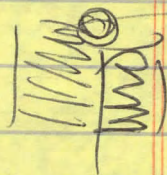

Review of LAM Son 719 / Panna Gulf

an end to the senselessness

now had endured his son's. Eleanor's mother made a big to-do about "how pretty" Steve's purple heart was. I was filled with revulsion, the way the women carried on about the medal, like a piece of jewelry. My wife didn't understand my feelings. Later that day, Mike and Carol came to me and said they were going to get married immediately, would we please drive them to Georgia. That evening, we drove them to Georgia where they applied for their marriage license and blood test. The next day, they were married and a few days later, Mike returned to the 163rd Aviation Company at Camp Eagle. His trip back had to be hell, bouncing between the emotions of burying his best friend, getting married and returning to South Vietnam from stateside.

September 21, 1971

Camp Evans, I Corps, Republic of Vietnam

The Phoenix Company, Charlie Company, 158th Aviation Battalion, 101st Airborne Division, Airmobile, was being stood down. In other words, the unit was being deactivated and the pilots were being incorporated into other units, which would eventually leave Vietnam earlier than their scheduled 12-month tour. The retreat from I Corps was nearing the end.

In the Phoenix 2nd Platoon hootch at Camp Evans, a small group of pilots gathered around the Phoenix Company emblem. It was a large, flag-sized emblem which adorned the Officer's club. It had the Vietnamese Phoenix drawn on it, by an early Phoenix in 1969. In a fitting tradition with the mythology of the Phoenix, which occurs in both eastern and western cultures, the remaining pilots wrote the names of all those they could remember who served with the Phoenix. They ceremoniously set it ablaze, returning the Phoenix to ashes.

So ended the Phoenix presence in Camp Evans and the Republic of Vietnam.

Unknown at the time, Phoenix Commanding Officers would earn their places in history.

mountain winds and enemy fire.

As we came in on short final, one quarter mile from the pickup zone (pz), Nelson said, "Get on the controls (with me), very lightly." Another chill down my spine. This was it! The real thing. Just in case he was shot, I was supposed to be ready to takeover the controls. As we came to a hover, the crew chief shouted, "About ten yards forward, sir, about five yards to the right." The controls were moving furiously, but the bird was at a hover. Nelson was working feverishly to maintain a hover just below a mountain ridge line without much in the way of visual aids, and his piloting was complicated by mountain winds. I kept my hands just off the controls. The Green Beret sergeant in our cargo bay looked over the side and said, "We're clear to drop, sir." Nelson said, "Drop 'em."

The three 150-foot ropes went over the side. We were taking fire. I looked over the side of my armor plate. There were yellow tracers back and forth below us, wisps of white smoke from NVA rocket propelled grenades, and concussion of Redskin 2.75 inch rockets going off all around us. I quickly looked back inside the cockpit, watched Nelson, and did not look out again. I became as small as I could behind my chest "chicken plate" and behind the armored sliding door to my right.

I watched Nelson holding it a hover, the sounds of rockets and grenades ignored. He was mentally focused, shutting down distractions in his mind. Fear would not disrupt the job at hand.

The crew chief called, "They're all hooked up, sir." Then Nelson said, "Ok, coming up." Nelson then called on the radio, "Chalk One, coming out." Chalk two, on short final called, "Is it hot?" "Affirmative" responded Nelson. With three passengers attached to the "strings" by "McGuire rigs" we went straight up about 500 feet, with slight forward movement once the men on strings clear of the trees. We climbed up to the bottom of the clouds at 4,500 feet and continued southeast away from danger. Our time at a hover was something less than thirty seconds. It seemed like an hour.

The same action was repeated by the other three Phoenix birds, all in less than four minutes.

About twelve miles northwest of Quang Tri near the Firebase Camp Carrol was a large river valley. There we descended to a large sand bar and hovered down with the men still on the ropes. They were so tired and cold from being carried at 4,500 feet, dangling from ropes in forty degree temperatures that they simply couldn't move. The crewmen carried them into our cargo bay. We flew them back to Quang Tri and then headed home for the night at Camp Evans.

BIOGRAPHY OF W. THOMAS MARSHALL, JR.

Tom Marshall was born on July 28, 1949 in the town of Martinsville, Virginia. At the age of four, his parents moved to Pensacola, Florida, where his father was an employee of the Chemstrand Nylon Plant. He graduated high school in 1967 from Pensacola High School. (Fragment)--(Having played the flute in the band his sophomore year and football as a defensive guard his junior and senior years, lettering both years.) He attended Florida State University in 1968 and 1969. In 1969, he enlisted in the United States Army in the Warrant Officer Rotary Wing Pilot course. He served one year in Vietnam.

