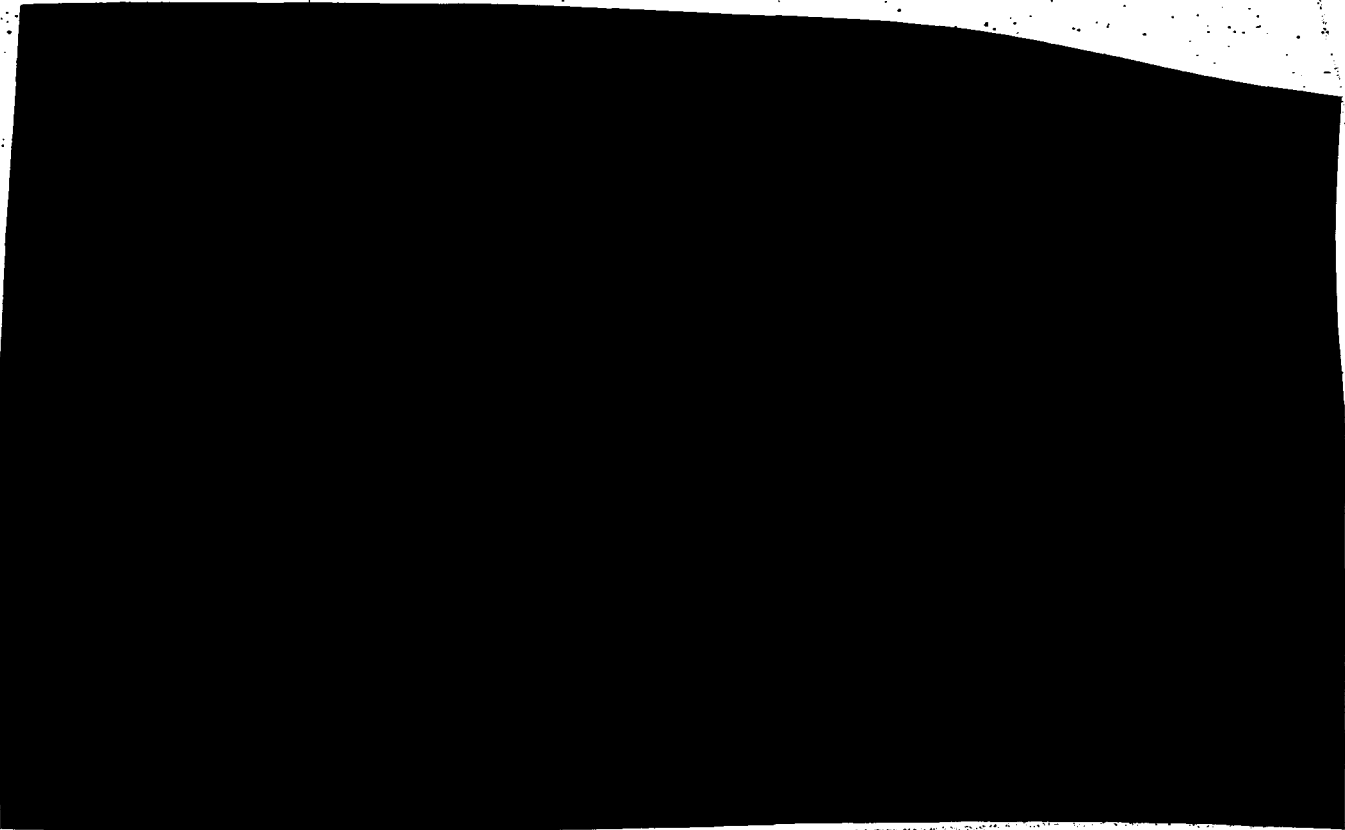

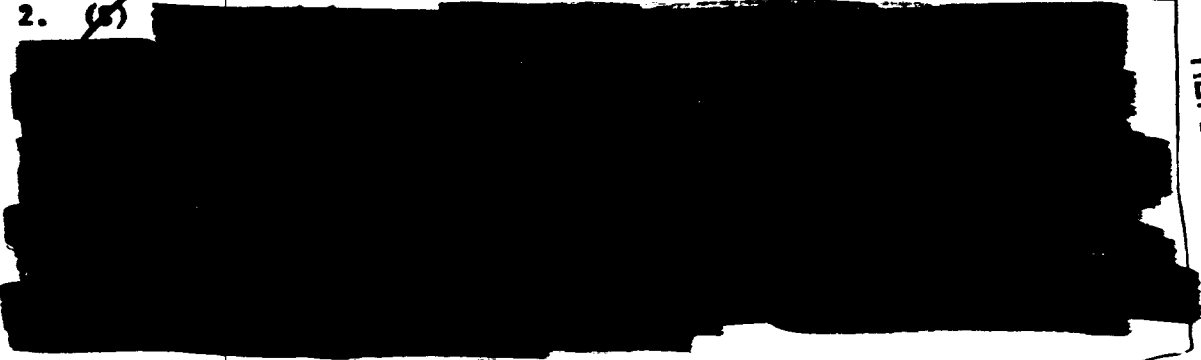

To date there has been no prohibition against our personnel conducting interrogations during their trips to Cambodia, a factor which will enhance U. S. control.

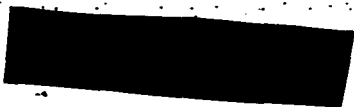

GAO CHARGE

U.S. Adviser Role In Cambodia Denied

By a Times Staff Writer

WASHINGTON — The Pentagon has denied a charge that its 73-member military team in Cambodia has violated a 1971 congressional ban on advisory groups.

The charge was leveled by the General Accounting Office which declared that its investigation was hindered by State and Defense department officials. GAO said that U.S. military officers, including the former Pacific commander, Adm. John S. McCain Jr., blocked access to some vital information and reluctantly released "sanitized" reports to GAO investigators.

Defense says the GAO has taken too narrow a view of its Cambodia responsibilities. Its Military Equipment Delivery Team must remain in daily contact with the Cambodians in the field to insure the proper use and maintenance of equipment, coordinate training and monitor supply needs, the DoD contends.

The U.S. Embassy in Phnom Penh also issued a denial of the charges specifically covering U.S. advisers' contacts with "operational units."

The GAO, in a 92-page report

(B-169832), said there have been many questionable financial transactions by both American and Cambodian officials during the last three years. While the U.S. provided \$516 million in military aid and \$216 million in economic assistance during fiscal years 1970-73, GAO reported "other costs which we were unable to determine were incurred..."

