REAL CAV SIR – So many things have been, and are, happening concerning the 1-9 CAV and the 1st Cav. Div. itself. The holiday months of Nov. and Dec. were extremely tough as I have yet to be allowed to personally visit any of the wounded personnel at Brooke Army Medical Center. Am still working on that and hope to get clearance for visits very shortly. I'll get in though, especially to see any of our Troopers there.

I did not ask for a 1-9 CAV Commander update for the last issue but I did for this article and have not received anything as it appears our 1-9 CAV Troopers have been really busy as the following known report will show. Word also has it that they will be coming home soon!

Information on our wounded and killed in action is hard to come by. I remember wanting to see visitor's while I was banged up and hospitalized for two years. Now the hospital makes it almost impossible to see our servicemen and women. But I get regular updates from Dennis at the 1st Cavalry Division Association. He has advised me that SPC William HANSEN has received the Purple Heart award (the one award that most of us who have one or more call the EMB-Enemy Marksmanship Badge. Additionally, the following information is from a Division PAO news release. I have edited it and I'm sure Dennis will do additional edits to make it fit.

(Nearly) All Gave Some - Task Force Awards 124th Purple Heart By Sgt. John QUEEN, 3rd Brigade Combat Team Public Affairs



FORWARD OPERATING BASE INDEPENDENCE, Iraq – The Purple Heart is a combat decoration that Soldiers of **TASK FORCE 1-9 CAV** of the 1st Cavalry Division's 3rd Brigade Combat Team have become all too familiar with during their tour of duty here in Iraq. Nine more of the medals were awarded Nov. 30 to Soldiers of the task force who were wounded during operations in their sector of Baghdad. That brings the total number Purple Heart Medals received by the unit to 124 since the beginning Operation Iraqi Freedom II.

After presenting the Purple Hearts, MG Peter CHIARELLI, the Division Commander, also awarded Army Commendation Medals and Combat Infantry Badges to Soldiers of the unit. In a brief speech, CHIARELLI praised the 9th

CAV Troopers for the job they've done since deploying to Iraq in Mar.

"I am humble to be in the presence of this battalion," CHIARELLI said. "I thank you for what you people do everyday. You are making a tremendous difference in Baghdad and Iraq."

Weapons gunner for Co. C, 1-9th CAV. Regiment, said it was an honor to receive it. "I never thought I would get one," GORDON said. "I had just left the infantry line unit and went to [Headquarters Co.]." GORDON and another Soldier were wounded in a grenade attack while on a mission to recover the bodies of two Iraqi policemen who had been killed. He still has a small piece of shrapnel embedded three inches inside his body.

The Purple Heart is a medal that their platoon sergeant, SFC Orlando GARCIA, wished they didn't get. "I'm just glad the injuries were not life threatening," he said. "But, the Purple Heart is something they do deserve."

My great thanks to Ron and Bertha STOKES for taking and sending me all of these pictures. I have several more that I will include in the next edition so if you have not seen yourself yet, be patient!

Cliff BAKER was at my table and told an interesting story of how they found out the Chinese had come into Korea and the subsequent retreat in '50 from near the border. I asked Cliff to write me an account for SABER so here it goes. I hope you find it as interesting as I did!

"It was late Nov. The front lines were at Anjou, about fifty miles south of the Yalu River, which is the boundary between North Korea and Manchuria. We were setup in a rice paddy, as usual, along the MSR north of Unsan, thirty miles south of Anjou. It was a bright, sunny day though quite cold and we were busy

at work doing the things ORD people do. We noticed an unusual amount of traffic on the MSR with a lot of different units heading south. After observing this for a while we became concerned and sent a guy to the CP to inquire about it. The folks at the CP were skeptical but got in touch with our Div.HQ anyway and were told we were supposed to have cleared the area at 0700 that morning. (We learned later that the Chinese had come into the war and were overrunning our front lines.)" "It was now 1100 hours!

We began preparations to move out immediately. We had numerous crates of new engines and other parts and quite a number of new trucks and jeeps, plus the usual vehicles on hand for repair. We also had eighteen thousand gallons of gasoline in fifty-five gallon drums. We moved all the material that we could not move with us close together and placed the gasoline so as to torch the lot." (It made a great bonfire according to Cliff!)

