



They have agreed to show this excellent film to you and explain details about it. We also have great war stories each year so come and tell yours and hear those from others. Everyone of us has at least one good war story to tell. So be sure to sign up for HPFs and War Stories sessions. These sessions are all recorded on a DVD that we provide for sale each year starting in 2006. This is one of the ways we record our history. Pilots who attend one or all HPF and/or War Story sessions will receive a free DVD from the 2008 reunion. It is a \$30 value. For those of you who have never attended a reunion, these DVDs are a great way to experience part of each reunion for very low costs. They make great presents too.

As I noted in the last Aviator, we are experimenting this year with an honor bar similar to what we had in many officers' clubs in Vietnam. The center of this is self serve keg beer. The Executive Council understands that concern and has taken steps to ensure that does not happen by establishing a reunion reserve fund. This fund accumulates "profits" from reunions to use in case of a short fall in a future reunion. In other words, we are accounting for reunion activities separately from other operations to ensure that your dues do not subsidize reunions and vice versa. Both reunions and HQ activities have separate budgets and we manage them that way. This is a change from past practice.

to recognize our members for their life time achievements. Each year as I prepare the membership directory, I am struck by the wide variety of professions our members have. They range from astronaut to farmer and just about everything in between. In other words, our members are the backbone of our society. We are the sons of the "greatest generation" and in my opinion you have exceeded that greatest generation in achievement. I believe history will prove me right. We hope that this project will begin to tell the world about our life time achievements. So that the world has an opportunity to learn about the sons of the greatest generation, we will post this information on one of our web sites. Another way to look at this is that you have an opportunity to publish your obituary before you die. We hope all of you will participate.

Another change is an effort to get sponsorships (meaning donations) for specific projects. Bill "Moon" Mullen has taken this on in addition to magazine advertising. He is working hard on getting sponsorships for reunions and things like the \$5,000 software needed for the Memory Map project. Not only are we looking for outside sponsorships but also internal donations as well. All donations including your dues to the VHPA are tax deductible. If you know of a company or any individuals who would like to sponsor any of our activities, please let Moon know.

As a reminder, the online password protected membership directory at <http://www.vhpaservices.com> is now our primary directory that is included in your dues. It is updated weekly and contains e-mail addresses, phone numbers, most past newsletters and directory history sections. It also contains a full copy of the last three paper directories for you to use to print pages or just to browse. This is a major improvement over the paper directory that is obsolete by the time you receive it. If you want to receive the 2010 paper and/or CD directories in addition to the online directory, you must tell HQ before 1 September. If you take no action, you will not receive a paper directory. Since the paper

directory is now an extra product, the charge is \$10 each before 1 September. After 1 September, the charge is \$20 if there are any left. The directories are printed in September so we need to know before they are printed whether or not you want one. This applies to life members as well. The directory included free for your life membership is access to the new and improved online membership directory.

One of the things we all did routinely in Vietnam was to risk our lives for our fellow soldiers. That continues today in ways that might surprise you. In 2007, VHPA life member Lou "Rocket" Rochat experienced kidney failure. After many months of weekly painful dialysis treatments and no progression on the kidney transplant list, he put out a request for help to his 1st Cav buddies. A fellow 1/9 Cav Cobra pilot and VHPA member Ron Livingston volunteered to go through the test for a possible match. It was a near perfect match so the transplant was completed in January. Read more about this incredible story elsewhere in this magazine.

Our headquarters administration contract is up for renewal in September so we are requesting bids. It will be divided into two contracts this year which could both be done by the same company or two different companies. One service is reunion registration including online, telephone and on site registration and the second contract is everything else related to administering the VHPA. If you are aware of any companies that could do either or both of these functions, please tell a member of the EC.

Another administrative thing we do each year is have an outside CPA firm audit HQ. If you are involved with a company that does audits and think they can save us some money, please contact Secretary/Treasurer, Tom Payne with the information.

A few times each year, I scan the Social Security Death Index looking for potential and past members who have died. In January, the scan result was 211. This is disappointing from two respects. First it is disappointing that we are beginning to die at an accelerated rate and second it is disappointing that I can only find out this informa-

tion by checking a sterile database. It would be easier to take if our members were looking out for each other and keeping track of our fellow veterans. Please do not wait to learn about your friends from the past by reading that they have died. Log on to the online directory, look them up and contact them now. Don't wait until they are added to the died after tour list.

Speaking of our pending death, now is the time to write down your experiences in Vietnam and give that to the VHPA or to the Vietnam Archives at Texas Tech University. If you prefer telling about your experiences instead of writing them down, either come to a reunion and tell your stories at a War Story session or participate in the personal history projects that Texas Tech, the Reagan Library, the Library of Congress and many museums have in place. Please contribute your piece of our history before you die.

We are really pleased with the increase in chapter activities over the past couple of years thanks to the efforts of Jack Salm and many of you. Check out the chapters section in this magazine and you will see that it continues to grow. Jack is now trying to get chapters started in Hawaii and Alaska so if you live in those states and are interested, please contact Jack.

Finally your executive council and a few dedicated volunteers continue to work very hard to take the products we provide for your membership to the next level while doing our best to minimize the costs. Our hope is to someday be able to lower your dues. One of the ways to help with cost is to increase membership and one of the best ways all of you can help is to recruit new members. There are still 25,000 guys out there who have never been members. David Adams has started a new membership initiative by providing you with the opportunity to send a friend a VHPA Aviator. Send HQ \$5 and the person's name and they will send out a magazine from you. We would appreciate your help.



He's got the CH-21 nearly complete as you can see. He built it from scratch and it's virtually PRICELESS. Al and his buddies plan to display and fly some of their RC models while we are at the airport in Ramona on July 3rd!



The VHPA NEEDS A FEW GOOD MEN... By Moon Mullen, Junior Member at Large

Yes, we need a few good men to throw their hat in the ring and run for positions on the VHPA Executive Council.

The VHPA Executive Council (EC) consists of six members: past President, presiding President, VP, and three members-at-large (senior, midterm and junior). Every year an election is held to fill two positions: VP and Junior Member-at-Large. This notice fulfills VHPA policy to notify the members and to seek nominees for the VP and Junior Member at Large positions.

