Everything starts with light entertainment.

Refreshments will be available in the pre-function area outside the Grand Ballroom starting at 5 p.m. The doors


open for our final banquet at 5:45 p.m.

Please do not light them until we do so in unison during remembrance of our comrades who did not return with us from Vietnam.

Advance table seating reservations are available throughout the reunion in the registration area. This is a great opportunity for a group of you to arrange to sit together . . . but please do not wait until the last minute.

Seating reservations are made on a first-come, first-serve basis at the designation reservation counter in the Main Ballroom area.



If you have not gotten your tickets yet, please do so as soon as possible at the VHPA registration desk. Capacity is limited and we are required to guarantee the menu headcount 48 hours ahead of time.

Great entertainment has been booked, including the fabulous headliner Susan McDonald from Las Vegas, along with her patriotic show, complete with special effects and lasers.

The 17-member group "Dance Express" will perform after dinner and at our closing dance — with no breaks!

Many more surprises await you throughout the evening, but we promise, there will be no long-winded speeches.

As part of our 20th Anniversary Celebration, we also will be honoring our 66 founders.

A 15-member Scottish bagpiper group will perform as part of our opening ceremony, and the Vietnamese Military Association Honor Guard will post and retire the colors.

# ***Missing Man toast and ceremony***

## **Addressing the audience:**

Now, ladies and gentlemen, it is time for the Rite of the Missing Man Toast.

In the center of each banquet table you will see a ring of small votive candles. Beside each is a lighter. In a minute or so, we will ask each of you to light a candle, but not yet.

Near the candle is a card for each of you. Please pick up your card now. We all know why. Read the name on the card quietly to yourself. Familiarize yourself with him. Everyone knows that it might just as easily be your name there.

The name on each card is the name of your personal guest of honor at tonight's banquet. Now, please say his name. Now, say it again.

## **Addressing the Missing Man:**

*You are not forgotten; you are here with us tonight. This table near the stage in the center of the hall is set just for you. Had things been different, you might have been sitting with us, toasting, laughing, telling us just how close you came that time, and how lucky you were.*

*God, how we miss you.*

## **Addressing the audience:**

The TABLE . . . set for one . . . is small — symbolizing the loneliness we feel without you.

The TABLECLOTH is white — symbolizing the purity of their intentions and willingness to respond to their country's call to arms . . . REMEMBER!

The single ROSE in the vase reminds us of the families and loved ones of our comrades-in-arms who kept the

faith awaiting their return and forever left behind . . . REMEMBER!

The RED RIBBON tied so prominently on the vase is reminiscent of the red ribbon worn by many who bear witness to their unyielding determination to account for every one of our missing . . . REMEMBER!

A SLICE OF LEMON is on the bread plate to remind us of their bitter fate . . . REMEMBER!!

There is SALT upon the bread plate, too, symbolic of the river of tears shed by families and loved ones . . . REMEMBER!

The GLASS is inverted; they cannot toast with us this night . . . REMEMBER!!

The CHAIR is empty; they are not here . . . REMEMBER!! Our lives are incomplete because they are not here to sit with us tonight. They were there for us . . . we are still here for them.

## **Addressing the Missing Man:**

*In honoring you . . . each of you . . . all of you . . . we stand silently and face your table . . . the table where you should be sitting tonight.*

*We stand silently in your absence, silently except for the saying of your name.*

*Now each of us will light a candle in the ring of friendship on your table.*

## **Addressing the audience:**

REMEMBER . . . all of you who served with them and called them comrades, who depended upon their might and aid, and relied upon them, for surely, we have not forsaken them!

# Founders

## *VHPA to honor Original 66 at Orlando reunion*

This year marks the 20th anniversary of the formation and founding of the Vietnam Helicopter Pilots Association.

To commemorate this, the VHPA is planning to honor the 66 helicopter pilots who attended the first Reunion in Phoenix on June 15-17, 1984. This will take place at our Final Banquet Saturday night, July 5.

Little did the Original 66 know, as they met that weekend in 1984, where their efforts would lead. Their simple premise of finding the guys they flew with, renewing old friendships and getting together to enjoy the camaraderie is still the principle tenet of VHPA 20 years later.

