Extensive mine clearing operations, though not pure CA projects, in and around rubber plantations allowed people access to work areas, thus, improving and maintaining the economy. Road and bridge repair accomplished the same result. Increased ICAPs improving ~~knowledge~~ of area.

12. Selected civic action projects having particular human interest appeal making them suitable for publication:

Mine sweeping operations (see 11 above) were conducted jointly with RVNAF elements after extensive training of personnel. Thus, the operations accomplished many objectives; saved lives, improved and maintained economy, trained RVNAF, and improved GVN image through RVNAF participation. Increased ICAPs, MEDCAPs, DENTCAPs, improving health of local population.