If you read this request each year

and you use the following excuses not to run:

- 1) not many people know me
- 2) I don't have a history of other VHPA activity
- 3) I wouldn't have a chance of getting elected

...then you can no longer use those excuses! I, Moon Mullen got elected last year and these are the same excuses I have always used! You just need to be an active VHPA member and be willing to serve.

A member can volunteer as a nominee or someone can nominate another member, although we suggest you check with the person you intend to nominate to ensure they are willing to serve.

This year I, Moon Mullen, our current Junior Member at Large, is the election coordinator. **A person must contact me in writing no later than midnight, June 15, 2010 to be nominated.** Contact may be done by email [REDACTED] or USPS mail [REDACTED] Pocono Pines, Pa 18350). A phone call will not serve as a nomination application, but you may call me for additional information (570-643-5036).

When a nomination is received, I will provide an application packet and form which must be completed and returned by the nominee. The one-page form asks basic information and can

be briefly answered. Then the names of nominees for either office will be posted to the VHPA website by June 20, 2010.

The election will take place at the Annual Business Meeting (ABM) during the 2010 reunion in San Diego. Rules for conducting the election will be provided in the application packet and any VHPA member may contact me for this information. Note: a member may attend the ABM without being registered for the reunion.

What does the EC do? We fly the organization thru VFR and IFR, thru hot LZ's and safe LZ's. We have a telephone conference call once a month to discuss and make decisions over issues concerning VHPA.

We also use email between monthly conference calls to steer us to timely decisions. I am happy to be serving as the Junior Member at Large, still surprised that you elected me and doing my best to represent you. Now, need YOU to get involved and run for office!

When elected, you will be expected to attend the reunions. Face time with other EC members, attend the ABM, and help to make sure all the reunion plans go according to plan. Since you are expected to attend the reunions, the hotel contract while you are in office, will provide you a complimentary room.

The Junior Member at Large is a three year position where each year you move up the ladder to become the midterm and then the senior member at Large. The senior member may then competitively run for VP. The VP moves up to become the President of our Association the next year and the past president the year after that.

The VHPA depends on and needs a quality EC, this election is important.....new guys, new ideas, new energy.....the VHPA needs YOU!!!!

FRIENDSHIP WALL NEAR KHE SANH WILL BE DEDICATED TO FALLEN PILOTS

1st Lt Daniel B. Cheney, recipient of the Distinguished Flying Cross, was killed in action at Hau Nghia, South Vietnam, on January 6, 1969. Daniel was serving as pilot aboard a 17thCavCobra when an OH-6 Scout crew was shot down. In a valiant and successful action to save the lives of the Scout pilot and observer, Daniel and the Cobra AC aggressively engaged the enemy but were killed instantly when their helicopter crashed due to intense enemy fire.

I never knew Daniel, but like most VHPA members I lost several good friends in action. At the Philadelphia reunion last summer, I had the honor to meet Dan's mother Rae and his sister Jerilyn. We have all dealt with grief and loss in our own way. Rae and Jerilyn have transformed theirs into a powerful and effective force for good in Vietnam's poorest Province, Quang Tri.

The idea for PeaceTrees Vietnam arose from their desire to turn sorrow into service. In 1995 when relations between our countries were normalized, Jerilyn Brusseau and Rae knew that it was time to build bridges of peace and friendship between the American and Vietnamese peoples. PeaceTrees began its work clearing mines and unexploded ordnance (UXO) from a former Marine supply base in Dong Ha and planting trees to restore the land. The site now houses a park of forty acres of trees and a landmine education center.

Over the past fifteen years PeaceTrees Vietnam has maintained its vision while broadening the scope of its work. It presently sponsors three explosive ordnance disposal (EOD) teams in Quang Tri Province. It provides accident survivor assistance and mine risk education. Its list of accomplishments as of this date includes:

- 305+ acres of land cleared
- 49,489+ ordnance items removed
- 41,150+ trees planted
- 470 participants on 34 citizen diplomacy trips
- Mine Risk Education provided for 69,000+ people
- 100 family homes, 8 libraries and 4 kindergartens built
- Assistance to 797+ UXO victims and their families

The amazing success of this small organization has led both the US and Vietnamese governments to approve a remarkable memorial to Dan Cheney—a kindergarten for non-Vietnamese speaking Van Kieu kids in Ba Nang Village, Lao Baonot too far from Khe Sanh. The school will be dedicated to his memory and the memory of his fellows.

For a short time, until this June, there is an opportunity for each of us to sponsor black granite blocks inscribed with the name of our fallen friends, to be placed into a prominent Friendship Wall in the school. Also, all contributors and friends are invited to join the opening ceremony in Lao Bao in early September.

I hope to see many of my fellow pilots at the opening ceremony in Vietnam where we can truly honor our fallen friends with a living legacy.



Fifteen years ago Gold Star Mother Rae Cheney and her daughter Jerilyn decided to transform their grief into a force for good by founding PeaceTrees Vietnam with the mission of removing unexploded ordnance in Quang Tri Province and replanting cleared areas with trees. Now, after removing over 49,000 pieces of deadly ordnance from over 305 acres of land, and planting over 41,000 trees, the US and Vietnamese governments have approved a unique memorial project- a new kindergarten school near Khe Sanh DEDICATED TO THE MEMORY OF FALLEN COBRA PILOT DAN CHENEY, killed in action January 1969.

Each of us can honor the memory of OUR fallen aviator friends by sponsoring an inscribed black granite block in their name. Each block will be built into the prominent **Friendship Wall** of the Dan Cheney school, and only **50 BLOCKS** are needed to pay the entire construction cost. 
A few months ago, Lou "Rocket" Rochat, former scout pilot for 1/9th Cavalry, 1st Cavalry Division put out a call in the blind. He was in search of a part and was doing one of the things he'd been famous for in the past. He was scrounging.

"I find myself needing to ask for something very important. I do not feel good about asking for it, but I have been pretty sick since 2007 and just like the rest of you, refused to see a doctor until I almost killed myself when I made the 2008 Flying Thunder Mission in a restored B-model Nam War Bird Huey gunship from California to "The Wall" in DC and back to California."

Rocket did not complete that mission. At the 3,700 nautical mile mark, at the Mineral Wells, TX airport (Downing Heliport), he had his wife pick him up, as he just couldn't go any further. The next day Rocket was hospitalized in San Antonio for nine days with a medical verdict of end stage kidney failure.