Weapons and supplies were diverted to units not recommended by the U.S. military team. Weapons meant for a legitimate military unit were diverted to Gen. Lon Non, brother of chief of state, for his personal bodyguard, the report said.

In May 1971, one U.S. inspector could not account for \$32,731 worth of equipment. The figure included the loss of 151 M-16 rifles valued at \$16,000.

The GAO found that as the American staff increased in Cambodia "it assumed additional duties and became more involved with the Cambodian military. Except for not assigning advisers to specific field units, MEDT operated much the same as a Military Assistance Adviso-

ry Group does in any other country."

Sixty-one special U.S. teams operated temporarily in the country during fiscal 1972. "These teams examined many aspects of the Cambodian military, and, in some instances, the objective was almost totally unrelated to equipment delivery. For example," the GAO said, "the teams made studies to develop a prisoner-of-war program."

Among the irregular transactions it found was the 1972 concealment of costs for 300 military instructors from Military Assistance Command, Vietnam, to train Cambodian troops in Vietnam. Costs also were concealed when MEDT used more than 170 persons on temporary duty during fiscal 1972.

Following the ouster of the Prince Sihanouk government in March 1970, the Cambodian armed forces expanded from a ceremonial force of about 28,000 to more than 200,000. During 1971 and 1972, the U.S. provided some \$56 million as partial payroll support for the force.

But the GAO found that last January, the Cambodians had as many as 100,000 nonexistent or "phantom" soldiers. The real pay for these phantoms was estimated at \$1 million in January. A new centralized pay system will be in full use by the end of this year.


