





Understanding Executive Council Duties

I wish to thank those of you who have placed your name into candidacy for the coming 2011 Executive Council (EC) election. Along with your declaration, you have asked some great questions regarding EC duties that all VHPA members may find interesting.

Simply put, the Executive Council determines the very best way to keep the organization goal-focused, effective, and responsive to our members. The mission covers a wide area of member interests: the annual reunion, the VHPA Aviator Magazine, the Membership Directory, our military history preservation efforts, the annual calendar and VHPA website and links.

The EC's major priorities include ensuring the Association's funds are efficiently employed, sustained and protected, and finding ways to keep the magazine, directory, HQ administration and annual reunion costs reasonable and within the means of our membership. A strong sense of custodial mission in regards to the VHPA legacy is always present, and is reflected in the careful approach used to approve requests for VHPA name and logo use.

The EC mission is extraordinary in many ways. The EC must look forward to prepare VHPA products, services, and reunion activities that enhance the bond of our individual and common Vietnam experiences, and it must look backward to record the wartime events that gave reason for its existence; ironically, the EC must also consider the VHPA's eventual ending and legacy as our group ages and passes into history.

Although individual EC members reside across the nation, specific VHPA functions are addressed through a monthly conference call meeting, and by daily e-mails between individuals that are copied to all. We dis-

cuss each forthcoming reunion—the most time consuming effort of the VHPA EC, indeed—with attention to the smallest details (location, administration, facilities, venue, activities, reunion logo, etc.).

Surprisingly, the diversity of opinion within the council membership often leads to a greater discussion of concise details than one would expect—and that's a good thing. Frequently a proposed "great idea" is brought forward by one individual for consideration, and then frequently refined into a "better idea" through evaluation and discussion by other members possessing different perspectives. The final solution is always derived by consensus building within the EC to achieve the best solution for our association.

During my time on the council, I have observed the EC leadership strive to ensure specific mission focus is sustained and not distracted by individual or partisan efforts that would divert the VHPA from its clear and honorable purpose. This is extraordinarily important to the continued unity and wellbeing of our organization, and should be a rightful point of pride for all us.

Are Executive Council efforts challenging? Yes. Are they daunting? No. I am confident the next successful candidate elected to the EC as Junior Member-At-Large will find the leadership is efficiently getting the work done (Special note: we should all be grateful that the majority of EC members are happily retired and willing to do the needed and important grunt work).

In advance of July's annual membership meeting in Orlando, I thank you for volunteering your time and talents to aviator members of the Vietnam Helicopter Pilot Association.

The Shadows of Men - Documentary -



BOOK REVIEWS

DUBIOUS HONOR:
The Story of a Huey Driver by
VHPA member D.E. Wheeler.


It is the story of his 68-69 tour with the 71st AHC (Rattlers and Firebirds) based at Chu Lai, RVN. It is an intensely personal and detailed memoir that takes you from Wheeler's youth in the LA area to the cockpit of a Huey in combat and beyond. It is also about young men "proving" themselves in a stressful environment in which they know that some of them will not survive.

Wheeler's journey to the cockpit is one well known to us. At "loose ends" after high school, a letter from his draft board eased him into the office of an Army recruiter who informed him about the Warrant Officer Flight Program. Basic Training and graduation from Primary and Advanced Flight Training resulted in his arrival in RVN as an "FNG" with "a lot to learn." The real training that would help keep him alive in an "active AO" soon began.

Wheeler progresses from "peter" pilot to aircraft commander under watchful eyes, both in the cockpit and in the unit. Establishing the unspoken respect of your fellow pilots and crew was a subtle, but important rite of passage. Learning the true limits of the aircraft and the techniques that will help you survive getting in and out of a hot LZ, taking hits from enemy fire, and flying "Sneaky Pete" missions for CCN were all part of the focused "curriculum." In Wheeler's case, he repeats this rite of passage when he eventually transfers from "slicks" to the unit's gunships. When his tour was over he was more than ready to leave, however, some part of him was left behind.

The style Wheeler uses to write *Dubious Honor* almost makes you feel he is writing about someone else and he refers to himself in the book as a ghost. He is writing about the experiences in the Vietnam War and the parts of him that still remain there. Wheeler says he wrote this book as personal therapy, something other authors of books I have reviewed have also acknowledged. I highly recommend that you read this well written and touching book.

"Let's Smoke On This"

I use these words from the movie "Little Big Man" where the old chief would answer, when asked to comment on a particular subject, "I will smoke on this". I don't know what he smoked but it gave him time to reflect on the subject and to think before answering. My goal in this column is "smoking" on various common issues that affect many of us in the VHPA. This time let's talk about awards, decorations and medals.

Awards, decorations and medals that Vietnam pilots received seem to have been received with mixed and conflicting feelings. The most common expressions I hear are, "I was just doing my job"; "I was doing what all the other pilots in my unit do"; "I'm not a Hero" etc., I absolutely agree and have had the occasion to say the same. We see Medal of Honor recipient say that they are wearing the medal for all who have put themselves in harm's way, they just did what was necessary at the time. I believe this to be true of the other valor medals as well.

If you have received an award, I'm sure you have been asked questions like, "What did you do to earn the Distinguished Flying Cross?" This can make the person being asked this question uncomfortable, and maybe even embarrassed, this is particularly true when the person doing the asking has never served in combat. I think you can be gracious and informative in your answer but you don't need to fill in all the horrific details, as they probably won't understand. But I believe the award brings recognition not only yourself but to your unit and fellow pilots. You could simply let the questioner know that you were just doing your job and then one day, a person of authority made a report that resulted in a commendation. You were performing your duty just as a wingman, or the flight before you, or basically like all other Cobra, Huey and all other helicopter pilots. You simply wear the medal all of them earned.

Our old Dress Blues and Greens are packed up somewhere because we are civilians and besides they probably don't fit anymore. We can still wear unit insignias, wings, patches or mini-medals on our hats or on that old flight jacket. When I see an 'ol boy wearing his WWII hat, I go out of my way to recognize him and to thank him for serving his country. These guys light up with pride and always mention their unit. When you wear your Purple Heart lapel pin, it gives you the chance to speak about other Vietnam Vets, and you can still maintain your "quite pride".

When we get older and reflect back on our lives, the mementos, plaques, certificates and medals hanging on our walls represent not only what we did as individuals but also what we did collectively. I always feel sad for the family of a deceased Vet that finds an award they never knew about. The medal kept a secret about the person, his unit, his friends and companions who served with him. Gone was a chance for people to hear about the First Calvary Division or the Big Red One or whichever unit they served with. Gone was the chance to hear about the time that Vet was "just doing his job and then one day, a person of authority made a report that resulted in a commendation. So - let's take those medals and other memorabilia out of that box and tell their story, our children and grandchildren will forever cherish that moment.

I heard an old paratrooper tell the following story on TV. He said his grandson asked him, "Were you a hero in the war Granddad?" to which he replied, "No, but I served with a company of heroes." I believe we should keep our pride, the pride of our fellow pilots and our part in the Vietnam War alive and in an honorable place in history.

