The support by the 7/11 Artillery was excellent in view of the extremely large AO. Very effective covering fire, as well as direct fire support was provided.

- (3) Divarty

C 3/13 Arty (15 May - 2 June 70)

The support from Division Artillery was both timely and effective. The use of selfpropelled howitzers implemented and complemented a plan that required extreme mobility of the maneuver battalions. The support and coordination with the 1st Bde was extremely good.

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## b. US Army Aircraft:

(1) 1st Brigade Aviation Section - This the aviation support section for the brigade consisting of 5 light observation helicopters. Support provided included both administrative and tactical missions. The close support and cooperation between the brigade and the aviation section contributed to overcoming many of the control problems innerent with operating in a large area of operations.

(2) 187 AHC every day except 15, 18, 19, 23, 25, 29 & 30 May and 8, 12, 20, 22-24 & 26 June 70; 116 AHC on 19 & 23 May 70 and 8, 12, 15, 20, 22 & 26 June 70; 118 AHC on 22, 25 & 29 May 70; 128 AHC on 24 June 70; and 190 AHC on 30 May 70.

(3) D Troop 3/4 Cav and 3/17 Air Cav provided the helicopter gunship and aerial reconnaissance support in the brigade area of operations. This support enabled the brigade to have an immediate strike capability in contact areas, and the assets to VR new areas for enemy troop movements, staging and supply areas.

c. US Air Force: Tactical air support was provided by the Issue Forward Air Controllers and fighter aircraft located at Bien Hoa. This support provided the airstrikes necessary for destroying enemy bunker and storage complex, and troop concentrations.

d. Engineer Support: The primary mission for Co, 65th Engr Bn & Co A, 508th Engr Bn was that of maintaining the roads in the brigade AO and development and maintenance of the forward support base. This problem was multiplied by the onset of the rainy season. Even though, faced with these problems, they kept the roads open until all US troops were withdrawn from Cambodia. Each Co also provided one water point.

e. Signal: Communications support for Operation Bold Lancer II, was provided by the organic commo platoon and B Co., 125th Signal Battalion. Communications during this operation were very good. A few problems were encountered with maintenance of the equipment. However, no major losses of rapid communication occurred. VEF communication encountered difficulty due to weather, location and equipment. And was at best adequate.

## 8. (C) Intelligence -

a. Enemy units influencing the brigade TAOI prior to the commencement of Bold Lancer II:

In addition, the territory around the "Flat Iron" and "Fishhook" and westward into Cambodia is thought to be under the control of "J-12" (Composed of an estimated 5 sections oriented about principal towns). Operating in the "J-12" area is the 92d Recovery Reft. w/ the 250th, 230th & 270th Bn's. At the outset of Bold Lancer II it was felt that the VC/NVA were hampered by personnel and logistical problems and were also involved in efforts to evacuate existing base areas and establish new ones. Although counter action by the enemy had been practically nil thus far in the Cambodian operations strong pockets of resistance were anticipated as well as counter attacks against FVMPF operating in Cambodia and along the border areas.

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b. U.S. forces were targeted against enemy supply, arms and munitions caches, bunker complexes and base areas rather than enemy troop units. The operation was characterized, as expected, by harrasing actions and numerous but sharp contacts resulting from pockets of resistance in and around VC/NVA base areas. In the course of the operation 183 separate contacts were reported including 22 attacks by fire against U.S. fire support bases and NDP's and 27 incidents of ground to air fire against aircraft supporting the 1st Brigade. Enemy units encountered were primarily engaged in hit and run tactics utilizing small groups of squad or platoon size (estimated). However in a significant number of instances (approximately 12) the units engaged were felt to have been company size and made no attempt to break contact immediately. Main force units of the 141 VC/NVA Regt. were believed to have been contacted in the portion of the TAOI to the North of Mimot and elements of the 209th VC/NVA Regt. were probably in contact on the lower eastern flanks of the 1st Brigade TAOI. The 165th VC/NVA Regt. is believed to have had elements in the eastern portion of the TAOI. The enemy troops encountered were well supplied and apparently well fed.

A total of 21 mines were detonated by U.S. forces during the operation with the majority (17) of the incidents occurring after 7 June as enemy forces began to react to the use of mechanized forces.

c. The majority of the finds insofar as base areas and caches were concerned during Bold Lancer II were found on the lower East and West flanks of the TAOI in heavily wooded terrain. Rice, medical supplies and communications equipment and facilities constituted the principal items captured during the operation. It is felt that the border areas in Cambodia were used primarily as staging, training, rest and redistribution points for main force units operating in War Zone C and the Saigon River Corridor. The main force regiments in the area were in all probability employed initially to assist in the evacuation of the base areas and to screen the area to the North of Mimot and the area to the east of the TAOI. d. Operation Cold Lance II was conducted in Cambodia North of Base Area 353 up to the Chhlong River. The area is heavily forested and rolling to the North of Mimot and heavily forested in the lower West and East portions of the TAOI. Numerous streams run North to South from the Chhlong River area. The central portion of the operational area and generally east of Mimot is rubber plantation.

Highway 7 is the principal East-West axis of movement into the area and a newly constructed road North from Katum (extension of TL4) linking with Route 7 in the central Eastern part of the TAOI provides the major North-South.