"It was late afternoon when we began moving out and found it very difficult to get on the road due to the congestion and the fact that we were out of sync with the withdrawal schedule. We had posted a lookout on a hill north of the area to warn us if we were about to be overrun. We managed piecemeal to get a few vehicles on the road at a time and drove south all that night, having to get off the road from time to time for high priority traffic. We were definitely low priority."

"After two days of this, we were just north of Kaesong and running out of fuel. No one knew where the POL was located. CPL KLINE, myself and one other guy, whose name I do not remember, were ordered to take three trucks and drive south searching for fuel. We drove through the night and the next day finally found fuel at the docks at the port of Inchon. After a short nap we headed back north arriving at the Co. the next morning at 0900 hours. They had decided to wait thirty minutes longer and then to burn everything and walk south. Needless to say, they were very glad to see us! We continued south and stopped at Suwon south of Seoul where we spent the winter." Thanks Cliff for a great true adventure story!

We had a nice e-mail from Greg CLASS, who was the Co. clerk for Hq and Co. A in Vietnam from '68-'69. He had open heart and bypass surgery in Aug., '03 and is now fully recovered. That was the good news. The bad news was that after 29 years of working for Yamaha and within three years of retirement, his job was eliminated. However, as of his e-mail in early Dec., he was actively looking for a less stressful job! He and Toni are doing well and continue to live in the beautiful San Diego area.

Another e-mail, we received was from Bill JACKSON who served with the 27th MNT Bn. in Korea in '63-'64. Bill had been traveling in Europe and visited Germany, Poland and Lithuania. Bill commented about the great attitude toward Americans that they saw in Poland and Lithuania, and noted that in Vilnius, Lithuania there is a plaque at the City Hall that says, "Anyone who would choose Lithuania as an enemy has also made an enemy of the United States. President George W. BUSH."

One other former trooper heard from was Chuck McLEAN. He sent me a picture of himself and a currently serving member of the 27th MSB in Iraq, CPL Jason SLETTEBAK, who hails from the same hometown as Chuck, the metropolis of Petersburg, ND! I will include the picture in the next SABER column.

News from the 27th Bn. in Iraq continues to be good with lots of mission work. As of this writing, in late Dec., they are still hoping to be back at Ft. Hood sometime in Mar. A reminder that the 58th Annual CAV Reunion will be held at Ft. Hood from June 22-26. Details were in the November/December SABER! I Continued on pg.17.

Air Travel – The new Killeen Airport is open and in addition to the small prop airplanes used at the old airport commuter jet service is now available from the Dallas and Houston airports. The new location is co-located with Robert Gray Army Airfield. Austin's Bergstrom Airport is located on the other side of Austin (about 1½ hour). Various rental car agencies are available at both airports. Assn. members get unlimited mileage and year round discounts off Alamo's base rental rates. Some restrictions apply. For reservations, call Alamo at 1-800-354-2322. Be sure to request ID#93291 and rate code BY at the time of reservation. There is no Alamo counter in Killeen.

If you don't have a regular Travel Agent or don't like to schedule flights yourself, there are two reputable Travel Agencies that we recommend you contact for assistance in making your travel arrangements. Train/Bus Travel – AMTRAK serves Temple, TX, about 20 miles East of Killeen, and provides a 15% discount off their published rates for passengers 62 years of age and over. The Trailways Bus Station is located at the corner of 4th Street and Avenue C in Killeen, and in Austin at 916 E. Koenig.