Giving Back - Two Odysseys to China

Like most Vietnam-era pilots, I returned from my 1967-68 tour, finished my military service, and then adjusted to civilian life and a career in aviation. And, like most pilots, I had mixed feelings about the war and my role in it. I always felt I wanted to do something more, to give something back, to put back into "the system" some good deed in return for all the good things I've gotten out of life. Part of this desire was fulfilled by my occupation of flying an emergency medical service helicopter for a hospital in Minneapolis. Being part of a life-saving operation which operates eight Agusta A-109 helicopters is very rewarding, but I was looking for something more, some very tangible method of saying thanks for where I was in life.

After raising two children, who in turn have their own children, my wife Barbara and I decided to explore adopting an Asian child as a means of "giving back" to society. When I was in Vietnam I had always thought the Vietnamese children were beautiful in many ways. During my tour I seemed to take a lot of photographs of them. When Barb and I decided to go ahead with the adoption we naturally decided to look into adopting a Vietnamese orphan. We started discussions with one of the premier adoption agencies in the United States, one which just happened to be located near us in Minneapolis, Children's Home Society of Minnesota (www.childrenshomeadopt.org). We found that not only were we over Vietnam's age limit of 35 years old for adoptive parents, but also that we might find some bureaucratic obstacles and lingering ill will over my having been a combat helicopter pilot during the war. We were told it might be better to look elsewhere.

Having come this far, we then turned to adopting from China. We were delighted to find that Chinese culture accorded respect and honor to age and therefore had an elevated age limit of 50 years for adoptive parents. In every other respect we qualified, and we were both surprised and pleased the Chinese authorities had great respect for my occupation as a medical pilot and Barb's as a general surgeon. They felt we'd make good parents for their children and would give them a good home. We moved ahead with the process

which was an 18-month period from start to finish.

Initially I thought I might encounter some resentment on the part of the Chinese once we arrived there. Releasing their orphan girls for international adoption is a tacit admission that they're incapable of caring for them, I thought, a major loss of face. I also wondered how much the Chinese could love their children if they were willing to see them go overseas. Once we arrived in China Barb and I realized how off base these thoughts were. We found the Chinese, like parents everywhere, dearly love their children, they're just pragmatic. Since overpopulation is a major issue in China, the government dictates which families can have a child (just one!), and moreover, determines when they can have that child. But what if a family has a daughter and that's to be their only child? The family loses their links to their ancestors when the daughter marries and becomes part of the husband's family. The parents also don't have a son to care for them in their old age. Consequently, many Chinese couples give up a first-born daughter for adoption so they can try again for a son.

In December 1996 we left Minneapolis on a Northwest Airlines flight to Hong Kong where we stayed overnight. The next morning we flew via Dragon Air from Hong Kong to Hangzhou, China, on the coast of the East China Sea south of Shanghai. This adventure would fill a book, so I'll just say that we met our new daughter, Margaret Chun Hao Steinbrunn, 9 months old, and life has never been the same since. It's difficult to describe the good feelings derived from tanking an orphan home to give her love, a family, an education, a sense of identity, and not the least of all, enough food to eat.

An illustration of the Chinese attitude towards

American adoption of their children is this. When I was walking around a lake in Hangzhou with Margaret in my back pack child carrier, a Chinese gentleman approached me and asked if I was in China on holiday. I said "No holiday, no vacation. Child adoption!" "Ah!" said he. "Lucky Girl!"

Margaret's Chinese name means "Good Spring", an auspicious name for a future Minnesotan who had yet to embrace the depths of the Minnesota winter. After a week of processing paperwork in Hangzhou, we flew south to Guangzhou (formerly Canton) where we spent a week out processing through the American Consulate. Then on to Hong Kong for a RON, and finally home to Minneapolis.

Barb and I found the process so rewarding, so fulfilling, and so much fun that we decided to do it again. "After all", I was informed by my lovely bride, "Two children are just as easy to care for as one, and don't you think Margaret needs a sister to play with?" Then, as she batted her eyes at me and flashed her cutest smile, I found myself caving in.

We repeated the adoption process and in January 2000 we were winging our way to Changsha, China, to meet our second daughter, Olivia Lingli Steinbrunn, who was then 28 months old. Her Chinese name means "quick, nimble, elegant, sharp", an appropriate name for the accomplished dancer and artist she's become.

The years have passed, the girls have grown, and time marches on inexorably. I find myself reflecting on my great good fortune of military service, aviation career, marriage, and two lovely daughters. They provide me with a balance in my life and a link to my service in Southeast Asia, and I count myself lucky in all respects.

CHILDRENS LIBRARY PROJECT IN VN




To the Members of the VHPA

The men of the 61st AHC are teaming with the Children Libraries International group to build a Library/Learning center in Bong Son, near LZ English in Vietnam and we need the help of every member of the VHPA. We are seeking contributions to support this effort. Our share will be about \$60,000, of which \$6000 has already been pledged, your contributions are tax deductible.

The 61st AHC is continuing its mission of providing opportunities for a better way of life for the young people of Vietnam. Why, because that's what Americans do and secondly, we want to establish an on-going relationship with the people around Bong Son in Binh Dinh province.

The Vietnamese value education, and we can help them learn English, which is an important way to enhance career opportunities. It will also be a chance for us to have a cultural exchange of information so that the Vietnamese people can see that Americans are the "good" guys and not the guys depicted in the Vietnamese memorial at My Lai.

This is not an "apology" but a way to show that we Americans are thinking of the future, not the past. Plus, it really is a lot of fun to visit Vietnam now, it's warm in December, traditional/American food is interesting and not too expensive, people are friendly, Phu Cat is a commercial airline terminal, there are no bomb craters, the Bong Son river is clear, there are trees on the ridge lines and mountains, and palm trees are waving at the resort hotels in Qui Nhon as the waves roll in to the beach.



We hope to dedicate the Library/Learning Center in December of 2011. We have already signed a "Memorandum of Understanding" with the provincial and local authorities and we plan to break ground in March of 2011. The Library of Vietnam Program (LOVP) organization have built 25 library/learning centers in Laos, Cambodia, Viet-

nam and China and have formed an umbrella organization for their oversight. Southern Museum Of Flight Special Tribute to Vietnam Veterans



The back cover of the last issue of the VHPA Aviator magazine featured several photos of the Southern Museum of Flight's tribute to Vietnam veterans. As director of the museum, I was pleased and honored to see the photos in your magazine of this very special project.

The diorama depicts the shoot down of an AH-1G Cobra, working in a "Pink Team" with an OH-6 (Loach) from the 1/16th Cav (The Outcasts), 1st Cav Div. The Loach is seen while in a rescue of the Cobra crew, when it is fired on by a camouflaged VC, hiding in the tall grass, near a banana palm. The audio portion of the display is triggered by electronic beams, and begins with, "Taking Fire, Taking Fire", the sound of the OH-6 overhead, the AK-47 firing and ending with a burst from the Loach's M-60.

The Grand Opening for this exhibit is now set for Thursday, April 21, 2011

We have invited a number of special guests to attend, including several Vietnam Medal of Honor recipients, and pilots from the Navy, Air Force and

Marine Corps. Although the exhibit is based on Army helicopter action, the event pays tribute to all Vietnam veterans in all branches of military service. The evening will include a bagpiper at the outdoor flag area, welcome and introduction of special guests, veterans salute, musical tribute, symposium on "The Air War over Vietnam" moderated by Bill Lawson and light foods and drinks following the event.