Weather during the operation was generally better than anticipated as the SW Monsoon began to effect weather conditions. Thundershowers produced slick roads but had little effect on trafficability through the 24th of May. By 31 May heavy rains had significantly affected trafficability. MSR's were not affected but the area to the North of Route 7 was beginning to deteriorate for tactical traffic. By 14 June as the full transition from the NE to the SW monsoon was completed most secondary roads were trafficable only to tracked vehicles and low areas and rice paddies were impassable. All sizeable rivers and streams were no longer fordable by this time. Rt. 7 and the MSR's remained in good condition but engineer effort was required to keep the roads in good shape.

Flying weather was generally good until the end of May when low ceilings and poor visibility due to rain became a primary consideration and airmobile and VR's as well as resupply flights were affected daily with numerous delays and cancellations encountered.

e. Terrain encountered during Phase II can be separated into two geographical areas: Viet Nam and Cambodia.

(1) Part One-Viet Nam. In Viet Nam there are two distinct types of terrain: flat and open and flat and thickly wooded. The flat and open areas offered little cover and concealment except for an occasional rice paddy dike. Observation was good creating good fields of fire. The most critical terrain feature was Katum which was at the axis of main supply routes. In this area most heavy traffic is limited to primary roads. Along the roads around Katum there were three water obstacles which had to be bridged. Originally the open areas were trafficable by tracked vehicles allowing numerous avenues of approach. However by the middle of June many of the open areas were too wet to sustain mech infantry. Throughout the area infantry troops moved without hindrance.

The thickly wooded areas afforded good cover and concealment especially in double and triple canopy and in many places where there was dense undergrowth. Often visibility was limited to a few feet, restricting the observation and fields of fire. Dense underbrush created obstacles for mechanized units often by restricting trafficability. Avenues of approach were primarily on roads for mech units although they were able to operate in wooded areas with limited effectiveness. The other infantry elements however were not restricted to any great extent.

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(2) Part Two Cambodia: In Cambodia as in Viet Nam there were two distinct types of terrain. Rolling and open and rolling and thickly wooded. The rolling and open offered no concealment but cover was available between the numerous hills and in the numerous draws and stream beds. Observation was generally good, as were fields of fire, although in the more hilly areas hills and draws created some dead space. The open areas presented no obstacles to the infantry units. The mechanized units generally operated at will, although as the wet season continued, swollen streams and marshy areas presented definite obstacles to tracked vehicles.

The rolling and heavily forested sections comprised most of the area of operation. In these areas cover and concealment were generally good especially in the double and triple canopy portions. In these areas overhead visibility was greatly limited and forward visibility was restricted often to a few meters. These thickly wooded areas cut down observation and fields of fire greatly with the thick foliage and the large number of hills and draws that were present. Again tracked vehicles experienced difficulty with some streams and with the extremely wooded areas. This difficulty increased as the rains continued.

There was only one critical terrain feature, a small mountain vic XU2419. The mountain was of such height that its possession provided excellent observation and fields of fire. It was reported that a large element was in control of it and had artillery on it. This mountain was engaged with artillery and Air Strikes. Open rolling areas offered good movement to mech vehicles however wheeled vehicles were limited to MSR's to a large extent after the wet season was in full progress. For the infantry there were unlimited avenues of approach. The mechanized infantry often could not take their vehicles far into wooded areas. For the most part, avenues of approach in open areas were unlimited.

f. When the Brigade assumed control of the TAOI in the Fishhook on 14 May, the population was somewhat stabilized. The population was centered along highway 7 and concentrated in MEMUT, (MEMOT) city area. The portion of the TAOI which lay within the borders of Viet Nam was completely devoid of civilian personnel or civilian dwellings. The maps of the area are outdated and inaccurate. On the Cambodian side too, the maps misrepresented a number of villages in size and located many as much as 1,000 meters from its actual location. For example: PH SOTAY, XT271988 does not exist; PH DENG is not correctly named, it is KOM OM, XT343978; CHAM MUL, XT369981 is actually XT358981. The villages are primarily located in and around Memut Rubber Plantation. Also in an area west and southwest of KH TAR, XT195034. The times of Peak travel are between 0600 and 0800, 1100 and 1200 and between 1600 and 1900. The heaviest traffic is along the roads and Highway 7. The network of trails connecting village to village and village to road are utilized with varying frequency and at irregular periods. However, the peak travel periods can also be ascribed to the trails.

The attitudes of the people were almost wholly friendly, cooperative, and responsive. Cambodians offered information on VC/NVA activities. They were not prejudiced by enemy propaganda nor by incidents resulting from tactical operations. During cordon and search operations in the city of Memut (Memot), civilians offered assistance to US troops and responded to instructions with alacrity. The civilians pointed out caches. Previously during refugee operations, the civilians led US troops to a location where several VC were.

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The operations to rebuild and resettle XOM ON Hamlet manifested two prevailing attitudes: 1) strong Anti-VC/NVA feeling and 2) cooperation and friendliness. These civilians offered to help fight the VC/NVA, informed on VC/NVA movement in the TAOI was favorable because commanders used discretion in the employment of fire power and precluded bad feelings when incidents occurred by providing prompt medical attention for the civilians involved.

9. (C) Mission: 1st Bde, 25th Infantry Division moved into assigned TAOR on 15 May 70, north of Katum, to locate and destroy enemy supply depots, staging areas, equipment and personnel.
10. (C) Concept of Operations: The 1st Brigade, 25th Infantry Division operation into base area 353 was conducted in two phases;

Phase I was the movement of the brigade and its attached units; on 14 and 15 May to the new AO north of Katum. This phase also saw the 1/11 ACR become OPCON to the brigade along with the 11th Arvn Airborne Battalion. The brigade was also preparing to assume the 1st Cav(AM) responsibilities in place.

