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Aloha, Colonel Hathaway

Lieutenant Colonel Edythe J. Hathaway, former Chief Nurse at the Raymond W. Bliss Hospital, Ft. Huachuca, Ariz., assumed her new duties as Tripler's Chief, Department of Nursing and Director of Nursing Activities, March 29. She succeeds Colonel Nellie L. Henley, who retired after completing 30 years Army service.

Colonel Hathaway graduated from St. John's Hospital School of Nursing, Joplin, Mo. in 1944. She received her commission in February 1945 and took her Army basic nursing training at Ft. Carson, Colo-

rado. Her first overseas duty was in the Pacific, where she served for nearly a year with the 42nd General Hospital, which moved from Manila, Philippines to Japan.

After World War II, Colonel Hathaway resumed civilian life and served on the staff of St. John's Hospital until her return to active duty during the Korean War. She spent an 18-month tour with the 3rd Station Hospital in Korea. Upon her return to CONUS in 1952, she served at U.S. Army Hospitals at Camp Irwin, Calif., and Ft. Huachuca, Ariz.

In June 1957, she was assigned to the 20th Station Hospital in Europe, where she served a two-year tour as a pediatric nurse. She returned to Ft. Sam Houston, Texas, for a six-month course in advanced military nursing. Upon completion of her course, she was assigned as a head nurse and supervisor in pediatrics at Brooke Army Medical Center from December 1959 to February 1963.

Returning to the Far East for a second tour in April 1964, she served as an obstetrics head nurse at the U.S. Army Hospital at Camp Zama, Japan, for two years. Upon her arrival in CONUS, she spent ten months at Camp Irwin, Calif., and then returned to Ft. Sam Houston to attend a 22-week advanced supervisory nursing course at the Field Medical Service School. She remained at the Brooke Army Hospital as a nurse supervisor until August 1967.

Colonel Hathaway returned to Europe for a second two-year tour as Chief, Nursing Service of the 130th Station Hospital until September 1970.

Her awards and decorations include the Meritorious Service Medal, Army Commendation Medal, National Defense Service Medal, World War II Victory Medal, Asiatic-Pacific Campaign Medal, Philippine Liberation Ribbon, Korean Service Medal and United Nations Medal.

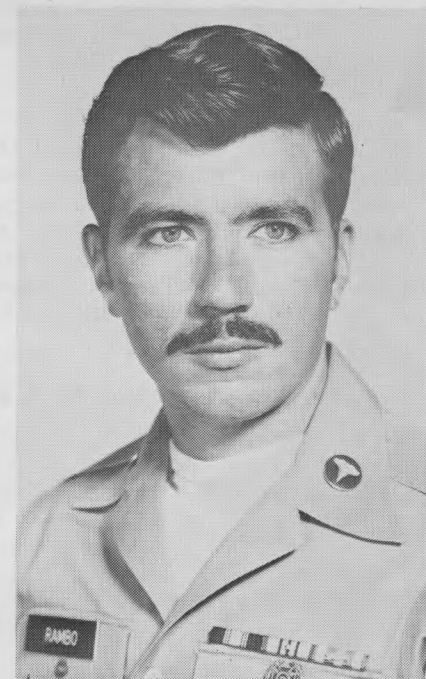

Notes from the Underground ... Food Service Division

"He got out of the car and I almost passed out," said Mrs. Rose A. Twigg of Food Service.

Mrs. Twigg was speaking of Major General Thomas Rienzi, Deputy Chief of Staff for C-E, U.S. Army Pacific, whom she recently 'rescued'.

It all happened on her way home from Tripler when she came upon a stalled station wagon at the bottom of a hill just outside of Ft. Shafter. Noticing that all the other cars were just driving around the stopped vehicle, she decided to lend a helping hand.

As she yelled out the window offering her assistance to the driver of the auto, he stepped out. Needless to say, her eyes got as big as the lump in her throat when she saw all the stars glistening on his lapel.

Maintaining her poise, Mrs. Twigg pushed the general's car through the gates without incident.

In a letter of appreciation to Major General Hughes, MajGen. Rienzi stated, "... I would ask that you pass to her my overwhelming thanks, but more importantly my strong feeling that your 'concerned care' program extends throughout your organization."

It seems that Mrs. Twigg has a history of helping people. Mother of six, she often counsels friends of her children who have drug problems or just need someone to talk to. "A lot of them call me 'Mom,'" she said proudly.