A Story About Slick Pilots

I recently had a conversation about the role of helicopters in Vietnam and how they supported the fighting soldiers on the ground. Of course, the mission of supporting the Army's maneuver forces that are engaged in combat was, is, and always will be why Army Aviation exists. However, during the conversation I seemed to note an inference that Army aviators were not real warriors, and I was reminded of a story I heard while serving in Vietnam that stayed with me all these years. I am sharing this story as I remember it, but first I need to provide some insight as to why it made such an impression.

I was in the armed reconnaissance business while serving in an air cavalry troop in Vietnam. I flew the OH-6 in a scout platoon for six months and never flew in a unit that carried soldiers into battle; however, this story is about those who did. Frequently, pilots in cavalry units could make individual choices as to how much risk they were willing to take during a given mission. (I need to say many of my peers had an unbelievably high tolerance for risks.) We didn't get to choose where we went or the mission once we arrived, but we had some choices we could make inside the cockpit as to how we performed the mission. The guys (then they all were guys) flying an air assault mission by inserting the infantry into their battle space and supporting them once they were on the ground, seldom had the luxury of making personal choices on how they performed the mission. The term "slick" was used to describe the UH-1 Huey helicopter that carried the infantry into battle and this story is about "slick pilots."

Having participated as a pilot in air assaults by screening (flying along the flanks of the landing zone) before, during, and after the insertion, I gained an appreciation of how complex the whole operation is, even in training. I came to realize that air assaults are real cheek squeezers for everyone involved. The command and control, fire support planning, integrity of the unit being inserted, and the enemy's action all lead to a thousand moving parts. Once that first helicopter unloads its troops, everyone is committed to getting enough forces inserted to insure the success of the mission. When the landing zone (LZ) is under fire or hot, the insertion



becomes challenging and complex. In Laos, during Lam Son 719, when US Army aviation supported the Vietnamese Army, 168 US Army helicopters were shot down and 618 were damaged in a six week period. In the Ashau Valley, along the Khe Sanh Plain, in Cambodia, and many other areas of operation in Vietnam the landing zones were almost always hot and the North Vietnamese goal was to screw up a brilliant plan. Regardless, if the plan was executed as it was written, the mission was accomplished as changes were made and executed literally on the fly. The Army's assault helicopter units, whose mission it was to fly soldiers into battle did what they did every day, and they were very good at inserting combat forces where their commanders wanted them and supporting them once on the ground.

My story takes place in the Ashau Valley during the Vietnam War. The Ashau was an extremely difficult area of operation during the entire war and we were never totally successful at denying the North Vietnamese freedom of movement. The Valley is next to Laos, close to North Vietnam, both of which had intricate road networks that wove their way South from North Vietnam. The Valley was an extension of the Ho Chin Minh trail and

was the sight of the battle that is featured in the movie *Hamburger Hill*. The infantry air mobile assaults into these areas of operations during the 1968-70 time frame were often little more than raids, but they were frequently fierce and deadly. The North Vietnamese had sophisticated communication centers, hospitals, bulldozers, and vehicle maintenance operations. We believed, or maybe we hoped, that fire power such as B-52 strikes, air strikes, artillery, and Army aviation would be successful in denying the North Vietnamese Army freedom of operations. As often as possible, the

North Vietnamese operated underground in caves and tunnels. When we would blow up an underground garage, the North Vietnamese would quickly dig another one. When we blew craters in their roads, they filled them in and kept on trucking. It would have taken a nuclear weapon to shut down the Ashau Valley and that would have killed mostly monkeys.

This story was told to me in an officers club in Vietnam by a fellow aviator on his second tour. It may be true, but if not, it makes its own point.

This aviator was in a flight of 8 Huey's loaded with infantry headed for the Ashau Valley to participate in an insertion and the landing zone was anticipated to be hot. The flight was directed to follow radio silence while enroute and was headed for the LZ when chalk 2 (the 2nd aircraft in a flight of 8) took a hit in the rotor mast which took off the entire rotor system. (A helicopter in flight without a rotor system is analogous to a rock). As chalk 2 went down, a single radio call was heard: "tell my wife I love her." After about 30 seconds the flight leader transmitted: "Chalk 3, you are now chalk 2, everyone tighten up, cut the chatter."

As a young aviator, the story made an impression. I thought that the only thing the guys that carried troops had to do was maintain their position in formation, follow the guy in front of them, and keep off the radio. Given that anyone can be brave on a given day, it is a challenge to be brave everyday. Maintaining your position in a formation, following the guy in front of you and keeping off the radio was not a simple task and those aviators that flew slicks were a special breed everyday.

Our Author, Danny Cox served with C Troop, 2-17 Cav, 101st Air Mobile Division during 69-70. After returning from Vietnam, Danny remained in the Army and commanded C Troop at Ft. Campbell, KY in the 70s and commanded the Squadron at FT. Campbell in the 80s. He retired as a colonel in 1993 and worked for United Way and Northrop Grumman. Presently he and his wife divide their time between Northern Virginia and Atlanta, GA being grandparents to 4 grandsons.

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

VICINITY AROUND THE HOTEL: The hotel is connected to the Orange County Convention Center. It is located approximately in the middle of the famous International Drive. There is a wonderful Trolley (www.iridetrolley.com) for out-of-towners that runs on International Drive. The hotel is near SeaWorld and Aquatica. There are convenient shuttles to other attractions such as Universal Orlando and Walt Disney World.

PARKING AND INTERNET ACCESS:

Self-parking is free to VHPA attendees. There is a large parking structure attached to the hotel.

Internet Access: VHPA attendees enjoy free internet access in their room as part of our contract with the Hilton.

WHO MAY ATTEND THIS REUNION?

As a general rule anyone who is "dues current" in the VHPA can register, order tickets, etc. simply by paying the Reunion Registration Fee. All who served in the Vietnam War as helicopter pilots must not only be a member of the VHPA, but also must be current with respect to their annual membership dues as of the first day of the Reunion to register. Anyone who was not a pilot, but is a current subscriber to the VHPA Aviator magazine is also welcome to attend. Exceptions to the above are (only) vendors, specifically invited performers/speakers, Gold Star Family guests, and Non-Registered Banquet Guests. Any

member in Attendance may also invite other people to attend the Reunion (and its events) as long as that person is not eligible to be a member of the Association in their own right, but that person must pay the Reunion Registration Fee. Also, anyone wishing to purchase a ticket for any of our events, (for example a helicopter ride, a tour, attend an HPF, attend a concert, etc.) must have paid the Reunion Registration Fee. The only exception to the above is found in the Non-Registered Banquet Guest (NRBG) Fee. It was specifically designed years ago to accommodate for the guests of any registered Reunion Attendee to attend our Closing Banquet. This is the only event we host where every attendee does not have to be registered into the Reunion as a whole.

As a general rule, VHPA Membership and Subscriber dues expire on the last day of the month. Thus someone's dues could expire on 30 June 2011. This same person could register, say, in February 2011 and state "I am dues current today" and, indeed, he/she is. However, this same person will not be dues current on 6 July 2011 which is the first day of the Reunion. For this reason, the VHPA Reunion Registration software and procedures are "forward looking" with respect the dues status.