Phase II was the start of operations of all units attached to the 1st Bde, in there assigned AO's.

11. (C) Execution (see overlay) Operation Bold Lancer II was an offensive move into Base Area 353 and Cambodia on a search and destroy mission to limit the enemy's capability for resupply and offensive action into South Vietnam. The order for the operation was issued on 15 May 70. Actual operations begin on 16 May 70.

### Operations 16 May

Significant actions during the day were:

1130 hrs - A 3/22 Inf at XU 372007 found 15 bunkers, 12 hootches, 30x150 lb bags of rice, 3 storage bunkers, cooking utensils and clothes, 7 bicycles, 4 hacksaws, 1x100 lb bag of salt and 6x60mm mortar rounds.

1345 hrs - B 1/5 Inf(M) at XT 253997 received S/A fire. Fire was returned with organic weapons and LFT. Fire ceased at 1600 hours. Results - 2 US WIA.

1610 hrs - D troop 1/11 ACR at XU 315115 received RPG and S/A fire from the south. Negative casualties.

2000 hrs - C 1/5 Inf at Tay Ninh Base Camp was fired upon with an M-16 while attending a floor show by one individual. Results - 2 US KIA, 14 WIA from the 1/5 Inf(M), 1 WIA from Bde, 1 WIA from 3/22 Inf. Man involved was apprehended. Results for the day were: 15 bunkers, 12 hootches, 30x150 lb bags of rice, 3 storage bunkers, 4 bicycles, 4 hacksaws, 1x100 lb bag of salt, 6x60mm mortar rounds, 2 US KIA and 16 US WIA. Communications were already established. Artillery support was primarily on intelligence targets.

### Operations 17 May

There were no significant contacts on 17 May 70. The activity centered around large cache finds of which the 3/22 Inf was the largest. Results of the day were: See Incl 3.

### Operations 18 May

On the 18th of May there were no significant contacts. Again the activity centered around cache finds. The days results were: 84 bunkers, 1x107RKT, 14x82mm mortar rounds, 28x100 lb bags of corn, 4x4/T mines, 6x55 gal drums of diesel, 18x200 lb bags of rice, 10 SKS's, 12 hootches, 2 kitchens, 1 tunnel complex, 1-M 60 MG, 1-CC HG, 1-AK-47, 2800 rounds AK ammo, 1-master control box for intercom, 5 rolls of plastic, 1-thompson sub MG and 1-BAR. 2/12 Inf OPCON to 1st Bde.

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## Operations 19 May

On the 19th of May contacts with the enemy were very light. The emphasis was again on the finding of supply depots and storage areas. Results were:

0900 hrs - Sots 1/5 Inf(M) at XU 243016 located 6x200K 10 bags of rice. Also destroyed 20 bunkers and 15 hootches.

0915 hrs - D 3/22 Inf at XU 354048 located and destroyed 16 bunkers, and 2 bicycles.

0945 hrs - D 3/22 Inf at XU 357057 located and destroyed 12 bunkers.

1015 hrs - A 1/5 Inf(M) at XT 233986 located a hospital complex of 130 to 150 bunkers, 50 hootches, 3 kitchens, 10 lbs documents, 10x200 kilo bags of rice.

1100 hrs - 1/5 Inf(M) at XU 400065 located 3 hootches and 600lbs of medical supplies.

1100 hrs - D 3/22 Inf at XU 360049 found 1 jeep(diesel) and 6 bicycles.

1130 hrs - D 3/22 Inf at XU 351037 located and destroyed 42 bunkers, also one 30' concrete observation tower.

1330 hrs - Sots 1/5 Inf(M) at XU 235020 located 1 intercom control box, 1xCC table telephone, 1xCC field phone, 1xUS EES phone, 750 rusty AIC rounds, 1 homemade radio, 25pcs of cookware, 44x200kilo bags of rice, 4 hootches and 5 bunkers.

1400 hrs - B 2/12 Inf at XU 288038 located and destroyed 20 bunkers, 4 animal pens, 4 classrooms.

1840 hrs - B 3/22 Inf at XU 370001 located a hospital complex with 10 bamboo hootches, 10 bunkers, 5 large hootches and 25 lbs of documents.

The above actions summarize the results of the day.

## Operations 20 May

20 May was marked by a slight increase in enemy activity with the uncovering of supplies and munition still on a high level. The significant actions of the day were:

0945 hrs - B 3/22 Inf at XU 284036 observed one individual at 50 meters. Engaged with organic weapons. Individual returned with S/A fire. FC immediately. Sweep of area found 10 tons of rice.

0955 hrs - A 1/5 Inf(M) at XU 223003 received S/A and RPG fire from an DSEF. Returned with organic weapons and LFT. Fire ceased at 1045. Results: 2 US KIA, 5 US WIA, enemy results unknown.

1105 hrs - B 3/22 Inf at XU 370001 received S/A fire from 2-5 individuals. Returned with organic weapons and LFT. Fire ceased at 1115 hrs. Results: 2 US WIA; enemy losses - 4 hootches, 4 cases of glass vials and tubing.