So now Rocket was in search of a kidney. How does one go about such a scrounging mission? Where does one start? Rocket knew. His call in the blind went out over the network of the 1st Cavalry Division via their newsletter, "Saber". Rocket had flown with the 1/9th Cavalry, 1st Cavalry Division, and he knew his best source would be the men with whom he had fought and lived during his service in Vietnam. The response was almost instantaneous, even with Rocket's qualifier that the kidney not be "pickled" from old partying habits. In true Cavalry fashion, Rocket offered trading materials if need be and also disqualified anyone whose employment would be adversely impacted by donating a kidney. Over 40 old 1/9th Cavalrymen answered the call, and that's not even counting the one where one man volunteered his ex-wife's kidney, no testing necessary.

As fortune would have it, Ron Livingston, fellow 1/9th Cavalryman and former Cobra pilot just happened to see a note sent through the Cav email channels about Lou being on dialysis and in need of a kidney. Once Ron determined that he and Lou had the same blood type, Ron was in contact with the CHRISTUS Transplant Institute (CTI) in San Antonio and they sent him a blood kit, which determined the two pilots were a possible match. After another six weeks of testing, including a three day stay in San Antonio in December for extensive testing, it was



determined that Ron was pretty much a perfect match.

More incredible is that CTI typically only takes living donors between the ages of 18-60 (Ron turned 62 on Thanksgiving Day), but because of Ron's incredible health and physical shape, they were willing to make an exception. Ron walks four to five miles a day and works out with weights and his old army calisthenics.



It turns out that Lou and Ron didn't serve together in Vietnam and really didn't even have any life and death ties from serving together in combat. Ron had finished his tour in Nam 30 days before Lou ever got there. They did know each other through unit reunions but Ron still volunteered to donate one of his kidneys. "What do you say to a man like this?" Lou said, "What do you do for him, give him, and trade him or anything else one can imagine for such a sacrifice?" Ron's response was simply "It's the right thing to do for a fellow Trooper and soldier."

So, after a few delays for medical testing, screening and preparation, Rocket received a kidney from Ron. The procedure was completed on January 13, 2010. Both Ron and Rocket were prepped and wheeled into surgery but the mission did not precede without a pre-mission photo op, complete with Cavalry Stetsons, according to Ron's wife, Bequi.

During the run up to the exchange, Ron posted the following sitrep, showing a shared sense of humor with Rocket: "I just returned from my three and a half mile walk in 20 degree temperatures, plus completed 90 sit-ups, 75 push-ups and most of the old army "daily dozen". The left kidney (Lou's) was eager to go and reluctant to stop. The right kidney (Ron's) wanted to stay in where it was warm and wait until summer to go out. We went out anyway because my days are numbered to take both of them out for their exercise. When we returned home Lou's kidney wanted a drink of water. My kidney wanted a beer. I compromised and made some fresh coffee from the Dunkin Donut coffee Ann gave us.

Lou Rochat & Ron Livingston spend a few quiet minutes talking about the upcoming surgery. Both men were watched over by a remarkable team, their pre-op nurse (Bonnie) was a kidney donor herself (to a sibling 14 years ago) and her husband is a Vietnam Veteran. Ron's surgeon is a Lt. Col. in the Air Force Reserves (medic) who loved showing everyone his numerous helicopter posters.

"Both kidneys know that in a few days they will have separate addresses but both are up to and looking forward to the challenge. Lou's kidney is ready to improve Lou's health and go on hunting and fishing trips. My kidney is a whiner but is ready to take on the duty of two kidneys as long as there is still quality beer on the menu."

According to Ron's wife, Bequi, Ron knew on that first day that this was his fate and what he needed to do and he has never faltered or looked back. It's his conviction. Bequi adds, "There is so much more to this story as well that would be great to tell! One of the underlying stories here is how these incredible veterans continue to support each other and are willing to lay down their own lives 30-40 years later. That says it all! What a great story to share with new soldiers."

What a great story indeed. We've all heard the platitudes; "The army takes care of its own" and hundreds more. But this is the spirit that binds us all put into action.

Undoubtedly both families have insurance, but there are also many expenses that insurance does not cover, like travel expenses, lodging and meals. Both families had to travel from their respective homes to San Antonio to make this happen. CHPA has teamed with the 1/9th Cavalry Association to establish a fund to help cover these costs. ** HPF Fee: Only one \$20 admission fee is required PER FAMILY to attend any or all sessions of the WSC and HPF events. Each family will receive a free DVD of last year's HPF/WSA presentations (a \$30 value).

Reconnect with your own Mini-Reunion or TOC at San Diego

VHPA members should keep in mind that one of the primary reasons for our reunions is to reconnect with past compatriots from your RVN unit and flight school. The best way to meet up with unit members is to schedule your own mini-reunion. If your unit does not have a mini-reunion, why not take the initiative to start one up, or you could combine with other sister units you are familiar with if you wish. We have also had mini-reunions for such areas as flight classes, tandem rotor, Dust-off, Operation Lam Son 719, and the Vietnam Pilot's Cross Stitch and Cross Dressers' Club (OK – I made up this last one).

The webpage from the VHPA website where you can go to schedule a mini-reunion or to see what units are signed up is <http://www.vhpareunion.org/minireunion.htm>. Mini-Reunions are typically scheduled in 4-hour blocks and are available for booking on most days during the reunion. If slots are filled (sold out) for set-aside rooms, you can still schedule a mini-reunion during these periods if you provide your own room. Mini-reunion meeting rooms can have audio-visual equipment, but you must request it.

A group may request a second four-hour block for a mini-reunion. However, this second block will be granted on a space available basis with priority for the particular space given to units requesting only one block. Use the "Comments" section of the mini-reunion scheduler to request a second block and for AV equipment. Keep in mind that mini-reunion rooms are not to be used as TOCs (continuous hangouts).

Finally, once you schedule a mini-reunion, your unit and contact info will appear in the slot on the webpage. However, you still should make an effort to get the word out to your buds. Use your directory to contact members (encourage them to re-up with the

VHPA if they are not current), write a short article for the VHPA Aviator, post notes at the reunion message board, and schedule early so we can list your unit in articles such as this. In that regard, several units have mini-reunions every year, which we encourage (e.g., 175th AHC, 48th AHC Blue Stars, 229, AHB 1st Cav, 192nd AHC, F Troop 4th Cav, 7/17th Cav, HHC 3 Bde 1st Cav (Snoopy), and the 361st ACE/AWC Panthers).