It is important to know or recall that all Reunion Attendees (anyone who pays the Registration Fee) are treated as equals. A VHPA Life Member, a former enlisted man, the widow of a deceased Vietnam Vet, a good friend – they are all treated as equals once they pay the Registration Fee. They are all equals because they can purchase tickets at the same price, receive the services (name badges, refunds, banquet seating, etc.), stand in the same lines to board buses, etc.

The only exception is that only VHPA Members can attend the Annual Business Meeting.

DRESS CODE

Florida casual is the dress code for this Reunion with some obvious reminders and suggestions as follows:

- Many men wear a suit and tie with the ladies wearing a nice dress to the Closing Banquet. You will even see Dress Blues.
- It is always a good idea to wear your Reunion lanyard.
- Bring your swimwear. The hotel's Lazy River is a wonderful area for the whole family.

CANCELLATION DATE AND REFUND POLICY

22 June 2011 is this Reunion's cutoff date to cancel a registration and receive a refund minus the Reunion Cancellation Fee. HQ must receive the Refund Request prior to 5 pm CDT on Wednesday, 22 June 2011 including those via US mail. HQ can receive a Refund Request via US mail, email, FAX, or phone. A Refund Request can be for a specific event, for an individual guest, or for an entire registration. A Refund Request can include any registration fees and/or tickets for meals, tours, events. Any membership dues, product fees (including Reunion T-shirts and Directory Fees, etc.), donations/contributions/sponsorships gifts paid or associated with Reunion Registration payments ARE NOT refundable. While the VHPA Reunion Committee reserves the right to have non-refundable events, this Reunion has no such events.

This Reunion's Cancellation Fee is \$10. This fee is subtracted from any refund due regardless of the number of items in the Cancellation/Refund Request. It also applies to each refund transaction which is defined as whenever a check is issued. As a general rule, HQ will process all refund checks not later than close of business on Friday, 22 July 2011. If, however, you request more than one refund check (for example one in April and then one in June), then there would be one Cancellation Fee per check.

Each Refund Request received prior to the cutoff date mentioned above will be processed by HQ not later than close of business on Friday, 22 July 2011. Since refunds are traditionally paid via check the goal is to have all checks in people's hands not later than Saturday, 30 July 2011.

CANCELLATION PENALTY WAIVER PROGRAM AND REFUND GUARANTEE FEE

The follow is extracted from the "Addendum to the Reunion Refund Policy Refund Guarantee" document posted in the Policies area of the VHPASERVICES website.

Notwithstanding the details outlined in the Cancellation Date and Refund Policy above for an additional fee of 10% of the total of the registration fee and event ticket prices, an Attendee pays the Reunion Guarantee Fee and enrolls in the Cancellation Penalty Waiver Program. To benefit from this Program, however, the additional fee must be paid along with other registration fees **at the time of initial registration**. Enrollment in the Program will not be available at any time thereafter. *The Program offers you and your guests the opportunity to receive a refund should you cancel or interrupt your trip to the Reunion for the following reasons:*

1. Sickness, injury, or death of yourself, a traveling companion or members of either of your immediate families, which is diagnosed and treated by a physician at the time your trip to the Reunion is terminated;
2. Involvement in a traffic accident, en route to the Reunion that causes you to miss the Reunion or a particular event;
3. Your home is made uninhabitable by a natural disaster such as fire, flood, earthquake, hurricane, or volcano between the time you registered but prior to the Reunion;
4. You are recalled into active duty by the military that causes you to be unavailable to attend the Reunion;
5. Subpoena or being called to serve for jury duty between the time you registered but prior to the Reunion;
6. You are quarantined or prevented from traveling to the Reunion by governmental action.

The Program will not provide a refund should you cancel or interrupt your trip to the Reunion for any of the following reasons:

1. Business, contractual, or educational obligations of you, and immediate family member, or traveling companion;
2. Any unlawful acts, committed by you or a traveling companion;
3. Other condition, event, or circumstances occurring prior to your purchase of the VHPA Cancellation Penalty Waiver Program.

The photo on pg. 11 shows LTG (Retired) Hal Moore and Joe Galloway of 'We Were Soldiers Once ... and Young' famous with the OH-6A during the VHPA 2000 Reunion in Washington D.C.

VHPAF received this OH-6A from the Tampa Police Department in 1991. They received seven from the Pennsylvania National Guard when they were replaced with the OH-58 and flew them to Tampa. The one we have 062 flew in Vietnam in 70-72 with the 1st Cav. It is trailer mounted which enables us to attend numerous functions in the area. It is shown about three times a month at schools, Vet's activities, reunions, parades etc. We are fortunate that the Hilton's General Manager approved our request to park the trailer just outside the Lobby Level area from the Chapter's Memorabilia Room. The VHPAF guys will remove the doors, have an M-60 and a Cav hat in the back seat plus a flight helmet in the front seat. Saturday, July 9th, 5:45 pm, Orlando Ballroom. This event is scheduled to conclude about 9 pm.


Over the years the Closing Banquet has developed its own personality. Plans for this year include the following:

Do you possess the time to participate on the VHPA Executive Council? The requirement for candidates is straightforward: the individual must be an active member for one year prior to the first day of the 2010 annual VHPA National Reunion (July 7, 2010). The nomination process is easy, as well. You may personally volunteer or you may nominate another active VHPA member who is willing to serve. The nomination, however, must be received in writing (e-mail or letter) by the VHPA EC Junior Member at Large not later than midnight, June 15, 2010.

The election will take place at the Annual Business Meeting during the 2011 reunion in Orlando, FL. Although candidate attendance at the meeting is not required, it is strongly recommended. Rules for conducting the election shall be provided in the application packet.

Please note Executive Council members are expected to attend and assist during the annual national reunion, participate at the annual business meeting, be available for the monthly conference call and actively attend to VHPA interests. Since you are expected to attend and serve at the reunions, the hotel is contracted to provide you with complimentary accommodations.

To volunteer, nominate, or to discuss the EC duties and election process, please contact Bob Hesselbein, current Junior Member at Large and Election Coordinator. He will provide you with an application packet and form to complete

and return. The nominee form details basic biographical information which shall be posted to the VHPA website by June 20, 2011. This notice fulfills VHPA policy to notify members and to seek nominees for the Vice President and Junior Member at Large positions.

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"Cementing A Friendship-The Hard Way"

I recently had the good fortune to meet Jason Stone at a recent Razorback Reunion through one of our old crewchiefs, Bill Stribling. These two had been friends since the mid-1960s. There's an exciting story here, but first a little back ground. Jason attended the reunion to record interviews with some of our former crew members in order to flesh out a made for TV documentary he was assembling about the Razorback guns. After all the lies and war stories had been filmed, I asked Bill how he got acquainted with this guy in the wild luau shirt. It turned out that Mr. Stone was an enlisted member of an Air Force air rescue unit, callsign "Pedro", flying HH-43B Kaman "Huskies". Pedro's mission was to rescue downed US and VNAF aircrew during the Vietnam War. It also turns out that both the Pedro's and Razorbacks flew out of Tan Son Nhut. I automatically assumed their friendship sprang up from working at the air base with one another, but you know the old adage about the word 'as-

sume', eh? And in this case, "boy was I wrong!" The narrative is in Bill and Jason's own words, so set back and enjoy. Cheers, Steve Bookout - Razorback 33

So, as Paul Harvey would say if he could: Now for the rest of the story.