1245 hrs - A 1/5 Inf(M) at XU 228008 received S/A fire from 5 individuals in a bunker. Returned with organic weapons, flame, LFT and air strikes. Fire ceased at 1415 hrs. Enemy losses; 1 bunker destroyed, 6 NVA KIA, 7 RPG rounds, 1 SKS and a small amount of documents.

1255 hrs - A 2/12 Inf engaged 1 individual at XT 381987 with organic weapons. FC at 1325. Results: 3 VC KIA, 1 RPG and 1xAK-47.

1255 hrs - A 2/12 Inf at XT 381990 engaged 1 NVA with organic weapons. FC immediately. No friendly casualties, enemy losses unknown.

Results of the days actions were: 2 US KIA, 7 US WIA. Enemy losses were: 9 NVA KIA, captured - 1xAK-47, 1 SKS, 1 sewing machine, 10 lbs of copper, 30 rds small cal pistol, 1920 AK rounds, 40 lbs of salt, 7 bicycles tires, 7 bicycles, 2 cross cut saws, 4 cases of glass vials and tubing, 100lbs of sugar, 620lbs of medical supplies, 26,100lbs of rice; destroyed - 56 hootches, 27bxs, 2x200 kilo bags of rice, 1 messhall, showers, latrine and 3 bikes. FSB West II closed, WT 3493, Hq 2/12 Inf moved to Katum.

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Operations 21 May

The 21st of May saw the release of OPCON the 1/5 Inf(M) and 1/11 ACR. The 2/60 & 4/23 Inf(M) were received OPCON at the same time. The most significant results are as follows:

1040 hrs - A 3/22 Inf at XU365058 located and destroyed 10 bunkers and one tower.

1040 hrs - C 3/22 Inf at XU352069 located and destroyed 11 tin hootches.

1130 hrs - A 2/12 Inf at XT369979 destroyed 5 hootches, 5 bunkers, 100 rounds AK ammo, 2-CC HGs, and 2 lbs of documents.

1325 hrs - A 2/12 Inf at XT374973 located and destroyed 5 tons of moldy rice.

1530 hrs - D 3/4 Cav IOH at XT395945 received S/A ground fire. IOH was shot down resulting in 1 US KIA and 2 US WIA.

1530 hrs - A 2/12 Inf at XT374973 located and destroyed 800 lbs of rice, 1500 AK rounds, 3-CC HG's, 10 bunkers and 10 hootches.

Total result for the day were: 1 US KIA, 2 US WIA. Enemy losses: 25 bunkers, 1 tower, 26 hootches, 5 tons of rice and 1500 AK rounds.

Operations 22 May

Action on the 22nd of May was light with cache sites also being scarce. The significant actions were:

1052 hrs - A 4/23 Inf(M) at XT236995 received S/A fire from an USEF. Fire was returned with organic weapons and artillery. Results were: 3 US WIA, 3 enemy KIA and 1 POW. A sweep of the area located 1-1gt MG, 2-CCHG, 2-RPG, 2-AK-47 magazines, 6 canteens and 1½ tons of rice.

1230 hrs - C 4/23 Inf(M) at XT230990 located 8 hootches, 4 bunkers, 24-40 lb bags of cloth, 1 sewing machine, medical supplies, 1 bicycle, furniture, play-pins, 1 set of hairclippers, 1 CC sub MG.

1830 hrs - D 2/12 Inf at XT378973 located and destroyed 6 bunkers and 3 hootches.

1850 hrs - Recon 2/12 Inf at XT379964 located and destroyed 50 bunkers.

1900 hrs - Sots 2/12 Inf at XT375967 located and destroyed 150 bunkers.

Operation 23 May

The operations on the 23rd of May were marked by the late afternoon contact involving the 4/23 Inf(M). Significant activities for the day were:

1550 hrs - A 4/23 Inf(M) at XT225998 located a large bunker and hootch complex of 50 bunkers and 20 hootches, 4 messhalls, 68-200 lb bags of rice, 1 tape recorder and maps of the area.

1745 hrs - A & C 4/23 Inf(M) at XT225005 received S/A, RPG, A/W, 51 cal. fire and rifle grenades from an USEF. Fire was returned with organic weapons, artillery, LFT, shadow, airstrike, and Psyops ship. Fire ceased at 1055 hrs. Results: 1 US KIA, 9 US WIA. Enemy losses were 5 NVA KIA.

The rapid reaction of all support troops to the above contact provided a means for breaking contact and exploiting the enemy on the ground.

Operations 24 May

The operations during the day on 24 May was marked by 2 contacts with very small supply finds. The significant actions for the day were:

0930 hrs - C 2/60 Inf at XU323084 located rice barrels with rice, 607 shirts, 205 pants, 1-NVA canteen, 1 hammock, 1 chinese lock, 1 Civ truck, 1 motor bike, and 26x36" florescent bulbs.

1105 hrs - A 4/23 Inf(M) at XU225014 had 2 tracks hit command detonated mines at different locations, they also received S/A, AK and RPG fire from an USEF. Returned fire with organic weapons, artillery and LFT. Fire ceased at 1230 hrs with sporadic fire until 1600 hrs. Results: 8 US WIA, 2 tracks combat loss; Enemy losses - 8 NVA KIA.

