## SUMMARY

The following is the statement of Lt Col James F. Dinwiddie: "Jolly Green 05 went into the pickup area and descended through holes in the undercast, which was lying on the tops of the peaks. Jolly Green 05 located the downed pilot (Capt Heiskell, See File/Pg No 3-024), who assisted by voice vectors. Nail 65 (Capt Heiskell) was recovered in the chopper in minimum time. Jolly Green 05 notified the Sandies that he had the pilot on board and was leaving the area to the south looking for a hole in the overcast. Jolly Green 05 then transmitted that he had been hit and was on fire. Heavy, extremely accurate 37MM fire was observed by the Sandies through breaks in the clouds. Fire could be observed in the top section of the chopper just below the blades. As the chopper proceeded south, the fire became worse with flames streaming behind. The chopper flew approximately one mile after being hit. Jolly Green 05 transmitted that the whole chopper was on fire, just before crashing into the side of a karst peak. Jolly Green 36 was called in by the Sandies and made a pass under the broken cloud layer, but reported no survivors. He was asked by Sandy 5 to satisfy himself that there were no survivors and made a second pass under the clouds to do so. Jolly Green 36 withdrew safely from the area and recovered at Channel 09 with Sandy escort." During the ten minute, low-level search of the crash site by Jolly Green 36, two deployed parachutes were sighted: One 30 yards and the other 60 yards from the crash. The pararescueman (A2C Duane D. Hackney) from the crashed aircraft was picked up near the farthest parachute after he ignited a smoke flare. No other survivors were sighted near the other parachute or near the wreckage. The rescuer (Capt Heiskell) on board Jolly Green 05 was wearing a parachute at the time the pararescueman was blown out of the aircraft. The terrain in the area of the crash was very rugged karst, covered with moderately heavy jungle growth. Jolly Green 05 hit directly and perpendicularly a karst outcropping at a high rate of speed while on fire and was totally destroyed.