Automobile Travel – Those traveling to Reunion by automobile may notice changes in the gate access to Ft. Hood during their trip. The Association will have a site set up at the Reunion Registration so those who don't have a Department of Defense decal may obtain a Temporary Pass for the time period of the Reunion. We treated our troops like the heroes they were, acknowledged and celebrated their sacrifice and rejoiced at their homecoming instead of spitting on them. And that support continues today for those of us in Iraq. Our country knows that it must support us and it does. The lesson was learned in Vietnam and we are better because of it. Everyone who has gone before is a hero. They are celebrated in my heart. I think admirably of all those who have gone before me. From those who fought to establish this country in the late 1770's to those I serve with here in Iraq. They have all sacrificed to ensure our freedom. But when I get back, I'm going to make it a personal mission to specifically thank every Vietnam Vet I encounter for their sacrifice. Because if nothing else good came from that terrible war, one thing did. It was the lesson learned on how we treat our warriors. We as a country learned from our mistake and now treat our warriors as heroes, as we should. I am the beneficiary of their sacrifice. Not only for the freedom they, like veterans from other wars, ensured, but for how well our country now treats my fellow Marines and I. We are the beneficiaries of their

**SILVER WINGS
of the CAV.**

Hello once again fellow Skytroopers! I'll begin where I left off last issue and report that no one has seized the opportunity to replace this writer as your "Wings" correspondent. So you'll be reading my ramblings for another hitch as I re-upped. I did hear from my predecessor, Frank (Double Duck) TIERNEY <frank_tierney@ameritech.net>. He has agreed to be your 'Silver Wings' luncheon host during the 58th annual reunion this June in Killeen, TX. He will also arrange for a 'Silver Wings of the Cav' hospitality suite. Over the years we have had some great ones and as Frank put it, "I'll be damned if I'll let this one pale by comparison." So set your sights for Killeen this year. It's not too early to make a reservation. The 'Wings' luncheon will surely be a good one. I will share a story from Double Duck a little further into the column. But first, as promised, I'll give you my condensed AAR of the Cav's Veteran's Day activities in and around the DC AO.

It was in '82 that the VVMF built the Vietnam Veterans Memorial and held its first Veteran's Day ceremony in honor of those who served. It was also my first visit to our nation's capitol during this holiday. What I experienced that day in Washington left a lasting impression on me. So much so that I've only missed a couple Nov. trips to DC since. You're hard pressed to equal the camaraderie found among a mixture of so many vets over such a short period of time.

MOH recipient Dave DOLBY was to be my navigator for the three-hour trip south this year. So, with bags packed for four days of warm, cold and/or wet weather (Nov. is very unpredictable in DC), we pulled pitch on the 4X4 and set a vector for Virginia and the Crystal City Hilton.

The trip seemed short as Dave conversed from lift-off to short final into the Hilton parking garage. The lobby was filled with folks, young and old, adorning the Cav patch on clothing or cap – foretelling of a great few days ahead. I quickly found Clinton POLEY, Dave's roommate for the evening. Shortly after signing in at the hospitality room, I bumped into Fred SCHAAFF with whom I was sharing a room. After stowing my gear, I set out to socialize into the wee hours. Bill BECK introduced me to President and CEO of the Brentwood Group, Bob DANIELS. Bob is working with Joe GALLOWAY and Hal MOORE as part of a task force to make Nov., '05 a special event for the 40th Anniversary Celebration of the Ia Drang Alumni. I'm sure you'll be reading more about it in the ensuing months.

Veteran's Day was bright and warm as we headed across the river to DC. So much to see and do and so little time. The day offered ceremonies at Arlington National Cemetery where President BUSH addressed the crowd. Wreath-laying events at the new National WWII, Korean and Vietnam Memorials and Story Telling at the Vietnam Women's Memorial and a new display, "The Price of Freedom: Americans at War" was opening at the Smithsonian. The Mall was a sea of veterans and family with hundreds of spectators on hand from one end of the Reflection Pond to the other. I must admit I made several trips to the WWII Memorial to just observe the silver hair vets in proud appreciation of the long-overdue memorial. Some fought back tears, others could not. Time passed so quickly. Vet's Day on the Mall concluded with an interview by a reporter from the Washington Post that appeared in Friday's paper. The end of a perfect day.

Fri. was spent interacting with the troops from Walter Reed, working a couple hours in the hospitality room souvenir shop and putting a few suds away. Ron SLEES and I did get to sample some Vietnamese cuisine thanks to Dave DOLBY and the Nam-Viet restaurant.

