MEMORIAL PLAQUE DEDICATION

On 10 August, 1995, the first day of the 48th Annual Reunion, the Association presented to the Division a series of bronze plaques listing the names of the War Dead of the 1st Cavalry Division from the four wars in which the Division fought. The ceremony took place in the 1st Cavalry Division Memorial Chapel which was filled with alumni and current members of the Division. It included massing of the colors of the units of the

Division in the Sanctuary, an introduction and benediction by the Division Chaplain, LTC Gregory J. SCHANNEP, a moving Living History by Chaplain (MAJ) Ben COLLINS, and especially in-

spirational comments by LTG Paul E. FUNK, Commander of III Corps and Ft. Hood and a previous Commander of A Troop, 1/9 Cav in Vietnam. The plaques, mounted in beautiful hardwood frames, line the walls of the Chapel.

The President of the Association, COL (R) Ernest P. TERRELL, Jr., presented the memorial to the Division Commander, BG Leon J. LAPORTE, with the following words:

BOOK REVIEW

**"CUSTER TO MacARTHUR
7TH U.S. CAVALRY 1866-1945"**

By Edward L. Daily

Turner Publishing Co., Paducah, KY, 200 pg. hard bound
 Ed DAILY has become the premier historian of the 7th Cav. Regt. with the publication of this outstanding volume.

With the publication of "Skirmish Red, White, and Blue", a history of the 7th U.S. Cav. (1945-1953) already under his belt, this new effort sets DAILY apart as preminent among 7th Cav. historians and scholars.

While there has long been a fascination with Custer and the 7th and DAILY does justice to this era as well, he also makes it clear that this is not all of the history of the 7th as the book covers in great detail all of the service to the nation of this great Regt.

The book is very well illustrated with the photos being printed in sepia tone which is a very pleasing aspect and gives the pictures an antique feeling.

DAILY has included not only Regimental diary type of information but also statistical information such as Medal of Honor recipients, rosters of Custer's troops, unit citations

and lineage and honors. Also included are details on the saber, the Regimental coats of arms, insignia, and the standard of the Regt.

DAILY enlisted in the Army in 1948 and was assigned to the 1st Cav. Div.'s Co. "H" 2nd BN 7th CAV RGT on occupation duty in Japan. When the Korean war started he quickly rose from the ranks with a battlefield commission to 2LT.

DAILY's decorations include the D.S.C. Silver Star, Bronze Star, and Purple Heart w/ O.L.C.'s.

He has served as President of the 7th U.S. Cav Assn. and currently is a member of the 1st Cav. Div. Assn. Board of Governors.

This book is a must for any one interested in military history, the Indian wars, Custer's era, the 1st Cav. Div. and WWII and all "Garryowen", the troopers who served with one of our nations finest and historic Regiments. It is well written and organized and is destined to be a standard research volume on the 7th. It is highly recommended.

Thursday evening, July 27, 1995 ABC presented the 90 min. documentary, Peter JENNINGS Reporting, HIROSHIMA, Why the bomb was dropped. Early in the narration Mr. JENNINGS stated "Two years ago... the Smithsonian Institution set out to commemorate the 50th Anniversary of the flight of the Enola Gay, the plane that dropped the (atomic) bomb... By the spring of 1994 some veterans groups had declared virtual war on the Museum saying the exhibit portrayed Americans as vengeful aggressors, the Japanese as innocent victims". In his closing remarks Peter JENNINGS stated, in part... "It's unfortunate, we think, that some veteran's organizations, and some politicians, felt the need to bully our most important National Museum, so the whole story of Hiroshima is not represented here". (At the exhibit)

I have no problem with the way the documentary was presented, with the questions raised about the morality of dropping the bomb, or with the gruesome pictures presented. The cameras told the whole story. I thought it was well done. My problem is with Peter JENNINGS. He

did not 'report', he provided a very biased narration, most of it severely criticizing veterans groups for opposing the original Enola Gay exhibit set up by the history revisionists of the National Air and Space Museum.

The exhibit was to open in May, 1995. The 500 page script accompanying the exhibit was so full of inaccuracies and biases, which portrayed the Japanese as the victims and the Americans as violent aggressors, that many World War II veterans (myself included) wrote to complain.

Officials of the American Legion and the National Air and Space Museum worked through five revisions of the exhibit but a compromise could not be reached. The result was a partial showing of the Enola Gay, without the biased statements of the history revisionists.

Peter JENNINGS castigated veterans for standing firm in their desire that the truth be told. It is sad commentary when the most prestigious museum in the nation will allow itself to be victimized by those favoring political correctness, and history revisionism. It is even sadder that a knowledgeable and highly respected TV anchorman will champion such questionable actions and criticize those of us who only ask that the truth be told so generations to come will know the whole story.

Do I have a personal interest in all this? Yes, very much so.

I was in the Philippine Islands training for the invasion of Japan when the bomb was dropped. Had we invaded, there would have been many thousands of American casualties. David wrote about the comments provided by Bob THAXTON (see my July/Aug. column) concerning the events that took place on 3 Nov., '65. David said he knows Bob very well and can verify most of what was written. He acknowledged that after over 30 years, some of the details are sketchy but he remembers being on the ground at the B Trp CP before dark and also remembers landing there with ammo. David recalls that B Trp moved to a location each night. One of his jobs was to fly back to the Golf Course almost every day for water, food, mail, and other "ash and trash." All aircraft maintenance was done in the field, and he recalls being shot down while conducting a test flight. David said that Dick TIMMONS was his Crewchief - Doorgunner the day he got hit when departing a hot LZ. David dropped Dick off at an aid station. A tour with the 9th Cav was not enough for David. He returned to RVN two more times, once as "shotgun" flying Bird Dogs in the Delta and a tour with the 101st. Abn. Div. Yes David, I agree with your comment, someone up there really likes you! David retired from the Army and the Postal Service and now raises a few cows.

Another Trooper checked in with a few observations about the LZ English fire works display when the ammo dump

went up with a bang on 6 June 1967 (I didn't realize at the time that the event coincided with D Day 1944). Bruce "Ace" MORRIS (C Co. 229th Avn. Bn.) (RR #1 Box 4045 Solon, ME 04979-9729) was at English that night and woke up with the roar, grabbed his rifle and jumped into his bunker. He said he almost killed some of their ARVN security troops as they ran across the road in front of his position. Someone screamed that they were friendly troops. After all those years, Bruce can still see the ARVN security troops dragging M-1 Carbines behind them and not looking back. That is why (at least during my time in A Trp) that we performed our own security. At LZ Dog, all of our troopers (pilots, maintenance and Blues) manned our perimeter. Art JUNOT forwarded a letter the Assn received from Robert NORVELL. His father, Clyde L. NORVELLE, was a B Trp 9th Cav pilot, who was shot down and killed on 30 March, 1966 while trying to extract some troops. Robert is an Arizona Wheelchair Athlete and is training for the 1996 Paramilitary Archery competition to be held in Atlanta, GA. Robert has a rigorous training schedule with tournaments in San Diego (June 95) Boston (June, '95) Ohio (Aug., '95) Long Beach (Aug 95) and the Pan Am Games in Buenos Aires, Argentina (Sep., '95).