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1130 hrs - D 2/12 Inf located and destroyed bunker complex of 63 bunkers.  
1625 hrs - Ranger Team 12 at XT382972 located a bunker complex with medical supplies and rice. At 1630 hrs, received heavy S/A, A/W and M-79 fire. Returned with organic weapons, artillery, gunships, and airstrike. Fire ceased at 1700 hrs. Results: 2 US KIA.

Operations 25 May

Contacts on the 25th of May were generally limited to engagements of 3 or 4 individuals for short periods of time. Cache finds were marked by the large cache found by the 2/12 Inf. Results of the day were:  
0720 hrs - D 3/22 Inf at XU371090 engaged 3-4 NVA with organic weapons. Enemy returned fire with S/A. Results: 2 NVA KIA, 1 AK-50, 150 rounds of 51 cal. ammo, 3 RPG rounds, assorted clothing, 1 lb medical supplies, 1 NVA shovel, 3 CCHG's, 1 poncho and  $\frac{1}{4}$  lb of documents.  
1500 hrs - B 2/12 Inf at XT384975 located 9-5 gallon cans, 1000 units of assorted medical supplies, 21 cans containing assorted vitamins, 1-8" CC claymore, 1 CCHG, 10 lbs of documents, 140-220 lb bags of rice, 160 XM-60 rounds, 5 US steel pots; Destroyed - 2 CC claymores, 150-5 gal containers, 2 boxes of vitamin pills, 2 sewing machines, 1 sewing machine table, 1 circular saw, 5-100 lb bags bed linen; Enemy losses - 4 NVA KIA.

Operations 26 May

Operations on the 26th of May were highlighted by the predawn attack on A 2/60 Inf. The remainder of the contacts were light and of short duration. The significant actions were:

0440 hrs - A 2/60 Inf at XU288106 received S/A, A/W, and RPG fire from an USEF. Returned fire with organic weapons, LFT and NH. Fire ceased at 0630 hrs. Results: 4 US KIA, 21 US WIA; enemy results unknown.

0930 hrs - D 3/22 Inf at XU394087 on recon of area, received S/A fire. Returned fire with organic weapons and LFT. FC at 1015 hrs. Results: 7 NVA KIA, 1 US WIA. 3/22 Inf move to new AO west of Katum, 4/23 Inf(M) shift north.

1715 hrs - B 2/12 Inf at XT394975 received S/A and A/W fire from an USEF in all directions. Returned fire with organic weapons, 2 FT and FAC, Blue Box and C&C ship. Results: 5 US WIA, 1 US KIA. Enemy losses unknown.

Total results of the day were: 3 carbines, 2 SKS's, 1 lgt MG, 1 M-14, 3 CCK54, 1 rifle grenade launcher, 7.4 tons of rice, 5 RPG, 7 rounds, 25 lbs of documents, 1 backpack, 1 mortar aiming stake, 60 pieces roofing metal, 4 bikes, 4 ponchos, 8 bunkers and 1 willis jeep.

Operations 27 May

Action was light on the 27th of May with no significant cache finds. Actions for the day were:

1535 hrs - C 2/12 Inf at XT345972 received S/A fire. FC immediately. Results: 1 US WIA.

1623 hrs - Recon 2/12 Inf received S/A fire from an USEF. 1625 hrs had a confirmed 2 body count. At 1653 hrs, found two AK-47's and 6 AK magazines. At 1700 hrs in contact again. Fire ceased at 1710 hrs with 1 US WIA.

1810 hrs - Recon 3/22 Inf at XU407076 came upon a IIFB artillery convoy in contact. Results: 2 US KIA, 3 US WIA.

Results for the day: 2 US KIA, 4 US WIA, 2 ak-47's and 6 Ak magazines.

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## Operations 28 May

Activity increased the brigade AO, with several contacts occurring. Cache finds were also evident. The days actions were:  
0945 hrs - B 2/12 Inf at XT382960 engages 3 enemy armed with AK's. Enemy returned fire. No friendly casualties. Results: 1 NVA KIA and 1 AK-47.  
1300 hrs - D 2/60 Inf at XT289078 found a tub with medical supplies, rifle racks, battery, documents, diagrams explaining how to shoot down aircraft, bathtubs, CCHG's, 100-60mm rounds, bunkers, 82 mortar positions and maps.  
1445 hrs - A 2/12 Inf at XT397936 in contact with USEF. Receiving S/A, A/W and RPG fire. At 1450 hrs, received mortar fire. Fire ceased at 1725 hrs. Found a large bunker complex, 51 cal. positions, command bunker and trench.  
1525 hrs - C 3/22 Inf at XT208986 received S/A from approximately 10 individuals. Enemy results unknown. US losses - 2 WIA.  
1920 hrs - B 2/12 Inf at XT383967 received S/A and mortar fire. Fire ceased at 1945 hrs. Negative casualties or results.

## Operations 29 May

1245 hrs - Recon 3/22 Inf received S/A fire and RPG fire from 8-10 individuals, returned fire with organic weapons and artillery. Negative casualties or results.  
1525 hrs - C 3/22 Inf at XT205984 receiving S/A fire from USEF. Results: 4 US WIA.

## Operations 30 May 3/4 Cav OPCON to 1st Bde

Action on 30 May was light with few contacts being made. Very little was found in the way of supplies or equipment.  
1056 hrs - B 3/22 Inf received S/A fire from south, returned with organic weapons with negative results or casualties.  
1522 hrs - Recon 3/22 Inf with engineers received S/A fire from an estimated 8-10 individuals. Engaged with organic weapons. At 1555 hrs, fire ceased with 1 US KIA and 7 US WIA. Negative enemy results. Results for the day were minimal.

