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Dennis Fujii film interview by Marshall at Las Vegas VHPA in 2002

Fujii was shot down on Ranger North in Laos, Feb. 18th, directed AC-130 gunships above him, at 12,500 feet, Phoenix CO Major Jim Loyd and Cpt. David Nelson, my former platoon leader, got him off. They were shot up and crashed in flames on Hill 30, just south of Ranger North. They were rescued by two additional Phoenix birds that resulted in one more Huey left in Laos. Fujii spent one more night there, directed a FAC to bomb Ranger North. Fujii may have accounted for some 2,000 NVA losses due to AC-130 and fastmover jet strikes. Major Raydean Patterson, Ghostriders CO and "Hog," his crewchief told Marshall the story of not taking fire as they departed the Firebase. "Hog" told Marshall in Colorado Springs in 2008 "it was weird, I saw *hundreds* of NVA running, in the direction of our aircraft, with weapons down, (with the free hand) pointing fingers at our Huey. They didn't shoot and I didn't either."

Harold Smith tells of the experience, followed by audio from Cpt. Dale Peterson with a 174th cockpit recording. Captain Baker, a former Phoenix, was acting CO of the Ghostriders. You hear Cpt. Baker calling "we're hit" Lt. Col. Peachey radioed him "are you ready to go in?" The replacement Ghost rider lead, after observing two Blue Stars shot down, a Joker gun shot down and his lead shot up, replied "Rodger, give us the word and we'll be rolling in." The Ghost rider then took hits from the .51 calibre machinegun and Lt. Col. Peachey called it off. A short while later, Lt. Col. Peachey was shot down by a .51.

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Spec.4 Paul Langenour, door gunner on the gunship was the sole survivor. He walked out with ARVN soldiers and Marines 13 days later.

"MIA: A SOLDIER'S HOMECOMING."

The Story of Major Jack Barker and Crew lost going back in for a third attempted extraction at Firebase Brown, March 20, 1971. The Ghostriders had 6 of 9 aircraft shot down in the morning mission. The remaining 3 were shot up rescuing the 6 shot down. Lt. Jon Evans and WO1 John Madden, Black Widows, C Co., 101st Avn. Btn., volunteered as Chalk 2, immediately behind them.

Historical observations and thoughts:

The Cooper Church Amendment was the predominate factor in the Laotian defeat of the ARVN, by the NVA (PAVN). The ARVN lacked their US advisors accompanying them on the ground. The lack of guidance and english communications was very simply, caused by the US Congress passing the Cooper Church Amendment. There were other contributing factors, but none as obvious.

Captain Jerry Crews at LZ Lolo and Dennis Fujii at Ranger North were the proof of that observation.

The singular importance of an American on the ground with the ARVN's was demonstrated by Sp. 5 Fujii at Ranger North and Hill 30. The fact that the NVA were ordered to let him go, was one of the most surreal events in military history.

In the Easter Offensive, 1972, 17 NVA regiments swept into Quang Tri Province. They were halted by one battalion of south vietnamese Marines at Hue, aided by a river and a US Marine Air Naval Gunfire Liason Company, which had men at Alpha-2, Dong Ha and Hue.

By June, 1972, two south vietnamese Marine Battalions fought to take back Quang Tri with US air and naval gunfire support. They retook the city of Quang Tri and the Citadel in September, 1972.

Whatever private agreement President Nixon and Henry Kissenger had with SVN leaders Thieu and Ky, ended with Watergate and his resignation. There was no air support from the US in 1974 through May, 1975.

Saigon fell, directly as a result of the US Congress, cutting off military assistance. A Political Failure for the U.S.

Finally, the total commitment to accomplishing the mission for Allies by Music 16, has gone unrecognized far too long in the Army Aviation family.