We expect lots of entities to schedule mini-reunions at SD, so check the webpage and get your own reconnection going on ASAP to get the best times! Unit TOCs: If you have a big group that you know are coming (say approx. 20 registrants), then we invite you to schedule a TOC. TOCs will provide a room for all day several days for the group. So, this is like a super mini-reunion. There are limits on AV equipment due to cost, but the group can bring anything they desire (well almost anything) into the room (food beverages, AV stuff, displays, etc.). Contact Mike Law directly to schedule a TOC.

NON-VHPA Member Attendees: This year we encourage VHPA members to invite other non-members to attend the reunion. Non-members may register on their own and will be given a number that will give them the same access members have except the Annual Business Meeting. Of course, anyone could add a non-member as a guest for registration as well. We encourage this so you can broaden your mini-reunion or TOC with other enlisted and officer members who were not pilots. Registration costs are the same for everyone. So, why not expand your group and make this the best reunion ever!

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HISTORIC PRESENTATIONS AND WAR STORY CONTEST

at San Diego Reunion

Here is an update on what we have planned for the Historic Presentation Forum (HPF) and the War Story Contest (WSC) at the San Diego Reunion. This year we have two sessions of HPF planned. One of our historic presentations will be a series of videotapes of a UH-1 preflight and starting procedure film, followed by two videos of speeches provided by Gary Roush and Jim Fulbrook at ceremonies where the Vietnam helicopter pilots and the UH-1 were recognized on Veterans Day 2009 and in a special UH-1 retirement ceremony in October 2009. These films are all well done and a DVD of them along with electronic documents such as the -10, UH-1 checklist and more will be available to purchase.

Another HPF will consist of a 50-minute documentary titled, "Vietnam Firefight." This documentary provides a re-enactment of a rescue that VHPA members Jack Swickard, Larry Liss, Tom Baca and Kenneth Nolan conducted in Vietnam. These members will be there to introduce the film and answer questions. Tom Marshall will be back to present again this year. Tom is a VHPA member and the author of a very successful book on 'Nam called Price of Exit. Tom's HPF session will present some really incredible video footage gathered and edited from the DoD Media Archives. This year's film will focus on the Battle at Fire Support Base Ripcord (near the A Shau valley), which took place in July 1970 between the 101st Screaming Eagles and a large North Vietnamese Army force.

We also have a couple of other speakers pending. Look for updates in the next issue of the Aviator. In another article in this issue, we point out that our annual luncheon speakers will be Ron Bower and Jim McLaughlin (both VHPA members). Jim and Ron have developed an interactive digital map called "The Vietnam Memory Map." Think Google Earth and more on this, a sure crowd pleaser. We are also looking to add another session with a speaker who will discuss Veterans benefits, Agent Orange issues, and things such as that.

This year we will have two sessions of the War Story Contest (WSC). Doug Womack will MC the first session again with such headliners as Mike Sheuerman and the usual suspects who will entertain us with their "This ain't no sh_t stories" about the 'Nam. Mike S. will then MC the second WSC for more fun and frivolity. This year one of these sessions will be set up as a contest between units where each unit will put forward 3 or 4 members to entertain us with their stories and then we will select the best unit for some type of "prestigious reinforcement and re cognition device." If we get two units, 4 will speak. If 3 or more units sign up, then 3 members from each unit will tell their stories in 10 minutes or less per speaker. Call Jim to sign up your unit ASAP.

Note that when you register this year there is a one-time charge of \$20.00 for the VHPA member to attend one or all of the HPF and WSC events. In addition, for your \$20, each registered member will receive a free copy of the DVD of last year's HPF/WSC events - 7 hours of really good stuff from Philly. The DVD is a \$30 value, so don't get your Nomex panties in a wad over the cost here because we need to cover AV and costs on these events. Please notice that any guests registered for the reunion will be admitted free to any of these events, so bring them along. Ok, we put these events together to entertain and inform you and your family/guests. GETTING THERE AND GETTING AROUND

REUNION HOTEL: The San Diego Marriott Hotel & Marina, 333 West Harbor Drive, San Diego, CA 92101 619-234-1500. By agreement between the hotel and the VHPA, we are using the Passkey System to make, modify and cancel hotel reservations. It is important to know that calls directly to the hotel or any of Marriott's regular toll free reservations numbers result in the caller being asked to use the Passkey toll free number. There are two ways to use Passkey:

VICINITY AROUND THE HOTEL: The hotel is sandwiched between the San Diego Convention Center and the Hyatt hotel. West Harbor Drive is to the front and a large marina to the rear protected by the embarcadero. The hotel Concierge provides a walking map to the famous Gaslamp Quarter and to Seaport Village on the embarcadero. Literally there are more than 100 restaurants, shops and a Ralph's grocery store within walking distance from the hotel. You will receive a San Diego Visitor's Guidebook that has details for the area. If you are not into walking you can also ride in a Pedal Cabs or take The San Diego Trolley (light rail system), Convention Center Station is immediately in front of the hotel.

■ Hertz has special rates from June 23 through July 12. Cars can be picked up from any corporate Southern California location (including the Marriott's lobby) and returned to any other Southern California location! Use hertz.com or 800-654-2240 and the CV# **022L2989**.

Airport to Hotel: The airport is 3.1 miles from the hotel. The hotel

does not provide shuttle service. For less than \$10 you can take a taxi or for even less than that a shuttle van to the hotel. The VHPA arranged for a group discount via Cloud 9/SuperShuttle, you can go to www.supershuttle.com and use the group code **PXE6Z** or call 800-258-3826. Book your ride, get your luggage and take the sky bridge or cross walk over to the ground transportation islands. Look for the blue overhead sign that reads 'Shuttles for Hire.' Show the driver your reservation with the discount. Warning – the drivers MAY GET snippy with you if you just walk up and demand the discount...so call or use the website.

Hotel to Airport: If you didn't book your return trip via Cloud 9/SuperShuttle, check with the Concierge Desk or the Bell Captains at the front door for the van schedule. They run about every 15 minutes and cost about \$7 per person.

Amtrak to/from Hotel: The Santa Fe Amtrak Station (also known as the America Plaza Transfer Station for the San Diego Light Rail system) is less than one mile from the hotel. From the Santa Fe Station you can take a taxi, shuttle, or Light Rail Orange Line train two stops to the Convention Center Station that is immediately in front of the hotel.