## Operations 31 May FSB Koropey open, 3/4 Cav

Operations and actions of 31 May were again very light. Most of the contact was ground to air fire involving helicopters. There were no significant contacts. Results of the day were: 197 bunkers, 50 hootches, Jeep, 1 3/4 ton truck, 2 NVA KIA. US losses: 2 WIA.

## Operations 1 June

Operations on 1 June were generally light with no significant supply or equipment finds.  
0800 hrs - A 3/22 Inf at XT210980 received S/A and RPG fire and possible mortars from an USEF. Returned with organic weapons. Results: 1 US WIA.  
0945 hrs - D 3/22 Inf at XT225992 located 9 bunkers and a possible hospital area.  
1200 hrs - A 3/4 Cav received S/A fire and RPG fire from USEF. Returned fire with organic weapons. Fire ceased at 1225 hrs. Results: 1 US WIA, 1 vehicle combat loss.  
The total for the day were: 28 hootches, 45 bunkers, 1 well, 2 bicycles, 2-82mm rounds, 3 mortar aiming stakes, 11 field phone, 10 rolls double strand commo wire, 2 intercom speakers, 3 CC claymores, 41 bags of rice, 1-45 cal pistol, 1 CCHG, 1 NVA helmet, 5000-50 cal rounds.

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Operation 2 June

Action was light on the 2d of June with only two contacts. The big find for today was a rice cache.

1345 hrs - B 2/60 Inf at XT324137 received small arms fire from USEF. Fire ceased at 1400 hrs with 3 US WIA.

1550 hrs - A 3/22 Inf at XT210980 received S/A fire from 1-2 individuals.

Returned fire with organic weapons. Results: 1 US WIA.

Total results of the day were: 1 NVA KIA, 5 RPG rounds, 3 CCHG's, 45 bunkers, 5 hootches, 1-2½ ton truck, 65,560 lbs of rice.

Operations 3 June: Lose OPCON 3/22 Inf to 3d Bde

The day was marked by numerous small contacts involving the 2/60 Inf. Results for the day were: 2 US KIA, 13 US WIA. Enemy losses: 1 NVA KIA, 1 trailer for 2½ ton truck, 292 bags of rice and 2 hootches. FSB X-Ray OCC C Trp 3/4 Cav.

Operations 4 June

4 June saw US troops receive two indirect fire attacks and one engagement resulting in 2 US KIA.

1800 hrs - A 2/12 Inf engaged an USEF with organic weapons. Fire ceased at 1900 hrs. Results: 2 US KIA.

Total results for the day were: 9 bunkers, 12 HG's, 1 hootch, 51 bags of rice, 75 lbs of medical supplies, 188 large RG's, 85 small RG's, 2-57mm RR's, 25 A/T mines, 5 British 303 rifles.

Operations 5 June through 10 June

Action during this six day period was very light. Contacts were sporadic with no significant activities. The main activities were indirect fire attacks resulting in 4 US KIA, and 30 US WIA. (See Incl 3)

The results of this period were: 2 NVA KIA, 58 hootches, 190 bunkers, 431 bags of rice, 200 lbs medical supplies, 1 telegraph key, 1 microphone, 1 headset, 1 switchboard, 1 loudspeaker, 1 tape recorder, 1 civilian type car, 1 Massey Ferguson tractor and 1-3/4 Ton trailer.

Operations 11 through 13 June

This period of time was marked by widely separated indirect fire and mining incidents. This accounts for the high number of US casualties. Contacts with the enemy were usually with 1-2 individuals.

Results for the three days were: 2 US KIA, 38 US WIA, 7 NVA KIA, 10 F/P's, 25 bags of rice, and 199 bunkers.

Operations 14 through 16 June: FSB X-Ray closed

As action continued to decrease in the brigade, results were becoming scarce. The only significant contact was on 16 June, when the 65th Eng and 588th Eng were ambushed at coordinate XT342972. Results of the time period were: 18 US WIA, 5 NVA KIA, 129 bunkers, 600 bags of rice, 125 lbs of medical supplies, 30 lbs of documents, 7-5 ton dump trucks combat loss, and 1 bucket loader combat loss. TF 2/12 Inf(-) move to FSB Jamie XT 433717.

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Operations 17 through 25 June: 18 June TF 2/12(-) move from Jamie to Warrior.  
Operations, contacts and supply finds diminished rapidly during the last phase of operation Bold Lancer II. The enemy was avoiding contact if at all possible. Casualties came from indirect fire attacks and mining incidents. Results for the period were: 35 US WIA, 10 US KIA, 5 NVA KIA, 74 bunkers, 2 bags of rice, 41 F/P's, and 9x120mm mortar rounds. 18 June FSB Hilltop closed, 2/60 Inf airmobile to FSB Jamie.

Operations 25 through 28 June:

During the period of time, the major task facing the 1st Brigade was the planning, coordinating, supervising and providing assistance to other US units during their withdrawals from Cambodia. After withdrawing all its forces from Cambodia, the 1st Brigade was tasked with the mission of assisting in the evacuation and redeployment of all other US Forces in Cambodia scheduled to be withdrawn overland. The brigade TOC displaced from Katum to Tay Ninh base camp on 29 June 70 and prepared to continue operations in their new TAOR.