Bill Stribling's account of that day's action:

A VNAF C-47 had gone down in the Saigon area, and there were casualties that had to get medical attention ASAP. Jason and another Air Force Husky crewman were left behind in order to load all of the VNAF casualties on board. After their Medivac aircraft left, VC from a nearby village approached the downed aircraft, and a firefight ensued. Things didn't look too good for Jason and friend, when suddenly a Razorback light fireteam came thumping along, sized up the situation, rolled in, and killed most of the VC. Jason found out it was MAJ Chad Payne, the Razorback platoon leader that got him out of the jam and arranged to meet him. They became friends and Jason started hanging around the Razorback flight lines with both our Starcom and "30 minute" teams. Jason then started flying missions with us, strictly as an observer of course, and while there he took lots of combat photos. I made friends with Jason that way, but we got pretty tight after being on my ship the day we were shot down supporting a downed 25th Div bird.

We were flying recon when we heard the Mayday call on Guard from a Centaur gunship that had been shot down in a dry rice paddy. The crew was still under fire and the NVA were closing in. We got there within five minutes and saw the gunship on its side, in a series of dry rice paddy's with bamboo growing up on all of the dike lines in an about ten-acre area with a village nearby. Our bird was the wing ship in the team and when we rolled in on our first pass, I saw guys in uniform everywhere on the ground. They were in both the thick bamboo and out in the open. I clearly remember one big guy running with a RPD machine gun. The dust, smoke, and noise were incredible, and seemed to get worse with each pass. We were getting hit pretty regular on every pass, some of which came from .51 cal machine guns. On the fourth pass, we smelled fuel, and the fuel warning light lit up. WO Davis, our right seat pilot, rolled to our right, trying to fly over a wide swath of jungle but the girl just couldn't stay in the air - we made a hard landing about 100 meters beyond in a large dry paddy.


Razorback 6 started an orbit around us while we got the pilots out. Mike Klinker, the other crew chief, Jason, and I set up a perimeter behind a dike facing the direction of the fight. We immediately started receiving heavy automatic weapons fire from the tree line and returned fire. Overhead, 6 could see 30 or so bad guys in the edge of the jungle and called two F-100's to our position pretty quick. They dropped napalm, and 250 pounders on the woods, then made 20 MM cannon runs.

While all this was going on, a 25th Div Cav unit was in the area, and a young M-60 tank commander made the decision to get the 25th Div gunship aircrew out by himself. He punched through the bamboo and dikes to the aircraft's position firing his .50 cal machinegun. The crew got on board under heavy fire and as the tank was attempting to back out to safety, the young tank commander was struck in the head and killed by an AK 47 round. The gunship's crewchief got in the cupola and fired the .50 cal at the enemy as the tank made its escape.

Meanwhile, our fire team lead, Major Payne, had burned his fuel





Looking for information from Pilots that served with the 129th AHC

Looking for information from Pilots that served with the 129th AHC out of Ahn Son/Lane Army Airfield in the last half of 1971. I was a peter pilot with A Troop 7/17th Air Cav based out of Phan Rang Air Force Base. The Air Force team at this base had it pretty good for Vietnam, air Conditioning, nice thick mattresses on the beds, etc. The CAV was in a dusty bump on the perimeter of the base and it was typical CAV, in other words not very posh. During the latter half of 1971 (Aug through Nov??) a Typhoon caused the 129th to fly South to Phan Rang to protect their aircraft and they were allowed to stay at the Air Force transit Officer Quarters. I did not meet any of the 129th guys but apparently the Air Force brass was all in a huff and wanted to "nail some Army pilots to the wall". It seems that when the Air Force checked the Officer Quarters after the 129th left the base they were missing quite a few items (like Air conditioners, mattresses, lighting, etc.). In fact, the word I got from an Air Force Captain at the O'club was "Those f***ing pilots took everything but the kitchen sink"!!

A few months later the 7/17th stood down and returned to the states, I'm thinking this was around December 1971. Anyone lucky enough to have 181 days in country at the time went home. Not being one of the lucky ones to return stateside, I was transferred to the 129th along with a friend and fellow pilot, 1st Lt Tom Shaw. Upon arrival at the 129th we were surprised to find that we had to "buy" our room. We found a pilot that was leaving in a few days and negotiated a payment for the room. I'm not sure of the exact amount that we paid, but 300 dollars seems about right. And was it ever decked out! Nice thick mattresses, air conditioning, it even had a Florescent lighting with USAF stamped on it.

So, here is what I'm looking for: The pilot that sold me the room? I also want to know the story of the "Famous Phan Rang Heist of 1971". The 129th turned out to be a great unit with some real "characters", one in particular was Augie Bailey and I'm still looking for him, I have some pictures he will surely want.

Man from Oklahoma is looking to thank Cobra rescue pilots....

My name is Rusty Hair and I was a grunt in Vietnam. What I would like to do is find the two Cobra helicopter pilots who saved my life in late

March or early April of 1968.

My unit, the 1/18 Inf of the 1st Cav Div was operating across the border in Laos in II Corps, probably almost directly west of Pleiku. We had been in contact and were being extracted from the hot PZ by, I believe, three Huey's who were supported by two Cobras. First the Huey's landed and we all got on, but my Huey couldn't lift off because of being over weight. All the pilots huddled together on the radios and I was told to get off the slick, they said one of the Cobras would pick me up.

Sure enough all the Huey's left the PZ and then one of the Cobras landed. I was motioned to jump on wing and sit on the rocket pod facing backwards and to hold on to the trailing edge of the wing - all of which I reluctantly did. We took off and I was taken all the way back to Pleiku where I finally got off. What a ride!!

I would like to find those pilots today and thank them. The only thing I remember about the helicopters was that I believe they had either a horse or lion painted on their nose. I have also been told that they were probably from a Cav unit, but I'm not sure of that.

Searching for information on a Catholic Chaplain from Vietnam

I am searching for information on a Catholic Chaplain for the purposes of composing a short bio to tender along with his personal effects to one of the military museums (82nd/Chaplaincy/1st Cav).

His name is Charles A. Conroy. He was officially assigned to the 228th Aviation Assault Support Battalion supporting the 1st Air Cav from late 66/early 67 through 68. He has a number of Air Medals and other artifacts that show he was frequently in the air. One of which is a letter written by Capt. Richard C. Deppey of the 1st Air Cav to the Chaplain's mother after the Chaplain was wounded. Another is a hand made plaque to the Chaplain from the 610th Trans Co (GS) marked 1966-67.

If you can please help point the way for me for finding someone, or some records that help me to piece together where the Chaplain was and what he did while he was there, I'd appreciate it.

Editor's note - On Jan 18, 2011, Patrick added these facts that he thought might help in the search about the life of Chaplain Conroy:

He was a Jesuit priest that was born in Chicago and was the only surviving child in his family. He attended, and later ministered at, Loyola

Academy and Loyola University.

He was with the 82nd in Operation Powerpack (his assistant was KIA by a sniper) and later joined up the 1st Cavalry. He appears to have been a line Chaplain with the 288th of the 1st Cav, based in An Khe with Company C (perhaps) and with the Guns-A-Go-Go detachment - he's got a photo of one of the gunships displaying its ordinance load signed by a number of the gunship crews such as "Doc Holloway; Ralph Jones, Jeff Overson; Dick Stressner and two others I can't read").