Parking: **WARNING!!** Overnight hotel parking is \$22 per night for self-parking and \$32 for valet. Parking near the hotel is less but not by much. Even the SoCal members don't have a cheaper answer to this challenge.

RV Parking: Recommend starting with the Mission Bay RV Resort. Go to www.missionbayrvresort.com or call 858-270-4300. Their park is about 8 miles away.

Power Scooter: For anyone wishing to rent a power scooter, wheel chair, etc. while you are in San Diego. Please call 888-441-7575 or www.scootaround.com/rentals/s/sandiego/.

Tours and Buses: Unless otherwise noted all tours begin at the 'coach loading point' near the fountain in front of the hotel. Exit the front door of the hotel, take a left and walk down the hill. The Fountain is on your right and the bus loading point is in the parking lot access driveway before you reach Harbor Drive.

USS Midway Audio Tour I: Buses leave from the bus loading point (near the fountain on Harbor Drive) at 12:30 a.m. return to the hotel about 5:00 p.m. This self-guided audio tour of the USS Midway offers 25 restored aircraft and 60 exciting exhibits from the powerful engine room to the Conning Tower & Bridge. She was firing Tomahawk Missiles during the Liberation of Kuwait and now the USS Midway begins her tour of duty in the San Diego waterfront area. One of the true icons of the U.S. Navy in the latter half of the 20th century, she is a modern marvel. This is the most modern warship available for general touring today. You will take a look back at the history of America's longest serving Aircraft Carrier through many of the museum exhibits. The Midway Museum tour is a self guided audio tour which allows you to tour at your own pace. Elevator access is available to 75% of the exhibits. The tour will take you through the hanger deck and up onto the flight deck. There is a gift shop and café on-board.

Harbor Sightseeing Cruise: Buses leave from the bus loading point (near the fountain on Harbor Drive) at 3:45 p.m. and return to the hotel about 6:45 p.m. Enjoy a 2-hour, fully narrated, harbor tour, including Harbor & Shelter Islands, Point Loma, Cabrillo National Monument, North Island Naval Air Station, the Submarine Base, the Coronado Bridge & much more. Board your yacht and embark on a 2-hour Harbor Tour. This is a fully narrated tour, which passes by awesome Naval Bases (there are usually warships in port), the munitions bunkers, and attack helicopters. You will also sail under the Coronado Bridge, to Point Loma to see the Cabrillo Monument. Snacks, drinks and bathrooms are all available on-board.

USS Midway: Remember rule #1 – Bring a jacket because it is cool on the flight deck when the sun goes down. Remember rule #2 – We are going to time sequence the bus loading at the hotel to avoid all 1,000 of us standing in line. *The plan is to issue a bus loading ticket AND a Midway boarding ticket.* We'll provide more details on these two tickets later. - VHPA Founder, Larry Clark, plans to bring a newly restored HA(L)-3 Seawolf UH-1B to the Reunion. If at all possible Larry will also land this UH-1B on the Midway, so we could have two Hueys landing during the program.
- A special program featuring Navy helicopter pilots who flew in and off Vietnam during the war.
- A BBQ meal cooked on the flight deck. There will be several serving areas to minimize waiting in line. Cash bars.



Some of the other options include the Museums of Art, Photography, International Culture, San Diego History, Automotive, Sports, Model Railroad, Natural History, the Science Center, Japanese Friendship Garden and much more. This is the "Smithsonian Museum of the west". Be sure to stop by the visitor's center, which includes an exceptional gift shop featuring regional maps, books, apparel, and much more. You will be provided a list of available museums, as well as a tram map to help you plan your day. The park offers restaurants for lunch on your own. The motor coach will depart from the Air & Space Museum at 4:00pm to return to the hotel.

San Diego Zoo I: Buses leave from the bus loading point (near the fountain on Harbor Drive) at 9:30 a.m. and return to the hotel about 4:30 p.m. San Diego Zoo is home to many rare and intriguing creatures from nearly every region of the world. With more than 4,000 animals representing 800 species, the zoo is home to a diverse collection of animals, many of which are rarely seen at other zoos. Spend the day at the famous San Diego Zoo, where you will have plenty of time to visit some of the most popular attractions, as well as personal places of interest. Don't miss Mei Sheng, the second baby panda born at the San Diego Zoo, this is truly one of the most unique and most beloved species on the planet - and very few are ever seen outside their native habitat in northern China. Don't miss the zoo's Absolutely Apes exhibit, where you will see eye to eye with the gorillas, and the expansive rain forest habitat, where orangutans and siamangs live and play together just like in the wild. Your zoo pass includes the 40-minute narrated tour on a double-decked bus, covering about seventy-five percent of the Zoo. Your tour ticket also includes use of the Express Bus, double or single-decked buses that allow guests to hop on and off at five different stops throughout the Zoo. The Express Bus passes by the designated stops every 20 minutes or less and is great for quick transportation to the different exhibits. You may also take an "airborne" shortcut over the treetops. This aerial transportation also offers a spectacular view of the Zoo and surrounding Balboa Park. The Zoo offers many restaurants for lunch on your own. USS Midway Audio Tour II: This is the same tour that is described as occurring on Thursday, July 1st **EXCEPT** that this tour departs from the bus loading point (near the fountain on Harbor Drive) at 10:45 a.m. and returns to the hotel about 2:15 p.m. **Private Luncheon Cruise:** A special private 2-hour lunch cruise on San Diego Bay. Board your luxury yacht at the Marriott Hotel's dock at 11:30 a.m. and embark on a narrated cruise featuring an all you can eat lunch buffet. You will return to the hotel about 2:15 p.m. Enjoy the afternoon on board a beautiful re-created turn-of-the-century coastal steamer, with luxurious interiors and spacious salons. Jim Hardy Clary

Jim H. Clary passed away on Jan. 11, 2010. He was 70. Jim was born on Sept. 23, 1939, in Plainview, Texas, the second son of Arthur and Gladys Clary. In 1941, the family moved from Plainview to Lubbock and established residence on 22nd Street, on a block west of what was then College Avenue. He then entered Texas A&M University and in 1962, he received a Bachelor of Science degree in Agricultural Economics.