Sat.'s check of the Aviation sign-in sheet revealed a strong showing by the 229th AVN Bn. vets. My unofficial count of those who took the time to fill out the form; sixteen 229th, two 227th, two 15th TC, seven 11th PF and one 2-20th Arty.

The evening's Ia Drang Alumni Banquet was, as always, a moving event as nearly 500 folks dined together in remembrance of those lost in battle and those who survived.

Early Sun.morning, LTC Sara PERRY drove Ed FREEMAN, Chip PARKER and I to the "Wall" to attend the Ia Drang pre-dawn memorial service. The service began in the morning chill with the reading of the names of the fallen by Gen. Hal MOORE and Joe GALLOWAY. I could only see forms before me, just dark silhouettes of those attending. As the names were rendered verbally with precise pronunciation they seemed to encircle the group of aging vets. Name after name, one after another in a caring and slow cadence was read as if the "Wall" could hear, perhaps it could. The horizon behind the Washington Memorial was now beginning to lighten as dawn overtook darkness. By the time the last name echoed off the shiny black granite wall the silhouettes before me were taking an identifiable form revealing somber faces. The sound of a bagpiper filled the area as these men embraced each other and bid farewell to the fallen for another year. A wonderful conclusion to a few days of remembrance and camaraderie.

Okay, lets move on. I have a great message from Catfish 6, Bradley MacNEALY, Commanding TF 185th AVN in the "Sunni Triangle". In the next issue I'll run his "Tribute to Vietnam Helicopter Pilots".

Let's crank up and launch the mail sortie. You've kept the old mailbox stuffed these past two months. But before we get to the mail samplings, with due respect, I want to acknowledge the passing of a proud member of the Cav's Light Air Section – Korea. SFC George D. BRADLEY passed away at his home in Safford, Arizona. He died at age 75 and is survived by his wife of 48 1-2 years Mrs. Mary Dean BRADLEY. For those of you who might flown in the 1st.Cav's Air Section, in Korea '51 and '52. George's plane was an L-19, # 355 always fueled and always ready to go! My thanks to Jack EVANS for informing us of SFC BRADLEY's passing.

I also want to mention the passing of another great trooper, Gen. Jack NORTON. He commanded the 1st Air Cav in Vietnam and as a paratrooper made jumps with the 82nd AB at Normandy and Holland. He was buried at the West Point Cemetery this past Dec.

This next message is from Rich HENRIQUES, LTC (Ret) "Angry Crow 6" CO C-1-7th. A follow-up to a discussion we started at the Ia Drang Dinner.

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"On Apr. 4, '67, the 3rd Plat, C Co. 1-7 Cav was heavily engaged in a firefight on a rock face on the West side of the An Lao valley (approximately 734074). During the fighting, two troopers were killed and three badly wounded, in danger of bleeding to death. While the fighting continued, a log bird from the 229th (company unknown) made a run over the platoon and kicked out re-supply consisting of ammo, smokes and water. The aircraft commander reported mission completed and after describing the physical layout of the ground where the platoon was fighting (large boulders abutting large boulders) asked me if I "had anything further for him". I asked him to "do a quick recon of the area to evaluate an approach that could be used by MEDEVAC after the area was neutralized".

We watched him slowly approach the area and as he got close to the cliff face, he did a pedal turn and inched in sideways and transmitted to me to tell the platoon to "throw them in quick." This was done rapidly and the 3 wounded were evacuated and I believe survived the war.

Later that afternoon, after the fight wound down and the dead troopers were evacuated. I believe again, by the 229th (I don't think the dead was routinely evacuated by MEDEVAC). I asked my 1st SGT to find out the names of the crew. Under whatever passed for trees, I wrote recommendations for the DFC for a-c and co-pilot and AM w-V for the door gunner and crew chief. I believe they received the awards but did not keep track of their names.

What I asked and what they did, some may say, was routine (for the 229th). Possibly, but policy said that MEDEVACS occurred after the shooting stopped - they knew when I told them I had people in danger of bleeding to death that I thought they would not survive - and they rose to the occasion and did what they did - at great risk to themselves. I'm glad they didn't hesitate.