Throughout Operation Bold Lancer II the outstanding support provided by the artillery was recognized in all operations. The artillery was not used as extensively for troop support as it was for intelligence targets and area preparation. Close coordination between the artillery and the brigade was continuous.

The communication during this period of time was outstanding. The only breakdown in communications was due to mechanical failure. Throughout a period of time in which large distances separated the battalions and the brigade; the communications section provided the support which gave us the ability for close coordination with all units.

12.(c) Results - In the 43 day period covered by Operation Bold Lancer II, contacts with the enemy and large supply and cache finds produced the following results:

Enemy losses - 102 enemy KIA; 6 PW; 4 Hoi Chanh; 194 individual weapons captured; 24 crew served weapons captured; 1332 rounds of high explosive ammunition; 33,644 rounds of small arms ammunition captured; 382 tons of rice; 640 buildings destroyed; 2139 bunkers destroyed; 6505 pounds of medical supplies captured; 13 motor vehicles and 54 bicycles captured and over 2000 miscellaneous items of clothing and equipment.

13.(c) Administrative Matters:

a. Supply

(1) The Forward Support Base was established at Katum and provided Class I, limited II & IV, Class III, Class V and Class IX. The Class I facility initially handled only C rations however it developed to the point where they issued an augmented B ration breakfast, either a C Ration or a B ration dinner and an "A" ration supper meal. Ice ice was a problem area and the primary reason that more A rations could not be provided. No unit had adequate refrigeration and required ice at the rate of 6 pounds per man a day. The S&T Bn could not obtain sufficient quantity of ice for this they could not provide a refrigerator van to prevent a loss of ice from meltage while it was transported from Tay Ninh to Katum. This resulted in units receiving about 3 to 4 pounds of ice per man per day.

(2) POL supply was adequate throughout the operation except for an occasional lapse in JP4 supply. JP4 was supplied to the FSE by a combination of 5000 gallon fuel tankers and Air Force Bladder Aircraft.

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The average daily JP4 consumption was about 20,000 gallons. It is recommended that the storage facility have a 40,000 gallon capacity to permit an unusually high consumption for a short period or to absorb a lapse in resupply. Diesel fuel storage level was 10,000 gallons and MO GAS storage level was 5,000 gallons. These levels were adequate to support operations.

(3) Ammunition was supplied by the DAO who established a temporary ASP at the FSE. This was generally responsive to the needs of the units however difficulty was experienced in controlling the issue of ASR items to the units. When ASR items were drawn from the Tay Ninh ASP they were deducted from the Division Allocation, however, initial control of the issue to the units was not sufficient to insure equal distribution of ammunition. This was subsequently changed so that the units requesting ASR items would receive them the following day and only what was requested by the unit was drawn from the Tay Ninh ASP. The battalions which were not assigned to the Division but were placed attached or OPCON to the Bde experienced delays and difficulty in obtaining ASR items because the allocations were assigned to their parent organization. There was over a week's lapse after the ASR period commenced before accounts or credits were transferred and those units started receiving ASR items.

- b. Maintenance - Contact teams were established in each Forward Support Element. These teams carried an ASL of fast moving repair parts and were very responsive to the maintenance support requirements of the battalions. Numerous major assemblies for tracked vehicles were replaced during the operation. One major problem noted was the unsatisfactory quality of rebuilt engines for the M113A1 personnel carriers. The rebuild facility for all of these engines is located in Japan. One battalion exchanged 16 engines with 13 of these rebuilt engines being unserviceable. This necessitated replacing the power pack for a second and on a few occasions a third time. This was a needless waste of the maintenance effort and greatly reduced the combat effectiveness of the unit.
- c. Treatment of Casualties, Evacuation, and Hospitalization - A medical clearing station was established in the FSE for treatment of minor wounds and caring for illnesses not requiring evacuation. Additionally a Dust off Station was established in the clearing station for calling for and controlling Medivac helicopters. Evacuation was prompt.
- d. Transportation - The transportation required to support the operation logistically was enormous. A wheel convoy came to the FSE daily carrying all the supplies required except water and some of the JP4. A combination of unit convoys and aircraft were used to resupply the battalions. During the operation the Brigade elements used 1524 blade hours of CH47 aircraft support for an average of 26.8 blade hours daily. In addition to this 20 blade hours of Combat Essential missions were flown in support of the Brigade. CH54 aircraft were used as a means of evacuating disabled equipment from forward locations where evacuation by land was not possible. 7 CH54 sorties were used by elements of the brigade during the operation. Except for barrier and construction material the battalions could move their logistical elements on organic transportation. Three 5ton S&P tractor trailers and five 2 1/2 ton trucks were required per battalion for moving the barrier & construction items.

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- e. Communications - FM secure radio was the main means used in controlling maneuver Battalions. VHF radio telephone systems provided to the Brigade by Division was operational prior to the arrival of the Brigade in the area of operations. System quality was impaired due to distance to Division and frequency interference. Due to the frequent moves by maneuver Battalion Headquarters, VHF telephone systems were not employed from Brigade to Battalion. Record message traffic for the Battalions was delivered by courier. VHF teletype and AM radio teletype systems were used to receive record traffic from Division Headquarters. The administrative plans were adequate and the execution of these plans was timely.