During his tour in Vietnam, he received the bronze star for meritorious service after two months of action with the 4th Infantry Division at An Khe. At the end of his twelve month tour, he received 22 air medals representing 1087 hours of combat flying time.

During his time in Vietnam, he flew for the 1st Brigade, 4th Infantry Division for three months. He then moved to C-Company, Assault Helicopter Company, 158th Aviation Battalion, known as the "Phoenix". On January 21, 1971, he was transferred to 163rd Aviation Company at Camp Eagle, I Corps, which, at that time, was designated Road Runners and shortly thereafter changed their call sign to Woodstock.

Woodstock One-Three was his call sign with the 163rd Aviation Company of the 101st Airborne Division during LAM SON 719 and the demoralizing withdrawal period of the war.

When he returned to "the world" in 1971, he served as an instructor pilot in OH-58 Kiowa's transitioning air force jet pilots into helicopter pilots, as well as army fixed wing aviators and foreign students. During that time, he completed his Bachelor of Science degree in business administration at Troy State University and used his GI Bill to attain a commercial multi-engine, instrument airplane rating.

He entered the real estate appraisal business in Dothan, Alabama in 1973, moving back to his home town of Pensacola in 1975 where he still resides and remains in the appraisal business working throughout Florida and the southeastern United States.

My Search for peace was a far deeper journey, not in the direction I'd first suspected studying the history, personal stories and political <sup>scenery</sup> helped, at least I was doing something to construct, to let go of its anger, frustration and shattered beliefs of right, <sup>thing</sup> justice, fate, religion.

It was reacquainting with those I'd served with, a bond of shared experiences and understanding, who, <sup>just as I,</sup> also put those deep feelings aside and rejoined a war weary society in the throes of political upheaval societal change.

The Chicago meeting was <sup>the beginning of a series,</sup> not to re-enact or relive the experience, but to honor the memory of all who served, <sup>confirming</sup> sharing the experience, <sup>the questions and answers</sup> and memories of those who were lost. To us, the names on the wall <sup>shared those times with,</sup> were <sup>these</sup> people we'd

For these groups were bonds of friendship, understanding and appreciation were rekindled. I had always tried to keep those experiences in their own little mental box.

on October 1990 It was not until the ceremony at Arlington where we shared grief, in the <sup>communal not just ceremonial gathering</sup> of their <sup>congregation of those who cared</sup> families, friends, the military honor guards, doing their duty <sup>personally</sup> <sup>at home</sup> surprisingly large number of active duty Rangers, NCOs and Generals alike, crowded <sup>into</sup> the small chapel <sup>along</sup> with a dozen pilots who'd flown with them. <sup>In</sup> that <sup>moment</sup> in our minds, <sup>finally we</sup> could <sup>put</sup> them to rest, in a place of honor, no longer having <sup>only</sup> in our memories, as unanchored <sup>spirits</sup> <sup>lost</sup> <sup>so long ago.</sup>

It was then I realized, we had never had the opportunity to share the grief that only grew over the years. It was in the words of Blyth/Talley that I realized



there was not a dry eye in the chapel  
from PFC to General, Friends or relatives.  
It would be too instant, that I regained  
a sense of appreciation of our national service,  
our honor as a people who served <sup>their country</sup>, knowing  
those sacrificed, and the realization  
that history would eventually find these losses  
and wounds into the fabric that weaved  
our social consciousness. <sup>As a nation we must stand</sup>  
of the sacrifices demanded by of those  
in national service. the value of  
these individual sacrifices in carrying out  
our national policies and destiny <sup>and much more vivid and general today than in 1971</sup>

As long as the nation exists, there will  
be young men willing, even anxious to serve  
their country in armed conflict,

May the policymakers, leaders and politicians  
not like the call to arms lightly, it's not  
a job (even into a "volunteer" army). It's not  
just an adventure, <sup>it is the ultimate reality of</sup> its life and death.  
It is dreams realized and shattered, of families  
at home, living on the ragged edge of hope and prayer,  
<sup>knowing that</sup> while a son or daughter performs dangerous  
duties, to fulfill the national resolve,  
whether right or wrong, <sup>as</sup> which the military  
<sup>person</sup> are sworn to dutifully carry on. It is  
in those traditions, willing to sacrifice  
themselves, that engenders our national will  
and defends our Freedom, as long  
as we are prepared and committed to  
defend it, in the spirit of our  
forebears, from Lexington Massachusetts  
to LZ Hoi An, Mogadishu, Somalia  
and wherever, ~~not~~ whenever.