"I feel I have a moral obligation to teenagers," said Mrs. Twigg. She encourages young people she knows to stay in school and tries to set a good example for them. "I've had the hard knocks of life and I know what it is," she said seriously.

Mrs. Twigg came here in 1965. Although she is against "women's lib", she is the only female cook in Food Service Division. She evidently does a good job of it too, for in 18 months her rank went from WG-4 to WG-8.

Sp5 Marubuto

The adage "the Army takes care of its own" is well illustrated in the case of Sp5 Richard J. Marubuto, recently assigned to Tripler's Food Service Division from the 257th Replacement Company in Okinawa. Specialist Marubuto was preceded by his 12-year-old adopted daughter, Noriko, who was air-evacuated here some two months ago. Suffering from a chronic kidney disease, she was first sent to Urology, where Major (Dr.) Crumpton R. Spence con-

ducted an evaluation of her condition.

With the help of a diet researched and planned by dietitian Lieutenant Janis Clark, Noriko's condition has been stabilized. She is now a patient on Pediatric Ward 18, where she has been under the care of Doctors Warren H. Toews and John L. Sheridan. Dr. Sheridan says Noriko will be going home as soon as the family is settled enough to be able to conduct and supervise her diet therapy themselves.

But Noriko's father is noteworthy in his own right. Overseas since 1966, Marubuto exemplified the kind of G.I. that Okinawans will miss most when Uncle Sam departs. Instead of expecting the island inhabitants to learn English and adjust to him, Marubuto learned their language, married an Okinawan, and became part of their community.

"They'd try to get me to teach them English, but I'd always end up speaking Japanese," he recalled. Knowing the language didn't hurt when it came to housing in Okinawa, where the Marubutos rented a 14-room house for \$85 a month.

The cost of living is the biggest hurdle the family has encountered in Honolulu. "Before we had left the airport my wife was arguing with the cabdriver over the fare," Richard noted.

But otherwise Marubuto is delighted with the family's new situation, and especially with his daughter's progress.

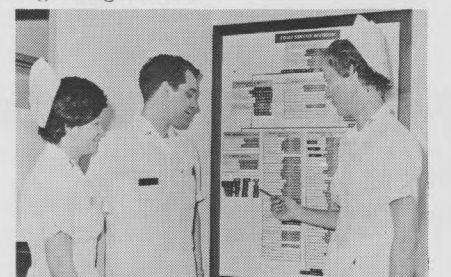
"She used to have to sit down and rest after every five minutes of exercise," he recalled. "Now we can't keep her still at all."

AMSC--25 YEARS

April 16 marks the 25th anniversary of the Army Medical Specialist Corps (AMSC), a branch of the Army's medical program concerned with patient recovery.

The Corps, composed of dietitians and physical and occupational therapists, currently numbers about 600 officers, 200 of which are men.

Although members of the Corps became part of the medical program of the U.S. Army during World War I, they did not receive full military rank until April 16, 1947.

Today AMSC officers are an inte-

gral part of the Army Medical Department.

Dietitians plan nutritional care programs for wounded servicemen and their dependents, thus speeding their recovery and enhancing their health.

Physical therapists direct their energies toward the patient's physical rehabilitation. Restoring function within the limits of disability helps to reaffirm the patient's faith in himself.

Occupational therapists guide and assist the patient in preventing disability and improving physical and psycho-social function. These aims are accomplished through the use of graded, purposeful activities such as arts, crafts, work therapy assignments, and activities of daily living.

Colonel June E. Williams, Chief, Army Medical Specialists Corps, was here April 1-4 to visit with heads of Tripler's AMSC sections. Col. Williams also observed AMSC officers' activities and treatment procedures.

LtCol. Eileen B. Treash heads the Food Service Division. Dietitians working with her are Majors Nancy A. Elliott and Vivian L. Stewart, and First Lieutenants Richard E. Bresnahan, Janis C. Clark, Robert W. and Madeleine S. Rose.

The Physical Therapy Section is headed by LtCol. Constance E. Hagan. Physical therapists include: Majors Rita C. Minogue and Dorothea F. Layne, Captains Clarence D. Brown, Judith A. Stitely, Joan D. Werner, Jarrell D. Auld, James K. Herzberger, and Carol A. Jackson.