### 14. (C) Special Equipment:

It was found that the mobility of the brigade depended to a large degree on the rapidity of installation of forward communications area's. This problem was resolved through the acquisition of two 577 command armored personnel carriers. These proved sufficient for rapid movement of the forward elements of the S-2 and S-3 sections.

Extensive use was made of Armored Vehicle Launched Bridge. This was due to the extremely poor roads throughout the AO. Toward the end of the operation and withdrawal it was necessary to constantly employ these bridges to insure rapid movement.

### 15. (C) CA/Psyops Activities:

During Operations Bold Lancer II placed more emphasis on Medcaps and ICaps than during Operation Bold Lancer I. This was done in an effort to gain the cooperation of the civilian population and to alleviate the many medical problems that had accrued as a result of earlier military operations. In the operations area, earlier contact with the enemy in populated areas had sometimes been heavy and non-combatant injuries were unavoidable. Emphasis was placed on low-key Medcaps and ICaps being conducted at the platoon or company level under the supervision of the Battalion S-5's. Although the area was more populous than that encountered in Operation Bold Lancer I, it was felt that the refugee problem would remain minor in view of the fact that many refugees had been evacuated previously by other Allied units. Psyop activities continued to emphasize Aerial loudspeaker and leaflet operations utilizing themes stressing the loss of Cambodian sanctuaries and NVA Chieu Hoi or surrender options. Ground loudspeaker broadcasts targeted the civilian population with requests for information on enemy activities and cache locations. A shortage of Cambodian interpreters hindered Civic Action and Psyop activities initially but this problem was solved by hiring Vietnamese civilians who could speak Cambodian.

Civic Action/Psyop activities included two significant and highly successful operations. The first of these was the CORDON and Search of Menot by 4th Bn(M) 23d Inf on 4 June 70. During this operation the largest Medcap ever held in Cambodia was conducted, treating 637 patients. Simultaneously a Dentcap treated 175 patients, an audio-visual pshop team showed continuous movies in the theater, two ground loudspeaker teams broadcast instructions and music to the people, an attached civil affairs platoon distributed food to 589 families. The aerial loudspeaker system was also utilized as the CORDON was closed to inform the people what was happening. Through the coordinated use of pshop and civic action this successful search operation was conducted with no untoward incidents.

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The second notably successful Psyop/Civic Action operation was the resettlement of the village of Xa Om. The village had been evacuated by the residents and the majority of its homes needed rebuilding. In a two day operation former residents were informed during Medcaps held on the first day that they should return to their village the next morning. When they arrived at Xa Om on the following day they were organized by their village chief into households and each household received enough food to last approximately 30 days along with tin roofing and money to buy additional building materials for rebuilding their homes. An additional Medcap was held at Xa Om which treated 153 patients. In all, six tons of rice, 2½ tons of PL 480 food commodities, and 544 sheets of tin roofing were distributed.

Immediately upon beginning operations in the area west of the Fishhook it became apparent that a medical problem existed among non combatants. Patients at Medcaps were showing up with wounds sustained two weeks earlier that badly needed treatment. An attempt was made to locate and treat as many of these cases as possible by providing wide Medcap coverage. During Operation Bold Lancer II, a total of seventy-one Medcaps treating 5883 patients were conducted. In addition, one Dentcap and nineteen ICaps were held.

The refugee problem, as expected, remained negligible until the final stages of the operation when a total of 265 ethnic Cambodians left their homes to go to Vietnam. Most of these people had formerly lived in Vietnam and wanted to return. After being detained long enough to be counted and receive medical treatment, they were reported to Tay Ninh Province refugee authorities and allowed to continue on their way.

Operations to repatriate Cambodian refugees were conducted as the need arose. The Civil Affairs platoon attached to the Brigade S-5 conducted a five day operation at Mimot during which 796 ethnic Cambodians were returned from refugee camps in Vietnam to their homes. At the same time twenty six ethnic Vietnamese who had been living in Cambodia were returned to Vietnam.

The attitude of the Cambodian people toward US presence ranged from shyness to very friendly. Even in areas where military operations had destroyed personal property and caused death or injury, as at the village of Xa Om, there were no signs of deep seated hostility toward US forces. Medcaps were very well received also. Grateful villagers invariably approached the Medcap teams with gifts of fresh cut pineapples for everyone involved in the Medcap. ICaps were performed on a low key basis and resulted in fourteen pieces of significant intelligence being collected. With the exception of the Mimot area there were no indications of pro-Communist sentiments. On the other hand, Medcap teams received many inquires from young Cambodian men on where they should go to join the Army to fight the VC. On one occasion six young Cambodian men came to FSB Denny to inquire how to go about joining the US Army or becoming Kit Carson Scouts. During food distribution operations, the people expressed their gratitude many times and said the VC only took from them and never gave them anything.

Throughout Operation Bold Lancer II the Psyop Civic Action effort was aimed at complementing tactical operations by inducing the cooperation of the Cambodian people and reducing animosity between the US forces and civilians. It is felt that over all these efforts were highly successful and added significantly to the results of the operation.

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## 16.(c) Commanders Analysis and Recommendations:

Movement to the new area of operation and assumption of responsibility therefor were accomplished smoothly. Subsequent search operations were conducted methodically and in a generally satisfactory manner. With the rotation of units under brigade control, some time was required for units to adjust to operations in the new environment. While substantial quantities of material were discovered, there remains a question as to how much remained undetected during the search operations. Maintenance of troop interest required strong leadership during the latter days of the operation.