In November 1967 he was in Dak To and was photographed by Dana Stone; apparently he came in with the one of the 1st Cav's supply ships or with the Cav's Medical Evacuation group coming to support the 173rd that was engaged at Dak To. At some point in his tour he was on board a Chinook hauling drums of chemicals (CS) that took fire, ruptured the drums and forced the aircraft to the ground in enemy territory. He helped set up a perimeter long enough to clear the ship and get it airborne again.

He also helped an ambushed patrol pull its wounded troopers out of the line of fire and at some point was wounded himself (the last time badly enough to be sent to the 85th Evacuation Hospital). After Vietnam he was stationed at Ft. Bragg, Ft. Leonard Wood and Schofield Barracks. He retired in 1984 from Army & Church, he passed away in his home in Colorado in 1988. He was described as "being like a coiled spring, very vibrant, thin, in shape, outgoing and very funny but could turn dead serious in a flash - like switching on a light".

My name is Thom Cerny and I'm a former Army Combat Engineer.

I am trying to gather some information that might help me put together a tribute for a fallen 189th AHC member's surviving family.

My friend, the fallen 189th AHC member is PFC Norman Dale Adkins. He was 19 years old at the time of his death. His MOS was 67A1F and he had only been in country for 35 days when he was killed. Here's what little I know about the incident:

On 25 April 1970, Norm was serving as a door gunner on Avenger 158. His UH-1C (tail number 66-15158) was crewed by Pilot Lt. William "Killer" McKibben (posthumously promoted to Captain), Aircraft Commander WO1 Robert "Turkey" Pierce and Crew Chief Sp4 Gus Smith. While on a "beans and bullets" mission supporting friendly troops on Hill 31 near the small SF camp at Dak Seang, Kontum Provence, II Corps, Avenger 158 was shot down and crashed into the dense jungle. The incident number was: 70042555, the coordinates of the crash were YB887433. All four crewmen were initially listed as KIA - Died While Missing. All four bodies were recovered in July 1970, PFC Adkins was posthumously awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross for his "exceptionally valorous" actions on 25 April 1970.

Here's what I am looking for. Does anyone out there remember witnessing the crash? Can anyone help me determine the configuration of the aircraft that day? Is there any way of estimating how many missions Norman might have flown? Do any of you know where I can obtain an Avenger's (coffin-shaped) patch? Thank you in advance for any help you may be able to offer.

Looking For any Medivac Crewmembers who might remember...

the day that I was wounded for the third time on the same day in Quang Ngai Provence in Vietnam.

On April 15th 1970 I was twice wounded while in combat on the ground. About 5:00 PM that evening, I was again shot as we were leaving the area in a Medevac helicopter. My company was the Charlie Company, 198th LIB, 1/52nd Infantry and we were based out of LZ Stinson, Chu Lai was the location of the hospital where I was taken for treatment. While picking me up in the PZ that day, the Medivac pilots were told where the enemy fire was coming from, but they turned toward it anyway. The on-board medic treated me for my 3rd wound while enroute to the hospital.

I'm not mad at the pilots, s*** happened all the time over there. The only reason I'm asking if anyone recalls this incident is because I am seeking to be awarded a third Purple Heart for this action as I was wounded in three separate instances (I only received 1 Purple Heart that day after all was said and done). I feel I should be awarded a cluster for the second and third incidents, so I would like to have as much documentation as possible on-hand before I submit my claim. Hopefully someone out there can help me.

And while I am a life member of the VHPA, I am not the man who originally sent you that article. I am quoted in the article from an old e-mail of mine, but I don't recall my permission being given to use my name or input in any articles. However, I do not mind that such happened, I do deeply regret an error that appeared in the story.

The purpose today is just to say that I was mistaken when I said that (then) Captain John (Jack) Koshinsky (now LTC, retired) was the pilot who airlifted SFC Zabitosky, and the pilots of the crashed Huey out of the PZ after they crashed started to burn. That pilot, according to Jack Koshinsky (Gladiator 3), was (then) CW2 Herbold of the 57th AHC. I apologize to the VHPA, its membership, to Jack Koshinsky a friend for 45 years, and to CW2 Herbold for my error. The Crocodile gunship platoon of the 119th AHC, then led by me, had only a peripheral role that day as back-up to other gunships, but we (my wingman and I and our crews) did put a lot of hot steel on some very deserving targets.

Finally, I wish to say only that I was honored to personally know Fred Zabitosky and Robert (Bob) Howard, both who earned the Medal of Honor on separate missions which were supported by our battalion, 52d CAB (Flying Dragons). No braver men than Fred and Bob ever walked the face of the earth. I salute them and pray God has welcomed them "home" to a place of eternal honor.

LTC DIRICK CARL "DICK" OVERHAMM

Editor's note - We ran an obituary for LTC Overhamm's in the last issue of the Aviator, but Member Marty Heuer thought it was important for us to note these additional facts about Dick's Army career...

Dick graduated from the University of Maryland with a BS in Dairy Husbandry. He enlisted in the Army on 1 November 1954 and after basic and advanced engineer training, he attended Infantry OCS, and was commissioned a second lieutenant in 1955, followed by Ranger School. He was awarded the silver wings of an Army Aviator upon graduating from fixed-wing training with Class 56-8 at Spence Air Base, Moutrie, GA.

He was assigned to the 25th Aviation Company in Hawaii where he was the OIC of both the Army Rescue and Aerial Delivery Teams. He attended the five-week U.S. Navy SCUBA Diving School at Pearl Harbor Submarine Base in 1959, the first Army officer so qualified. He served a ground duty tour as XO, Combat Support Company and S-4, 39th Infantry Battle Group, 4th ID at Fort Lewis, WA. While on ground duty, he attended the Air Transportability Planning Course at Fort Eustis, VA and the Combat Surveillance Radar Course at Fort Huachuca, AZ.

Dick returned to flight status with the 4th Aviation Co, 4th ID at Fort Lewis. He completed the FW Instrument Qualification Course conducted by Ross Aviation in Oakland, CA. He next attended the Officers Rotary-Wing Qualification Course at Fort Wolters, TX from 3 August to 28 September 1962 with Class 63-1Q. He then attended a transition course to become qualified to fly the CH-37B Mojave at Fort Sill, OK en route to Korea to serve with the 19th Transportation Company, 8th Army. While there, he attended the USAF Open Sea Survival School in Japan and spent a TDY tour in RVN flying the Mojave recovering downed aircraft.