Since the beginning of their efforts, 12,107 aviators who flew rotary-wing aircraft in Southeast Asia have been active members of our organization at one time or another.

We regret to report that 468 of these members are now

deceased. We have accounted for an additional 17,529 pilots who flew during the Vietnam era. Of these, we have obtained addresses for 13,708. Another 2,201 were killed in action and an additional 1,620 died after their tour in Vietnam without joining our association.

Overall, 29,636 of our fellow pilots have been accounted for to date by the VHPA. This leaves about 21,000 to find, which our dedicated Membership Committee is working diligently to do.

More than 20 of the Original 66 are registered to attend the reunion as of mid May. Please make plans to attend the banquet and honor our founders.

A list of the 66 helicopter pilots who helped form VHPA can be found below this article.

Unfortunately, three of our founders are no longer with us, although they will be long remembered by our association and our membership.

The July 4th Pool Party on Friday comes complete with its own 15-minute, high-powered laser and fireworks show.


It all starts at 7 p.m., with live entertainment. Beginning at 8 p.m., the fabulous party band "Tremors" performs.

The WOC Chorus sings about 8:45 p.m., and then there is the fireworks show, starting about 9:30 p.m.

How can they shoot fireworks so close to the tall buildings in a downtown area?

The answer is "precision" pyro products manufactured to a much higher standard than the typical aerial shell shot off at a local community display.

Computers control the firing



sequence and synchronize it to music.

Close off a few streets, obtain the assistance of the Orlando civic officials and Rosen Centre hotel management, hire a well-known, high-tech laser-pyro production firm to pull it all off, and there you are!

The laser show takes so much power a special generator truck has to be brought in to power it all.

There is not nearly enough electricity available in the hotel to fire up all the technology.

A number of the lasers run so hot they need to be water-cooled. The equipment being used runs very quietly and is typically used on remote movie sets.

Some 200 amps of power are

required just to run the lasers and associated technology.

Various pool foods are available on a cash basis throughout the evening. The food and the bars are deeply discounted.

When was the last time you saw a \$1 beer at a major hotel?

The party moves inside at 11 p.m., and we have continuing live entertainment in the hotel lobby until 1 a.m.

VHPA members and guests attending the reunion will have an opportunity to take one of two special tours outside the hotel:


A visit to the Kennedy Space Center or a trip to Port Canaveral to board the Sun Cruz offshore casino ship on Friday, July 4.


VHPA-chartered motor coaches will leave directly

from the breakfast area at the Rosen at promptly 11 a.m. en route to the ship, which docks at Port Canaveral, about 50 minutes away.

As of this printing, security arrangements at the dock require that your luggage be checked in with the cruise line individually (similar to how airlines operate). To our knowledge, all luggage is X-rayed, so we do not recommend you pack camera film in your bags.

The cost of the VHPA-provided champagne breakfast, the bottle of champagne or wine in your room on the ship, and motor coach transfers to and from the ship was offset by a tour conductor fee we received from the cruise line.

The cruise returns Thursday, July 10, with VHPA-arranged transportation departing the dock promptly at 9 a.m. for the Orlando airport and then back to the Rosen Centre Hotel. We estimate the bus will be at the airport about 10 a.m., and at the Rosen Centre about 10:30 a.m.

# Membership grows, but help needed

More than 19 years ago a small group of ex-Vietnam helicopter pilots met to share some thoughts about the time they spent in Southeast Asia.

What started in a local garage with a handful of pilots has grown beyond any one of the Original 66's expectations.

We currently have more than 7,300 active, dues-paying members, and the numbers keep increasing. During this reunion, we will recognize the 12,000th pilot to become a member of the VHPA.

Membership in our organization is limited. There is a "fixed" number of people eligible to join.

The challenge is to find everyone who is eligible and let them know about the VHPA.

There are two parts to this challenge.

The first is to make sure we have accounted for everyone who flew helicopters in Southeast Asia during 1961-75. We do this through our annual Membership Directory.

The second, the more exciting, is to encourage membership and participation in our annual reunions.

During the past 19 years we, as a organization, have held reunions throughout the United States. The first was in Phoenix, AZ, the last in Las Vegas, NV, and now, here in Orlando.