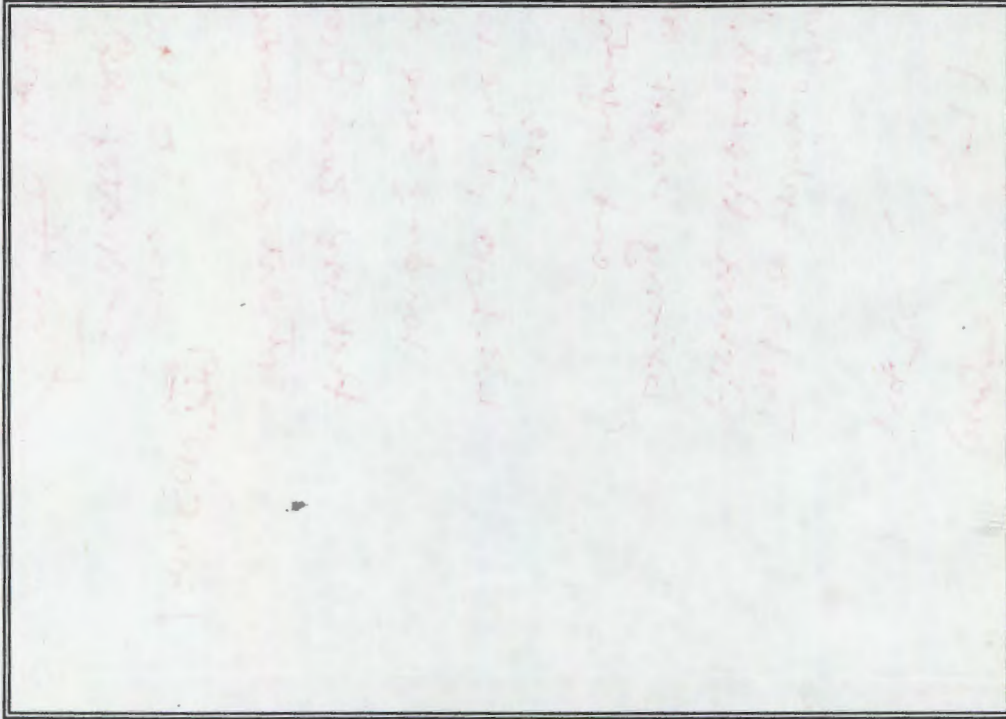

~~I apologize for not formally addressing you by your rank. I do not know whether you're on active duty or retired at present. However, please find enclosed a copy of my manuscript I am working on.~~

Initially, I began the story, covering my time in flight school through my service in Vietnam.

My personal service began on August 18, <sup>*as a W.O.I*</sup> with the 4th Infantry Division at An Khe. I was transferred to the Phoenix on November 20, 1970. After an active two months there, I was transferred to the 163rd Aviation Company at Camp Eagle where I finished my tour.

*(Company, 158th Aviation Battalion, 101st Airborne Division)*  
As I began writing the story nearly two years ago, I began to realize it was difficult to understand the actions in Laos without setting up the history in I Corps. Ripcord was the largest single helicopter "retrograde" action. Other than the move into Cambodia, there may have been other similar large scale operations, but none *that* approached the magnitude of Laos, where as many as 120 lift birds were used in one mission.

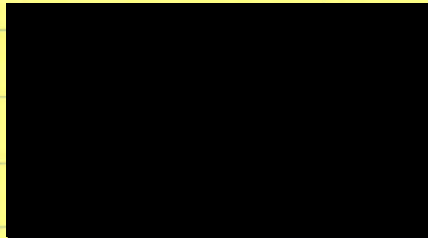

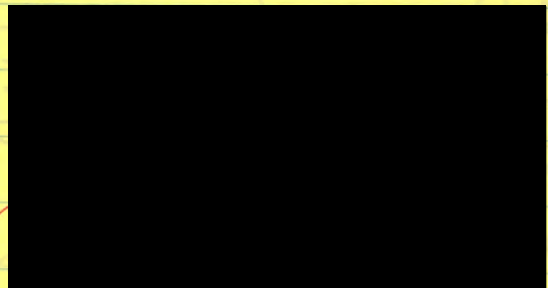