While attending A&M, Jim was a member of the Aggie Corps of Cadets and upon graduation, he received a commission as a 2nd Lieutenant of Infantry in the U.S. Army. His first military assignment was with the 82nd Airborne Division at Fort Bragg, N.C. He served

as a rifle platoon leader. During this period, he led his platoon on 16 parachute jumps, including one of the largest peace time military airborne maneuvers in U.S. history, Operation Swift Strike. After 12 months at Fort Bragg, Jim entered the Army's Officer Rotary Wing Flight Training Program. He earned his Army Aviator wings in 1964. His flight class (64-3) was the first Army Aviator class to be assigned, as a class, to Vietnam.

Jim spent two, one-year tours of duty in Vietnam, where he amassed over 1,000 hours of combat flying time, the majority of which was in helicopter gunships. In 1964, Jim participated in the Battle of the La Drang Valley, made famous by the Mel Gibson movie, Once We Were Soldiers, and Young. In 1968, Jim flew virtually around the clock during the Tet Offensive. For his efforts in Vietnam, Jim was awarded the Silver Star, the Distinguished Flying Cross with Oak Leaf Cluster, the Vietnamese Cross of Gallantry, the Air Medal with 23 Oak Leaf Clusters and 2 "V" devices, the Bronze Star and the Army Commendation Medal. Jim was one of the first Army Aviators to fly the Huey Cobra Gunship in combat; he separated from the service in 1971 with the rank of Major.

As a civilian, Jim established and operated an agricultural irrigation business in West Texas for nine years. In 1980, he entered the financial services industry, where he spent the next 28 years distinguishing himself as an Investment Advisor and Certified Financial Planner. During this time, Jim received numerous awards and designations. His accomplishments provided Jim and his beloved wife of 33 years, Sue, the opportunity to travel to many desirable domestic locations and numerous international sites such as Brazil, Venezuela, Switzerland, Spain and Canada.

During his active career, Jim served a three-year term as a board member of Lubbock's Better Business Bureau. He was a member of The Former Students Association at Texas A&M, The Aggie Club, Lubbock A&M Club, Texas Tech's Red Raider Club, The Chancellor's Council at Texas Tech and The West Texas Museum Association.

For the 14 years prior to his retirement in May 2008, Jim was the owner and principal of Clary Securities, LLC, a Broker/Dealer and Clary Asset Management, LLC, a Registered Investment Advisor.

Jim is survived by his wife Sue. They were married Aug. 10, 1976. Jim is also survived by his sons from a previous marriage, Scott of San Antonio, David and Ross of Houston, and Stephen of Dallas. John Parry

John graduated Flight School with class 68-29 and served two tours in Vietnam. From 1968 to 1969 he flew with the 61st Assault Helicopter Company under the callsign Lucky Star 49. From 1971-1972 he flew with the 362nd Assault Support Helicopter Company under the call sign United 14 and with the 180th Assault Support Helicopter Company under the callsign Big Windy 49.

He is survived by his wife Loy of 17 years.

Burial with full Military Honors was held in Memorial Oaks cemetery in Houston, Texas.

John Rendell Braddon

John Rendell Braddon, 80, a Marine pilot whose 1964 rescue of downed helicopter crews in Vietnam resulted in the award of the Silver Star medal, died Dec. 11 of heart disease at Capital Hospice in Arlington. He lived in Fairfax County.



Col. Braddon, then a major, was maintenance officer of a Marine helicopter squadron and was assigned to pilot one of the rescue units during the U.S. military insertion of more than 400 South Vietnamese soldiers into the Viet Cong stronghold of Do Xa in the country's central highlands.

The April 27, 1964, operation was just underway when a South Vietnamese air force fighter pilot, Pham Van Hoa, crashed and became trapped in his burning aircraft. Maj. Braddon landed under heavy fire, dashed to Pham's A-1 Skyraider and dragged Pham to the Marine helicopter, which had been damaged. He then flew Pham to safety in Quang Ngai. The Marine returned to the battle and landed his helicopter to evacuate the crew of a U.S. helicopter that had crashed in the same vicinity.

"We took a lot of fire and our bird had many holes," then-Maj. Braddon later wrote. "As I lifted from the zone . . . I noticed that some of the electrical components were not working and there were new terrible sounds coming from the engine component. . . . We determined that one of the 50 cal. rounds had gone through us end to end and taken out the firewall junction box causing the electrical problems. Another round had put a hole in the exhaust system which accounted for the new engine noise. I finally decided that except for some electrical damage and exhaust problems, I still had a bird whose engine was

developing satisfactory power, the transmission and drive trains were intact and we had radios, we were ready to rejoin the mission."

He rescued the crew of a second South Vietnamese helicopter that had gone down, and that crew placed its heavy guns in firing positions at the windows of the Marine helicopter. "Those big guns, firing those big rounds out of the aircraft, bounced my flight helmet up and down on my head," Maj. Braddon reported.

His "conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity in action," flying into concentrated automatic weapons fire, and his lack of hesitation in doing his duty were noted in his Silver Star citation.

John Rendall Braddon was born in New York on Oct. 19, 1929. He graduated from Ohio State University in 1952. After college, he joined the Marine Corps and served a short active-duty tour in Korea. He was designated a naval aviator in 1954 and served in the Marines' fighter, attack, photographic and electronic reconnaissance groups, as well as helicopter squadrons. He was an instrument flight instructor and took part in air-to-air missile tests at the Naval Missile Center at Point Mugu, Calif., and served with the Naval Air Systems Command.

Col. Braddon served two tours in Vietnam, in 1964 and in 1969. During the second tour, he was operations officer of a Marine aircraft group and commanding officer of a Marine fighter attack squadron.

In addition to the Silver Star, his military awards included the Legion of Merit, the Distinguished Flying Cross, the Bronze Star and two awards of the Air Medal.

After he retired from the military in 1976, Col. Braddon became an agent for New York Life Insurance, where he qualified for the Million Dollar Roundtable and was elected to the board of the D.C. Life Underwriters Association. He retired from that job in 1997, and for the next two years, he worked for the Fairfax County public schools, first as a substitute teacher and then as a full-time special education teacher. He also volunteered for and was president of Mended Hearts, a support group for people undergoing open-heart surgery.