Dick returned to the states to attend the Infantry Advanced Course at Fort Benning, GA and then was assigned as Operations Officer, 5th Special Forces Group at Fort Bragg, NC. He was re-signed on 15 November 1965 to the 174th Aviation Company at Fort Benning, the unit being organized and trained for transfer to RVN, where he served in the gun platoon. When Dick arrived with the 174th at Lane AHP, 12 miles west of Qui Nhon, he wrote a letter to BG Robert L. Scott the former fighter commander of the China Air Task Force, also known as the Flying Tigers, to request permission to use the Sharks Teeth of the Flying Tigers on the nose of the 174th gunships. Bob Scott wrote to Major Overham on 28 June 1966, granting permission and the UH-1Cs were promptly decorated, making the unit the only one in Vietnam with authorization to do so. Dick commanded the Shark platoon until he was reassigned as the Liaison Officer to the Capitol ROK Division, headquartered adjacent to Lane AHP. Dick returned to the states in March 1967 to Hunter Army Airfield in Savannah, GA where he served as an instructor, flight commander and safety officer and later as Commander, Academic and Synthetic Training Division for both U.S. and VNAF aviators. He served his third tour in Vietnam during 1971-72 with the J-3 Section, MACV in Saigon. From 1973-74 he served with the Department of Aerial Surveillance, Systems Operation and Maintenance for the OV-1 Mohawk program at Fort Huachuca, AZ. He retired on 30 November 1974 in the grade of lieutenant colonel after 20 years military service. He was awarded the Legion of Merit, Distinguished Flying Cross, Bronze Star Medal, Meritorious Service Medal w/OLC, Air Medal with V and numeral 13, Joint Service Commendation Medal, Army Commendation Medal with V and OLC, and other service medals and badges.

After his retirement, Dick began building a home of considerable size on property in Show Low, AZ, mainly by himself with a minimum of tools. He fell 15' from the roof of this nearly completed home while winterizing it and died two days later of internal injuries.

He is survived by his wife, Elaine ("Toni") Overham, two sons, one step-son and two grandchildren.

DONALD RALEY

After a lengthy struggle to recover from severe, debilitating injuries resulting from a 2008 accident, Royce Donald Raley died Wednesday, January 25, 2011 at Oakview Nursing Home in Hubbard, Texas.

Don's life was richly marked with service to his country. When he was only 17, he made a surprising decision, and his parents gave their consent for him to enlist in the United States Army. By the time he was 18, he was stationed in Korea, and in 1958, became a lifetime member of the Army Aviation Association of America. Military assignments took him to Ft. Rucker, Alabama, Ft. Lee, Virginia, and Ft. Greely, Alaska. Later, he proudly completed two tours of duty in Vietnam, 1964-65 and 1968-69. He received many Army Commendation medals for meritorious

Don's commitment to living a life of service to help others continued in his community where he worked for a time as Dawson's night watchman and then as a trained EMT, serving for several years as a member of Dawson's Volunteer Ambulance Association. His work as a reserve officer with the Navarro County Sheriff's Department lead to his being named Peace Officer of the Year by the Navarro County Peace Officers' Association. From 2001-2004, he was Navarro County Precinct 3 Constable. His life was expansive, serving his community as well as his country.

In 1991, Don married Anita Richardson, who loved him beyond measure and not only was he her husband but her best friend as well. Throughout Don's illness, Anita unceasingly devoted herself to him as his loving caregiver. Don was strong-willed, sometimes to a fault, but he also possessed a generous nature and a willingness to help people. His life speaks of his caring about others on the other side of the globe as well as his community and family.

During this assignment, J Y was promoted to the rank of Lieutenant Colonel, served as the Army Aviation Officer and Commanding Officer, Artillery Aviation Group, US Army Artillery and Missile Center and while there he received the Master Army Aviator Badge. J Y was then assigned to Vietnam as the Commander, 13th Army Aviation Battalion, one of only three aviation battalions in combat operations in the Vietnam war. The 13th, as a result of his leadership was selected as the "Outstanding Army Aviation Unit of the Year". After Vietnam, J Y returned to Ft Sill with the 9th Field Artillery Missile Group, in 1966, he was assigned to Ft Benning, GA and eventually became the Commander of the 10th Aviation Group.

In December 1968, J Y was reassigned to Ft Rucker and the US Army Aviation Center as the

Deputy Chief of Staff G-3 with follow on positions as Director, Department of Rotary Wing, Army Aviation School and then as Chief of Staff, Ft Rucker, AL. J Y was once again reassigned to Ft Buchanan, Puerto Rico as the Deputy Commanding Officer in FEB 1972 for two years where he also completed his BA in Education. He returned to Ft Bragg, NC in July 1974 where he retired after 34 years of active service to his country.

Colonel Hammack's awards and decorations include the Legion of Merit, Bronze Star with Oak Leaf, Meritorious Service Medal, Air Medal with 12 Oak Leaf Clusters and one "V" device, multiple campaign and service medals, Order of Crown of Italy Degree of Cavalier and Master Army Aviator Badge.

He was a charter member of the 281st AHC Association and served as its Vice President and President. He recently developed the idea of having a book written about the 281st. Our company lost a gunship and the entire crew on the first morning of the battle. In Joe's book is a photo of the camp taken through Ray's Huey door as they landed, with mortar shells falling.

There will never be another Ray, and we all will miss him greatly.

Bill was a member of VFW Post 8541 in San Antonio, the Alamo Chapter of the VHPA, and the president of our Silver Spur Veterans Association, which includes all ranks from the A/3/17th Cav. Bill retired as an Air Traffic Controller with the FAA.



Roger "Bear" Young, the Spur webmaster who also served as a Scout Line Chief, wrote: "I have nothing but wonderful memories of serving with Bill in our Scout platoon under the extremely capable guidance of Scout Platoon Leaders Reynolds & Estep. My first impressions were that Bill was too young to be a pilot with his boyish looks and sense of humor. He treated all of us enlisted extremely well and in addition to his dangerous scout pilot duties he maintained our generators at DiAn. Of course he took good-natured jabs from all of us when the generators failed and our refrigerators, reel-to-reels, turn tables & fans ground to a halt! One of the most memorable events for me was when Bill was on

a mission and tore the left skid from his OH-6 when he made contact with a tree and all of us in scout maintenance at DiAn scrambled to remove the mini-gun, ammo, and gun mount, fill sandbags and place the jacks while Bill steadily hovered the bird with us working within inches of the spinning tail rotor. All worked out extremely well and he was able to set the bird down as if it was designed as such. Within a few days "The Pusher" was back in the AO."

JOSEPH M.F. MAY

LTC Ret. Joseph M.F. May passed away early on the morning of November 17, 2010 from the effects of a massive heart attack which he had suffered several days earlier.

He was born in New York City, New York and after joining the Army he graduated from Fixed Wing flight training on 24 August 1956, and then rotary wing flight training on 18 June 1957. In Vietnam he served his first tour in 1966-67 on both the repair ship Corpus Christie in Cam Ranh Bay, later he was assigned to Headquarters of the 34th Support Group in Saigon. On his second tour in Vietnam he was assigned as a Supply Officer to US Army Aviation Materiel Management Center, USARPAC-RVN and he then served as the Commanding Officer of the 110th, Transportation Company, USARPAC-RVN. He received a Bronze Star for his efforts on each tour.

After completing a 20-year career in the U.S. Army, Joe followed that up with another career in the U.S. Post Office.

Joseph is survived by his wife Jackie; his son Joseph and his wife Catherine; his son Tommy and one sister. A military Service was held on December 1, 2010, at Florida National Cemetery in Bushnell, Florida. He will be greatly missed.

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KINDERGARTEN NEAR KHE SANH DEDICATED TO FALLEN HELICOPTER PILOT

On January 6, 1969, 1LT Dan Cheney gave his life on a mission to save another downed pilot near Hau Nghia, South Vietnam. In the years that followed, Dan's mother, Rae, and sister, Jerilyn, decided to turn their grief to a force for good by founding Peacetrees Vietnam, an organization dedicated to clearing unexploded ordnance, planting trees, and constructing kindergartens and libraries in Quang Tri Province, near the former DMZ.