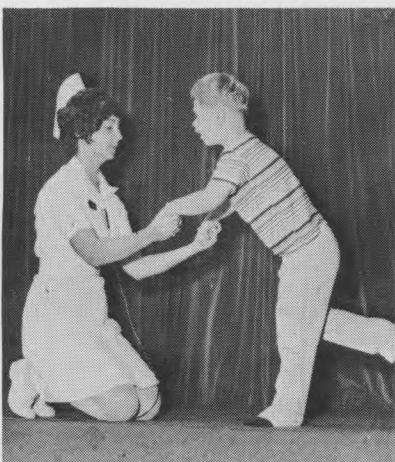

Part Three,

PROJECT TRANSITION

The element that makes any program come alive is the people it involves. The same is true of Project Transition: It is far more than a set of regulations and goals.

It's people like Abron Mitchell, a Sergeant First Class, retiring after 20 years' service. Mitchell, with excellent military experience in preventive medicine and environmental health, is in the process of arranging on-the-job training (OJT) with a mainland civilian health agency.

People like Raymond Gomes, Specialist 6, who, after 20 years in nursing services as an operating room attendant, is also retiring. And Gomes wants to try something totally different, with interests ranging from small appliance repair to water pollution control.

People like Melvin Ito, a specialist formerly in medical records who has just completed OJT with Diversified Investments of Honolulu.

People like William Fiondella, a Specialist 5 looking for a physician's assistant program in Connecticut, and his wife, who is planning to enroll in a college program to learn day care techniques.

And people like Victor Fonoimoana, a multiple amputee. Transition is coordinating with the Veterans' Administration to find a job he likes and arrange OJT. In the meantime, Fonoimoana is serving as liaison to our soldiers entering as patients from Vietnam.

These are just a few of the people going through Project Transition now, but they provide a cross-section of the services that Transition can offer.

A look at the training program in the islands provides some insight into the extent to which Transition prepares its people for jobs. Don Martin is placement officer for Project Transition. According to him, there are 45 men enrolled in training courses at Schofield Barracks, learning trades from welding to auto mechanics to air conditioning and refrigerator repair. In addition there are 55 more placed in OJT positions around the island.

Servicemen can take advantage of the program in a variety of ways. Some individuals, eligible for transfer from overseas assignment to a transfer point near their home of

record, can pull temporary duty en route to the transfer point at the nearest Transition training point.

For many servicemen stationed in CONUS, there is an option during the last six months in service to elect TDY to the nearest training point for a time not to exceed 90 days.

The possibilities and opportunities are practically endless for the short G.I. But the initiative has to come from him: He has to make that first all-important effort to begin his transition.

This is the surgeon's second year in the event, which was won last year in 2 hours and 17 minutes. Schlesinger, who finished 751st of the 1400 starting runners, had a time of 3 hours, 45 minutes.

"I was beaten by two women who entered the race illegally," he ruefully recalled, "but this year it's open to them, and I'm afraid they'll do it again."

Also just ahead of Schlesinger were John Kelley, age 64, and a blind man who made a time of 3 hours and 10 minutes. But the captain finds interesting competitors at his speed: he ran the first six miles alongside Erich Segal, Yale professor and author of *Love Story*.

Dr. Schlesinger predicts that the next Olympic Marathon will be won by the 1970 winner of the Boston race, Ron Hill, whose time was 2 hours, 10 minutes and 30 seconds.

Runners are encouraged to wear clothing of their choice, some of it quite eccentric. Schlesinger will sport a purple suit earned from the University of London for placing in a 1970 cross-country race against Oxford and Cambridge (After studying medicine in Virginia, Schlesinger spent his senior year in London, where he once interviewed 4-minute mile star Dr. Roger Bannister.)

Before attending medical school, Schlesinger enlisted with the Army in Germany, where he later became an officer in the Artillery and Medical Service Corps. During 1966 and '67 he represented the Army in 10-kilometer races.

The New England race starts in Hopkinton, Mass., goes through suburbs such as Wellesley, up to "Heartbreak Hill." After that "It's all downhill," recalls Schlesinger, "but your legs and lungs tell you something else." The race ends at a permanent yellow line painted in front of Boston's Prudential Life building.

The modern marathon race commemorates the historic endurance run by the Greek soldier, Pheidippides. In 490 B.C. he dropped dead after running some 23 miles from the Plains of Marathon to Athens to bring news of his countrymen's triumph over the Persians.