Col. Braddon was volunteering for the Smithsonian Institution as a docent at the National Air and Space Museum's Udvar-Hazy Center, near Dulles Airport, when he met Quang X. Pham, the son of the Vietnamese pilot that Col. Braddon had rescued in 1964. Pham, himself a Marine helicopter pilot who served in the Persian Gulf, wrote about his father and the rescue in "A Sense of Duty: My Father, My American Journey" (2005).

Survivors include Col. Braddon's wife of 57 years, Jean Anne Lipani Braddon of Fairfax County; four children, John D. Braddon of Fairfax County, Virginia R. Braddon of Fairfax City, David K. Braddon of Frederick, Colo., and Tracy N. Braddon of Clifton; a brother; and two grandchildren.

Joseph B. Duncan

Joseph B. Duncan passed away Sunday, Dec. 20, 2009, from complications cancer at his home near Lake Whitney, Texas. Joe graduated from flight school with class 68-32 and flew with D troop, 3/5th Air Cav from 1969-1970 under the callsign War Wagon 19.



Army buddies from across the nation are expected to attend Mr. Duncan's Dallas service, said former Vietnam helicopter pilot Bob Schultz of Euless.

"I've never heard one single human being – over the last 45 years – who ever said anything negative about Joe," Mr. Schultz said. "He was never down. You couldn't get the man to say anything bad about anybody; you couldn't get the man to complain about the weather."

While Mr. Duncan sometimes flew heavily armed Cobra attack helicopters in Vietnam, he was piloting a smaller scout helicopter June 25, 1969, when he came upon two American infantry platoons pinned down and battling a superior force of Viet Cong.

"My brother Joe brought his helicopter over the enemy position into a hover and threw hand grenades out the door of the helicopter down on the Viet Cong," said Roger Duncan of Tucson, Ariz. "His helicopter was being hit by the Viet Cong fire. He continued to do that until the American troops were able to disengage." He was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross for that action and went on to receive the Bronze Star with Oak Leaf Cluster, the Army Commendation Medal with Oak Leaf Cluster and 37 Air Medals for his hours in combat.

"He was quiet and friendly," his brother said. "He was loyal to his friends. He has had friends since his Army days. They are very close."

"He liked to live a simple life," his brother added. "He liked Texas. He liked playing golf with his friends."

He served in Vietnam before being transferred to Fort Wolters near Mineral Wells, Texas, where he was an Army helicopter instructor. He was discharged from the Army as a captain in August 1974. Mr. Duncan settled in Dallas, where he was a sales manager for Glazer's, the wine and spirits distributor.

He retired several years ago and moved to the Lake Whitney area.

In addition to his brother, Mr. Duncan is survived by another brother, Bruce Duncan of Milton, W.Va.

He was the Distinguished Honor Graduate of the Air Cavalry/Attack Helicopter Commanders Training Course, Ft. Knox, Kentucky. He also served in Germany prior to his separation from the service. Rhett was a Lifetime Member of the Bullwhip Squadron 1/9 1st Cavalry Air Mobile and the Vietnam Helicopter Pilot's Association.

Rhett's military awards and decorations include: The National Defense Service Medal, Vietnam Service Medal, Vietnam Campaign Medal, Army Commendation Medal with "V" one oak leaf cluster, Air Medal with 34 oak leaf clusters, Air Medal with "V" three oak leaf clusters, Bronze Star, Purple Heart with two oak leaf clusters, Distinguished Flying Cross with two oak leaf clusters, and the Silver Star. Rhett was also awarded the Parachutist Badge and Senior Army Aviator Wings.

Rhett is survived by his loving and devoted wife of 41 years, Deborah Brandon Lewis; his beloved son, David Alan Meredith and wife Debbie and numerous family members and friends. Rhett was predeceased by his beloved son, Bradley Wayne Lewis, who was tragically killed in an automobile accident at the age of 24.

Rhett Lewis is also survived by many fellow troopers and friends of the 1/9th Cav. As one of those troopers, I am finding it difficult to say farewell. Rhett was my roommate in Vietnam, my co-pilot, and my lifelong friend since the day

If anyone had The Right Stuff, he had it. He was a patriot all of his life, and often said that the proudest thing he ever did was to serve with the 1/9 Cav.

Rhett's love for his wife and children was unparalleled. He also treasured his extended family, friends, his home, and his pets. He lived a full life of both joy and tragedy. All who kept in touch with him in later years can attest to the heartbreak that he and his wife, Debbie, endured with the loss of one of their sons, Bradley, in a tragic car accident several years ago. Surviving this was Rhett's greatest challenge... greater than surviving the war.

It is always difficult to say goodbye, so I will simply say, "Farewell, my friend....for now," to my soul mate and best buddy, Rhett Lewis.

Graveside services are planned for Thursday, April 8, 2010 at 11 a.m. in Arlington National Cemetery, Arlington, Va., with full Military Honors. He will be buried there on the same day as Michael Martin, our fellow C Trooper and friend.

Dear Mike,

This poem arrives at a very special moment in my life. You are a good friend that I lost track of for 23 years and I have just read in two of my Vietnam and Combat Helicopter associations that just before Christmas 2009 you had flown your final mission on this earth.

Your father was my senior TAC officer and a Medal of Honor recipient—Mike Novosel Sr.

You and your Dad were the only father and son Dust Off pilots to serve in the same unit at the same time during Vietnam. You both had the extreme privilege of saving each other's

lives one week apart when each of you was shot down.

I got to know you, Mike Jr., while at the advanced course in 1983 and then in Korea you would come to my unit and stay in my room on weekends and remember your dad in stories of war and peace. We shared the tears and the laughs of memories we hoped no one would ever have to live again. You both died of the same type of cancer one Short Tour apart.

The Commanding General of Ft Rucker flew to your side and presented the Medal of Honor flag to you in honor of your father just 30 hours prior to your death.

There was no news of any national coverage of your death. There wasn't any local news coverage at your home in Florida either. But I don't want you to think that no one noticed your passing.

Thanks my friend for your dedication to these United States of America.

RE: The article "Interesting New Development" in the VHPA Aviator where you talked about the "Kobb Etchell's effect."

Actually the "Kobb Etchell's Effect" has been known in aviation since the early days of flight. The static electricity that forms around the spinning prop or on the wings is properly called "St. Elmo's Fire" and it has been observed under varying conditions since the first days of Aviation. In aircraft, it occurs in storms or dusty conditions. I observed it on the props of a U8 between St Louis and Ft. Worth in 1977 when Hersh Reynolds and I were flying in thin dust at alti-

tude above a huge dust storm. The prop surface and small particles created a static glow.