As a result of an earlier article in the VHPA Aviator, many VHPA members donated to help construct the Daniel B. Cheney Kindergarten in Khe Da Village near Khe Sanh. These members and others contributed to commemorative blocks placed on a Friendship Wall including the names of the following fallen airmen: Gregory Crandall, Donald Woods, Joe Brown, Steven Goelz, Russ Ahrens, Mike Bradley, Ralph Moreira, Daniel B. Cheney, Ron G. Phears, Eugene L. Lavoy, Billy Pedings, Robert Hill, Mike J. Moran, and Oscar M. Dardeau.




A group of Americans, including Vietnam Veterans, VHPA members, Veteran's relatives and others traveled to Quang Tri Province in early September 2010 for the dedication ceremonies of the kindergarten. The first stop was at the Danaan Parry Landmine Education Center where we learned firsthand the lethal extent of the unexploded ordnance problem, even now after over 40 years! We visited with recent victims and toured the educational center and the forest of trees planted on the former Dong Ha Marine Supply Depot.



On September 10, 2010, the group travelled by bus west on Route 9, past the Rockpile to Khe Da Village, about 10 km SW of the old airfield at Khe Sanh. The dedication ceremony included speeches by officials including US Ambassador to Vietnam, Michael Michalak and Quang Tri provincial leaders.



A very moving moment was the meeting of Rae Cheney, whose son Daniel was killed by Vietnamese, with Ho Thi Moan whose sons were killed by Americans. As the two grey-haired mothers tearfully embraced, everyone in the audience knew that a real reconciliation, symbolizing a new era, had taken place.



A group of dignitaries, veterans, donors and local villagers participated in the ribbon cutting and scores of delighted children got their first look at a school with a safe playground.

Later the veterans and relatives joined local residents to plant trees symbolizing a turn to the future for everyone affected by the war.

While Rae was in Vietnam for the dedications of PeaceTrees two latest projects in Vietnam, the Mothers' Peace Library and the Dan Cheney Kindergarten in the Khe Sahn area and the Pat Lucero Mothers Peace Library in the Quang Tri Province, she was presented with the Peace and Friendship Among Nations medal by the Vietnamese Government.

The Vietnam Union of Friendship Organizations presented her the "Medal for Peace and Friendship Among Nations", their highest honor that may be bestowed upon a foreign citizen. According to Vietnamese officials, Rae was the first American mother, who lost a son or daughter in war, to be honored by the Vietnamese people for humanitarian service.

Both US Ambassador to Vietnam, Michael Michalak, and Vietnam Ambassador, Nguyen Tam Chien, participated in the presentation. Members of the Vietnamese and International press surrounded Rae both during the presentation and the Library dedication and wrote numerous news articles of both her, and the work of PeaceTrees VietNam. These articles have appeared in Vietnam and in other countries around the world. In late October, Vietnam Television will air a documentary in Rae's honor.

Rae was 90 years old at the time of her trip and it was her first visit to Vietnam. VHPA members are familiar with Rae's work to honor her son, Dan Cheney, a US Army Helicopter Pilot who lost his life in 1969. Pat Lucero also served in the US Army in Vietnam and was killed in action in 1968. His family and friends from across the US traveled to Vietnam to honor Pat, and to commemorate the library that carries his name, PeaceTrees 10th Mother's Peace Library in Vietnam.





Checking In with BOB MASON

Author of the Best Selling book - Chickenhawk



A look back, and a talk with Robert Mason, the author of Chickenhawk..... By John Penny

In 1983, *Chickenhawk*, by VHPA member Robert Mason who served in Vietnam with the 48th AHC and B/229th AVN, hit the best seller lists. It was the first memoir

ever published by a helicopter pilot who served in the Vietnam War. Its immense success however is not just a matter of being first. It is a particularly well written and engaging story of the journey of one young man, and many others like him, into the Vietnam War. There he faced a crucible of incredible danger where no amount of skill, training, or experience guaranteed survival against a deadly enemy. Mason's narrative of the daily pressures of flying in the face of imminent death and dealing with the living conditions and absurdities of the Vietnam War are well known to us no matter what kind of tour we had. The legacy of his book is that it informed our nation of the sacrifice and service of all who flew in "the Helicopter War."

A Conversation with Robert Mason

Recently, I was privileged to have an interesting and candid conversation with Robert Mason. He and his wife Patience, who writes and blogs extensively on the issues of PTSD and whose book *Recovering from the War* is still in print, are longtime residents of Florida. He is an articulate

conversationalist and a man of many interests. His creative interest in artificial intelligence has led to an as yet unpublished sequel to his two novels on the subject: *Weapon* and *Solo*. In a curious switch, *Weapon* was made into a movie entitled *Solo* starring Mario Van Peebles as a robot designed as weapon that starts thinking for itself. Currently Mason is working on an extensive history of the helicopter and is looking for material to use in that story. I was impressed by his knowledge on the subject. His interest in helicopters, particularly affordable ones, also extends to the ultra-light designs now being assembled, flown, and tested at Mosquito Aviation; not far from his home in Florida.

We talked extensively about *Chickenhawk* which Mason originally started to write as a novel. Mason's approach to every writer's challenge of the blank page is the use of mental pictures to guide his writing, a technique he attributes to his background and training as a graphic artist. To write *Chickenhawk*, he used some 220 specific events of his tour in RVN as a basic outline and arranged them with a time line pulled from the letters he wrote home to Patience. Patience had salvaged all his letters from the garbage after Mason had thrown them out.

When it came to getting published however, luck played a significant role when a friend, Martin Cruz Smith, who later became well known as the bestselling author of *Gorky Park* and others, introduced Mason to his literary agent. He was very impressed with Mason's preliminary manuscript and suggested he write a memoir rather than a novel, but cautioned him about getting his hopes too high. From there on, it was a matter of time, focus, hard work and multiple revisions, but nine-months later, Viking press surprised him with an advance of \$2,500 for the first part and offered the same for the next two parts. To this day, Mason states that he doesn't think there was

anything special about himself, or his Vietnam experiences and he is continually surprised by the success of the book and all the attention he has received as a result. He indicates that he is willing to talk about his book at the Orlando Reunion with members and will be happy to sign copies.

Mason was also very surprised by the events that led to his spending two years in the Eglin Federal Prison for helping smuggle marijuana into the U.S. This experience is the core of Mason's sequel *Chickenhawk: Back in the World* published in 1993. This sequel did not achieve anything like the commercial success of *Chickenhawk* and when I asked why Mason wrote the sequel he said, "I only wanted to write a no bullshit follow-up to *Chickenhawk*." It is that indeed.

If for some reason you haven't read *Chickenhawk* or its sequel *Chickenhawk: Back in the World*, I recommend you do so. Penguin Books published a paperback fifth edition of *Chickenhawk* with photos and a new afterword in 2005 (ISBN: 9780143035718). The afterword provides many of the real names and actual units with whom he served, rather than the pseudonyms used in the earlier editions. As for *Chickenhawk: Back in the World*, you can get a copy from Amazon for \$49.50, try E-bay for a more affordable copy, or go to your local library and ask for an inter-library loan if they don't have a copy.