Attendance at these reunions has continued to grow. Part of the growth can be attributed to the growth in membership; each year we see an increasing number of new faces at our New Member Reception.

Another reason for the growth is the number of repeat attendees. Members who have experienced the thrill of seeing a face they had not seen for more than 20 years want to try and repeat that experience at another reunion.

This growth, membership and attendance at reunions can only continue if you help.

Each year, Gary Roush mans a table in the vendor area. He has card files, databases, copies of orders and much, much more. He waits for members to provide him updated information on pilots they know or knew.

Stop by; check to see if your stick buddies are listed and if their contact information is current.

Check the Membership Directory. Look to see if the names on orders you received while in Vietnam are listed. If not, let us know. Check out your flight school pictures. Are all of those in the pictures accounted for in the Directory? If not, let us know.

We have run more than 11,000 names through a search firm to find current addresses. We have another 6,000 plus names to go.

The first ones were easy, we had Social Security Account Numbers. These last batches require someone to do a physical search of records to find those who got out of the service before we transitioned from RA, US, O and NG numbers to Social Security Account Numbers.

The bottom line? The easier parts are done. Now we need you to help us complete the challenge.

If each of you updated just one name, found just one missing person, we would be able to provide our heirs with a complete accounting of those who participated as helicopter pilots in Vietnam.

## From the preface . . .

In the summer of 2001, relatives and friends from across the country gathered at our home for a family reunion. One evening during that weekend my nephews from California, men in their 30s, joined me on the porch and began asking me questions about Vietnam . . .

. . . as my words slowed down I saw, in my mind's eye, those faces again and remembered how, when I returned to the battlefield to take them out, they had changed from bright and eager to ashen and, sometimes, lifeless — their spirits gone, their bodies broken. My eyes welled up and my throat constricted; had I attempted to utter another word, I would have begun sobbing. Instead I stood up, walked into the house, and poured myself a double.

For many days after the reunion I remained puzzled and surprised at my strong emotional reaction to the story I couldn't finish. This had never happened before. On the front porch that evening in North Carolina, my nephews had unleashed an emotion that instantly dissolved 35 years and took me back to South Vietnam. That moment was the catalyst for this book. A few weeks later I began to write.

Most of the book is set in Vietnam, but there are also stories of us brand new second lieutenants learning to fly airplanes and helicopters before going to the war. It was a time of glory for us. As the aircraft we flew defied gravity, we defied fear. We had wings on our chests and a swagger in our gaits. We were aviators, pilots, fly boys. We were hot stuff and we knew it; we were invincible — at least at the beginning — and we loved life (boy did we love life), yet we challenged it each time we pushed the throttles forward. We were beautiful paradoxes, and to this day, "I was a pilot" is a statement I am proud to make.

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The main heliport at Fort Wolters was against a hillside and the tower was located on the hillside. It is still there (or at least it was last year) except it is in the "leaning rest" position.

It also had a lot of hangars and classrooms along the road, which are missing in the picture.

In 1965 and 1966, the TH-55's staged out of the Mineral Wells Airport and the OH-23's (not OH-13's) staged out of Fort Wolters. They didn't want to co-mingle the toy aircraft (TH-55's) with the real aircraft (OH-23).

I'm sure you'll get other flak from those who at least recognize the difference between the OH-13's and the OH-23's, but I have to admit, it is a lot easier to look at the Newsletter after it is published than it is to put it together. You guys do a great job. Thanks for all of your hard work!

Pre-registration was held on Friday evening poolside, however, there were already groups that had reacquainted themselves or had met that afternoon by the pool. For those that had pre-registered, packets had been made up with agendas, directories, T-shirts and name tags. There was a lot of activity at the registration desk for those that decided to come at the last minute but all were accommodated.

Friday evening was spent looking through the directory to find a particular name or names. There was a great mixture of feelings, for some to find an old friend that was on the MIA/KIA list or to find that an old friend was selling insurance, an engineer or a pilot. For some, it was the face that looked familiar across the table. After lengthy discussions, finally place that person as someone you served with in the same unit for a few days as one was returning home and the other was just starting his tour of duty.
