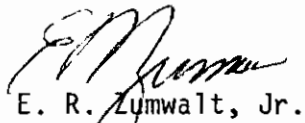

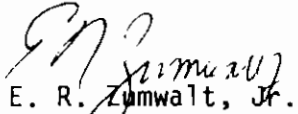
Dear Ambassador Brown:

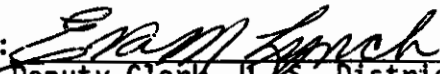

Dear Admiral Zumwalt:

This is in response to your letter of October 16 on the concerns of Mrs. Dat Thi Chung over the inability of her husband, Nguyen Van Thuong, to join her in the United States.

Mr. Thuong has an active immigrant visa case pending with the Orderly Departure Program Office. A letter of invitation was issued on behalf of Mr. Thuong two years ago, and on July 30, 1985, his name was included on a list of persons of special concern which was presented to the Vietnamese government through the United Nations High Commission for Refugees. Further processing of his case is in the hands of the Vietnamese authorities. They alone have the power to issue Mr. Thuong an Exit Permit and schedule his interview with the United Nations High Commission for Refugees. Unfortunately, this Embassy does not have the power to influence them to move specific cases in an expeditious manner.

I regret I cannot provide you with a more optimistic response, but I cannot predict if or when the Vietnamese authorities will act favorably on Mr. Thuong's case.