I don't remember if the 229th support was parceled out to the three 3rd BDE Bns by Co., but if it was, they might have been from Co. A, 229th - but I don't know.

I would appreciate you airing any of this in your column so that if any of the crew survive, they might like to know that mission saved three people and took a load off my mind that day. I thank them all very much! <AngryCrow6@aol.com>

This next (abridged) e-mail is from Frank (Double Duck) TIERNEY, <frank_tierney@ameritech.net>. "Hey Hank: I gotta share the following story.

My wife and I spent the night in a resort the Fri. night of this past Memorial Day weekend. We drove two cars because I was going to a car auction on Sat.. As I was loading up her car for her to drive home, I noticed a "Silver Wings of The Cav" cap in the back of her car. Having cleaned the car out a month before, for a long trip she took, I didn't have a clue why she would have it there. I was wearing my black VFW jacket, so I nonchalantly put on the black cap, loaded up her car and I left for the car auction.

I was watching the auction and talking with a guy I happened to meet there when I noticed a second fellow walking around me and looking at my VFW jacket and cap. The glances went on for maybe a half-hour before he approached me.

Ends up we flew together in 'Nam, Rob BROOKS. Well the longest bear hug, which only two war torn soldiers that knew what the other endured can give each other, followed. He said he was drawn to me because of the Silver Wings emblem on the cap. With that and oblivious to the stares and smiles of others, he lifts up his shirt to bear his chest and show me the "the same exact emblem that was on my cap, the Cav patch in the center of a set of aviator wings, was tattooed over his heart!" Well, you know I took off that cap and immediately gave it to him.

It was fun to then include the first guy I was talking with in our conversation. He couldn't believe what he had just observed. Then his wife reappeared and was moved to tears, as were we, as the chance encounter was recounted. We talked for 2 hours and bought each other beers. We recounted many of the same missions and incidents. Rob and his wife came over to my home on Memorial Day to be a part of dedicating a Veteran's Monument. That was followed by more beers and brats. Rob, who had never been involved in any veteran activities, immersed himself immediately. Within weeks we went to the 1st Cav reunion in Milwaukee. A few weeks later he rode his Harley to Texas for the VHPA reunion.

The most amazing part is that neither Kathy nor I know how "The Silver Wings" cap got in the back of her Jeep. As I said, I cleaned it out a month ago. It was the only thing in the back of a Jeep that had been to New Orleans and back. I had not worn one of those caps in years. That one was brand new and I didn't even know I had any left! (The Twilight Zone music plays in my head every time I think about that!) Cool, EH? Frank, your story illustrates the bonds formed so many years ago in war are everlasting. Thanks for sharing.

Ralph (Doc) HOLLOWAY, <doc-holloway@sbcglobal.net> responded to the Guns-A-Go-Go story in the last issue with a correction. "I read your latest column in the Saber with great interest since I was lucky enough to be one of the original 8 pilots chosen to fly the armed Chinook. A couple of points out to be elaborated though. Although the aircraft was capable of using the 7.62 mini gun in a pod, as a matter of practice, we did not use it. Our logic was why give up 39 2.75-inch rockets with 17-pound warheads for less than a minute of little bitty bullets. The same goes for the 5 manned machine guns. Although we could mount M-60's, the 50 cal is a much better weapon. More reliable and harder hitting. So, throughout our time in Vietnam, we never used the mini gun pods nor mounted the M-60 in the doors or ramp. There was one small error in the report as well. We adopted the unit call sign "Guns-A-Go-Go" while we were forming and training at Ft. Benning. When in operation, we used "Go-Go (last three digits of the tail number)". "Easy Money" was therefore Go-Go 149. The only person who had a personal call sign was the unit commander, Go-Go 6. Other than that, great article. Thanks for your time and take care." Doc, great hearing from a former Go-Go pilot and I appreciate your input and emails.

On this same subject, Dave KNUDSEN <david277@centurytel.net> wrote, "Just finished reading your column in the Saber. I was happy to hear you had feedback regarding the "Go-Go's"!
