INCOMING MAIL

If you belong to VHPA and read the newsletter, you see that I have borrowed one of their bylines. I receive copies of all of the "Letters to the Editor" from VHPA, and recently one in particular caught my attention. It was from the cousin of a helicopter casualty in RVN seeking contact with anyone who knew his cousin, Robert K. Cole of C/158.

Robert Cole was the co-pilot when Nick Saunders aircraft was lost. The author of the letter wanted nothing more than to know his cousin a little better. I contacted the author, Greg Howard, to let him know his letter had been received. I told him I did not know his cousin or the circumstances of the crash, but sent him one of the cooler cups we had made in New Orleans with the Phoenix patch on one side and the memorial listing of Phoenix casualties on the other, which included Robert K. Cole.

A few weeks later, Greg was in town and we had dinner. He was

curious, and glad to know what type of unit his cousin was in, where he was stationed, what type of a/c he flew, what our unit patch looked like, etc., which was about all I could provide. I did tell Greg that we had a network of about 90 Phoenix and that I would pass along his request to correspond with anyone who knew Kenny Cole. As near as I can determine, Cole graduated from flight school in Class 69-49 in late Feb 70, and was only in country a few weeks before his death. If you have any information you might want to share with Greg, please let me know and I'll put in touch with him.


four days; completely surrounded by intelligence estimate of anywhere from two to four thousand NVA; went without water for three days with the exception of licking some leaves for morning dew and yet, I was one of the lucky ones. Out of a company of about 130 men, only twenty of us made it through the entire battle.

So what does that have to do with you? Well, I read the book, "Hamburger Hill" and it just didn't seem quite right. I got in touch with some of the guys from my company and they all agreed that the book wasn't correct. I am looking for anyone who might know something about the battle, anyone who has any pictures of Hamburger Hill and two fearless pilots by the names of William W. Cooper (W-3160726) and Eric M. Raidon (W-3161908) or any other pilot or crew who flew during that battle.

I am including a listing of names and addresses that I have collected. Any help that you could give me would be greatly appreciated.

Again, thank you for your time and I hope that I didn't ramble and bore you.
