

## THIS IS YOUR SELECTIVE SERVICE SYSTEM

Following your registration for selective service you will be mailed a Classification Questionnaire, which you will complete and return to your local board. From the information you provide in that document you will be classified by your local board into one of the classes described on the reverse side hereof. This classification will be the decision of your selective service local board, based on the evidence in your selective service file, and you have every right to question that decision should you disagree. Every selective service registrant has certain rights and privileges in the selective service process, including the rights of personal appearance and appeal, and every effort is made to assure that these rights and privileges are not denied to him. You will continue to be informed of these rights and privileges as your selective service process is continued. Should you have any questions, you may telephone, write to, or visit your local board, or any other selective service local board.

Your local board is composed of citizens of the community in which you live. Each local board has a Government Appeal Agent who is ready and willing to offer any legal counsel on Selective Service matters of which you may be in need. All of these people serve without pay, offering their time and knowledge in the national health, safety, and interest.

# SELECTIVE SERVICE CLASSIFICATIONS

## CLASS I

- Class I-A: Registrant available for military service.  
Class I-A-O: Conscientious objector registrant available for noncombatant military service only.  
Class I-C: Member of the Armed Forces of the United States, the Coast and Geodetic Survey, or the Public Health Service.  
Class I-D: Qualified member of reserve component, or student taking military training, including ROTC and accepted aviation cadet applicant.  
Class I-O: Conscientious objector available for civilian work contributing to the maintenance of the national health, safety, or interest.  
Class I-S: Student deferred by law until graduation from high school or attainment of age of 20, or until end of his academic year at a college or university.  
Class I-W: Conscientious objector performing civilian work contributing to the maintenance of the national health, safety, or interest, or who has completed such work.  
Class I-Y: Registrant qualified for military service only in time of war or national emergency.

## CLASS II

- Class II-A: Occupational deferment (which includes apprentice training).  
Class II-C: Agricultural deferment.  
Class II-S: Student deferment.

## CLASS III

- Class III-A: Extreme hardship deferment, or registrant with a child or children.

## CLASS IV

- Class IV-A: Registrant with sufficient prior active service or who is a sole surviving son.  
Class IV-B: Official deferred by law.  
Class IV-C: Alien not currently liable for military service.  
Class IV-D: Minister of religion or divinity student.  
Class IV-F: Registrant not qualified for any military service.

## CLASS V

- Class V-A: Registrant over the age of liability for military service.

## SPECIAL NOTICE

**A registrant who was deferred on or before his 26th birthday has his liability extended to his 35th birthday.**
