During the last week the Bee Keeper and it's crew have really had their hands full. From Oct 15, to Oct 19, they have eather fixed, recovered equipment and crew, or called in Pipe amoke for 17 sircraft.

It started on 15 Oct. when L/C 620 lost it's cross head in flight. Bee Keeper repaired it and hr. Swindle flew it back to Cu Chi. Also that day L/C 837 came down with fuel boast pump out. 1Lt Bush flew the L/C back to Cu Chi.

On 17 Oct., A/C 813 came down because of a tail rotor drive shaft hanger bearing out. It was replaced but tail boom crackes were discovered. The A/C was escorted back to Cu Chi. Later that day A/C 232, 650, and 620 were lost. The Bee Keeper recovered most of the equipment and called in Pipe Smoke for the recoverey. Also on 17 Oct. A/C 721 came down with a worn tail rotor pitch change link. Bee Keeper replaced the link and the ship continued mission.

On 18 Oct., A/C 895 was lost. Bee Keeper called Fipe Smoke for the recoverey 18 Oct., A/C from the 121st had a bad battary, Bee Keeper came and started the A/C 18 Oct., A/C 952 came down with F.O.D. in engine. F.O.D. was blown out and then flown back to Cu Chi by Hornet 8.

On 19 Oct., A/C 093 lost hydraulics, Eee Keeper repaired the A/C and it continued it's mission. 19 Oct., A/C 370 had a bad fuel filter. It was replaced and ship continued mission. 19 Oct., A/C 148 had tail rotor binding, it was checked out OK and ship continued mission. 19 Oct., A/C 093 had loud bang in the engine. It was found to be the operation of the bleed band, aircraft continued mission.

19 Oct., A/C 963 had hole in the tail boom, the aircraft was brought back to Cu Ch: 19 Oct., A/C 639 had fuel light coming on. Bee Keeper repaired it and the aircraft continued mission.

The Bee Leeper crew consisted of; 1Lt Bush, Major Byars, WO Lykes, CWO Swindle, SP5 Mc Gleeen, SF5 Schimmel, SF4 Horton, and SF4 Barber.

Freedom's Franchise

While millions of people ground the world are fighting tyranny—struggling for the right of selfdetermination, the privilege of participating in freely-held elections—U.S. military personnel have the opportunity to exercise this inherent right in the upcoming Nov 7 elections.

It is an opportunity, a right, a duty for which countless millions of american fighting men have given their lives. It is not a privilege to be taken lightly.

Through this is an "off-election" year-with state, county and local governmental positions at stake-- it is a most important election.

Citizenship for all Americans, civilian and military alike, begins at home.

Because a servicement may not at this time be living in the state in which he is a registered voter is no excuse for failure to vote.

He needs only to check the voter registration requirements of his home of record, or the locality in which he presently resides, to determine whether he is eligible to vote in one one or the other area.

If the servicemen is registered at his home of record, he should write local election officials requesting an absentee ballot. This action, however, should be taken immediately for most absentee ballots are required to be in the hands of election officials no later than five days before election day.

Any questions the servicemen might have on reg stration requirements and deadlines for the acquisition and return of absentee ballots should be taken to his unit's Voting Officer. (AFPS)
