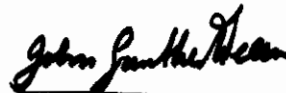
I am responding to your inquiry of June 25, 1984, concerning your relatives in Vietnam, Nguyen Thi Dinh and Trinh Dan Thu, file number IV-057,701.

My staff's review of this case indicates that additional documentation is needed: specifically, Nguyen Thi Dinh and Trinh Dan Thu's marriage certificate and Trinh Dan Thu's birth certificate (originals or certified copies); and copies of the pre-1975 Vietnamese identity cards of the sponsor in the U.S. and of her relatives in Vietnam. My staff is writing directly to the sponsor, Nguyen Thi Vuong, requesting these documents. Once we receive sufficient documentation, we will issue a Letter of Introduction which Nguyen Thi Vuong should send to her relatives in Vietnam to expedite issuance of the exit permits. Because it is the Vietnamese authorities who decide whether or not to issue permits, Ms. Vuong's relatives should contact them regarding their requirements and procedures.

Receiving exit permits is not the final step in obtaining the permission of the Vietnamese authorities to leave. Applicants must, at the request of the Vietnamese authorities, be scheduled for a pre-departure interview with a UNHCR representative in Ho Chi Minh City, a medical examination, and be manifested on a flight departing Vietnam for Bangkok.

Once persons eligible for the Orderly Departure Program are permitted to come to Bangkok, we can issue the necessary American travel documents without delay.

BE SURE TO MARK ALL PAPERS WITH THE FILE NUMBERS (IV NUMBERS) WRITTEN ABOVE. ALSO, PLEASE KEEP US INFORMED OF ANY ADDRESS CHANGES, EITHER ON THE PART OF THE U.S. RELATIVE OR THE RELATIVES IN VIETNAM.

____ (1) One certified copy of the Vietnamese original and a sworn, exact translation of the birth certificate (giay khai sinh) of the relative in the United States, showing the names of his or her parents. (See Note B on page 3.)

X (2) One copy and sworn, exact translation of the original birth certificates (giay khai sinh) of each relative in Vietnam listed in your case/above/below/on attached file worksheet: (See Note B on page 3.)

X (3) One copy and a sworn, exact translation of the original marriage certificate (giay hon thu) of each relative who is married/~~or the following relatives:~~ (See Note B on page 3.)

If any of the relatives in Vietnam were previously married, we need evidence that the previous marriage was lawfully ended. For this we need one copy and a sworn, exact translation of the death certificate of the earlier spouse(s), or one copy and a sworn, exact translation of the divorce decree. (See Note B on page 3.)

X (4) Copies of pre-1975 Vietnamese identity (ID) cards (the can cuoc) of the relative in the U.S. and of the relatives in Vietnam who were issued such ID cards, and copies of the post-1975 ID cards.

X (5) Photographs: Photos of the relatives in Vietnam will help identify them when they are interviewed by UNHCR or by a U.S. official. (See Note D on page 4.)

- (6) Affidavit and Evidence of Support: The relative in the U.S. must provide evidence that his relatives in Vietnam are not likely to become public charges in the U.S. We need a notarized Affidavit of Support from the person or group who will sponsor them. Please use the Form I-134 (rev. 9-30-80), available from any INS office for this purpose. Use a separate form for each relative you will be supporting. Also required is the financial evidence described in the instructions attached to the Form I-134. Sign it before a Notary Public. If the relative in the U.S. cannot provide an Affidavit of Support, other relative(s) or friend(s) must complete I-134's.

X (7a) File Worksheet. Enclosed is a copy of the file worksheet for your case. Let us know if the names, dates of birth or addresses are not correct by returning the worksheet to us with any corrections.

X (7b) Please return with your corrections the file worksheet which was sent to you earlier.

— (8) Copy of the I-94 or I-551 (Green Card) of the relative in the United States, in order for our office to establish the immigration status of that person.

— (9) An original, notarized Affidavit of Relationship listing the relatives for which you intend to apply.

— (10) Send photocopies of papers which show that you/your relatives in Vietnam worked for the U.S. Government or a U.S. organization. (See Note C on page 3.)

— (11) Send papers which show that you/your relatives in Vietnam worked closely with U.S. officials or U.S. programs while working for the Vietnamese Government or serving in the Vietnamese military. (See Note C on page 3.)

— (12) Send papers which show that you/your relatives in Vietnam went to school or had training in the U.S. or in another country with U.S. help. (See Note C on page 3.)