'Here is what Wikipedia has to say about St. Elmo's Fire:

"Physically, St. Elmo's fire is a bright blue or violet glow, appearing like fire in some circumstances, from tall, sharply pointed structures such as lightning rods, masts, sensible spires and chimneys, and on aircraft wings. St. Elmo's fire can also appear on leaves, grass, and even at the tips of cattle horns. Often accompanying the glow is a distinct hissing or buzzing sound."

And further more, some of us even read about it in our flight school text hand outs. It is certainly nothing "New".



For all those who flew H-23s and H-13s in Vietnam – your ship has FINALLY come in! After years of begging and begging for "little bird" photos and stories, about five guys responded this past year. What we've published will put a smile on your face FOR SURE!

I am also pleased to report that we were FINALLY (after about a 5-year quest) able to publish photos of the first USMC twin-engine Cobras, the AH-1Js, that served in Vietnam as well as photos of

the rare USN UH-1Ls. These "successes" all started because someone sent us the only photo he had of an AH-1J and we were able to put it with another guy's "only photo" and then work with our Pop-A-Smoke friends to get another here and another there. The resulting collage is the collective effort of about six or seven guys. The same thing happened with our Seawolf friends – the USN guys who flew Hueys in the Delta. There were only eight UH-1Ls initially procured by the Navy during the Vietnam Era. All of them saw action in Vietnam; six were damaged or destroyed. Again the collective effort of few helped add to the legacy the VHPA leaves the world by publishing these photos and stories.

U.S. ARMY AVIATION IN VIETNAM, BY WAYNE MUTZA is his newest book in a series of excellently written and richly illustrated books on aircraft that he has written over the years. The book takes us through the history of the airborne concept and includes every helicopter type and weapons system that was deployed, even briefly, in RVN. Many of these photos were provided by VHPA members and include combat damage shots. For you dual rated types Mutza has included every airplane that served there some of which I didn't know were in the Army inventory. The photographs are amazing and really make this book worth getting your hands on.

BOOK REVIEWS


John Penny, a VHPA Life Member, served with A/377 and is semi-retired from his career as a helicopter pilot, and teacher. He lives in Ellensburg, WA, with his beloved wife of 31 years, Janet.

MISSIONS OF FIRE AND MERCY BY WILLIAM E. PETERSON is the story of his time as a Huey crew chief with C/227th Assault Helicopter Battalion (Ghost Riders), 1st Air Cavalry in 67/68. The title refers to the dual role of providing covering fire power in hot LZs and snatching troops, sometimes wounded and dying from those same LZs. He has done a great job of bringing together the lives, losses, and trials faced by crew chiefs on the Ghost Riders' missions. Every mission is defined by a mutual trust; these young men put their lives in our young hands and we in turn did the same. Many of us owe our lives to their courage and dedication under difficult conditions. This book recounts those days long ago, when together, we mounted up to face danger and uncertainty.

Peterson's story follows his path from small town America to becoming a combat crew chief in much the same way as many of us would talk about our own path to a helicopter cockpit. He was bored by school, wanted to do something different, and had "a lack of adventure" in his life. The Army had just the job for him. And what a job it was: cleaning and maintaining his assigned "bird" 24/7, flying heart pounding missions day and night, getting "busy" with the door gun when needed, forever filling sand bags at base camp, and pulling perimeter night guard duty just to name a few. But he was also closely involved in taking care of those who came aboard his Huey: the "grunts" being dropped off and picked up, and the wounded, the dying, and the dead.


This story interweaves the author's own narratives and recollections with his own letters home while in Vietnam. Fortunately, his father saved these letters which provide a chronicle of intense combat during his tour with C/227th. These letters provide the reader an intimate view of what Peterson was thinking at the time including; the fears, sorrows, and doubts he and his fellow aircrrew members experienced as they prepared for and flew their missions.

Peterson notes that it has taken him 40 years to get around to telling his story and states "... it is finally "OK" to let it all out." He encourages other Vietnam vets to do the same as "a good way to get it out of your system." He says that "My survivor guilt, nightmares, and flashbacks have helped me to write more vividly." This he has certainly done.

ONE HELL OF A RIDE BY COLONEL (RET) WILLIAM C. HAPONSKI is the aptly titled memoir of his time in Vietnam in command of the 1st Squadron, 4th Cavalry (the "QuarterCav"), an armored cavalry squadron, and its attached units also known as Task Force Haponski. Well researched and uniquely written, it presents accounts of some of the most intense fighting of the war in and around the Michelin Plantation, Route 13 (Thunder Road), and the Iron Triangle. Col. Haponski has put together a compelling narrative of the combat situation he faced in his AO and the consequences of that combat in the voices of the French forces that preceded him, the soldiers of the NVA, his troopers, and the Vietnamese who were left behind.


We are all aware the French had been in most of the AOs we operated in: reminders of their influence in Vietnam were everywhere. Col. Haponski provides an excellent review of the French operations in his AO and their problems. He notes with regret, this history "...should have mattered to those at high levels of government and military, and mattered a lot." He is not shy about his criticism of "the higher ups" for forcing him to use inappropriate tactics and resources. Col. Haponski's descriptions of Task Force Haponski's battles are an engaging reading experience. His unique minute by minute descriptions of the action using the voices of the participants, including members of the NVA forces, gives perspective to the combat and lays bare the emotions of the men involved.

To tell this story, Col. Haponski draws upon his own personal experiences, interviews with the troopers and soldiers of his unit and some 15,000 pages of documents from the National Archives. The documents include translations of original NVA histories and original French material. The extensive research and scholarship Col. Haponski has put into writing this book is outstanding and reflects his academic life as college professor and Ph.D. It will be an outstanding resource for future researchers and history buffs. However, make no mistake; this is a compelling account and by no means a "stuffy" read.

Col. Haponski's final chapter shares his postwar return journey to Vietnam. His description of the areas where he and the QuarterCav fought are very interesting but his reunion with a Vietnamese family and their daughter he had helped in a small village north of Bien Hoa is particularly touching. Expecting the worst, he was surprised to find the family doing well and the young girl now a successful and happy mother and wife. Col. Haponski, a dedicated and sensitive leader who respected his enemies, has written and dedicated this book to the men of Task Force QuarterCav.




