Monthly News Letter

1 September 1968

August was another eventful month for the "old" 50th Med. I say "old" because on 14 August 1968 the official designation of the unit was changed to the Air Ambulance Platoon, 326th Medical Battalion, 101st Airborne Division (Airmobile). In an impressive ceremony the new colors were presented to Major Cloke by LTC Bernhard T. Mittermeyer, Commander of the 326th Medical Battalion. The 50th is not gone, the colors will either remain in Vietnam to be taken by another unit, or go back to the states, where they can again lead the way at the front of a newly formed Detachment. We hope that the colors will mean as much to these new people as they have to us.

Again this month, the sound of building filled the area. More living space was needed for the growing strength of the platoon. The Seabees arrived and erected three new buildings for quarters, and one for the 326th Headquarters. This was an unexpected happening for us, for the first time since our arrival, we were not building, wiring or plumbing. We enjoyed the change! Sidewalk superintendents were plentiful, but the fooling was plain; given the materials we could have done better.

In the early afternoon of 25 August, during action near Hue, SP4 Martin was wounded in the right arm and side by enemy automatic weapons fire. He was immediately evacuated to the 22nd Surgical Hospital at Phu Bai for treatment. On 23 August SP4 Martin was awarded the Purple Heart Medal by LTC Mittermeyer and now James Martin is on his way home. Our best goes out to SP4 Martin, he was an excellant crew chief, and we are all proud of him. His actions during the day of the 25th has earned for him a recommendation for the Silver Star Medal for extraordinary gallantry, above and beyond the call of duty.
