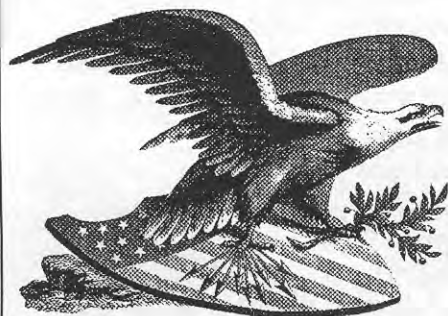

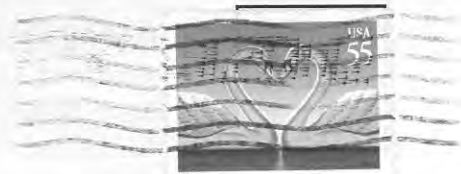

"The Wall That Heals"

"The Wall That Heals", the traveling half-scale replica of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial visited Gettysburg, Pennsylvania May 27 thru May 31, 1999.

A local historian, Wayne Motts has conducted a two and one-half year research project to collect information on the 18 residents of Adams County, Pennsylvania who are memorialized on the wall and these efforts were summarized in the local paper in conjunction with the visit of the wall. One of the soldiers, George L. Mummert, served with the 1st of the 8th Cav. The article pertaining to PFC Mummert read as follows:

"I remember the day I learned of my son's death, Burnell Mummert recalls. "My father and I were working on the front door stairs of the house, when a car pulled up and two men stepped out. I knew then something was wrong."

George Mummert's short life began in Hanover on November 13, 1948, as one of six children reared by Burnell H. and Pauline C. Mummert. The family resided in Union Township, Adams County between Littlestown and Hanover. He graduated from Littlestown High School in 1967, where he left his mark as one of the friendliest members of the senior class. "George was the funniest member of the class." Not only did he have a great sense of humor but - according to classmate Connie Weaver - George also was sensitive and caring. He was always willing to help a friend," she said.

After graduating from high school, George went to work for a furniture company in Hanover; and entered the Army on Dec. 4, 1968. After training at Fort Dix, N.J., he was sent to Vietnam on May 20, 1969. He was a member of Company A, 1st Battalion, 8th Cavalry Regiment - part of the famed 1st Cavalry Division (Airmobile), a special unit designed to utilize helicopters for lighting mobility.

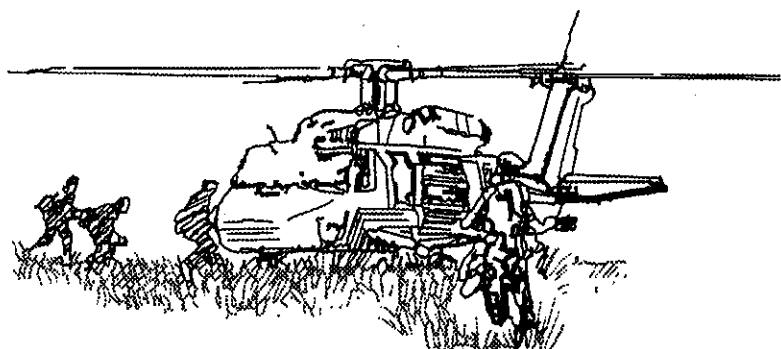
Shortly after noon on July 8, 1969, while Company A was about to be airlifted out of a landing zone to return to base, the group came under brief enemy fire. Because the regular gunner was ill, the 20-year-old volunteered to carry a M-60 machine gun on the operation in his place. Killed in action defending his friends, he was posthumously awarded the Bronze Star for his services that day.

George is buried at Rest Haven Cemetery in Hanover, PA. His name appears on Panel 21 west, Line 84."

Randall Shelley Ellis

about the MIA from 1st/8th and how he hap-
pened to turn up missing. Gerrell Plummer
ran down some information on the computer
and sent it to me.

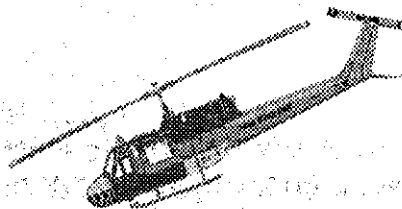
Randall Shelley Ellis was a SP4 medic
assigned to HQ Company 1st/8th on April 18,
1969. He was at 112323N 1061833E
(XT428593) when a tank accompanying them
was hit by an RPG causing casualties. As Ellis
climbed on the tank he was hit in the left
hand by small arms fire.

He was helped to an LZ that was being
used for medevac and was seen by several
other people at the LZ. It was not determined
if Ellis ever boarded a medevac helicopter, but
he was not seen again. The area was cleared
and searched twice that day as the 1st/8th
policed the battlefield and again the following
day. All medical facilities in country and the
most likely out of country facilities were
queried, but no information about his fate
was reported.

Randall S. Ellis was born June 14, 1948
and listed Charleston, S.C. as his home of
record.

Gunnery Sgt. (Ret) Carlos N. Hathcock II

Died Feb 27, 1999 at the age of 57. He won the 1,000 yard Wimbledon Match at the National Rifle Matches in 1965 and served two tours in Vietnam. He was credited with 93 kills, but his highest award was a Silver Star for an incident on Sep 16, 1969. An amtrak ran over a mine and although suffering burns and other injuries, he pulled seven other Marines out of the burning vehicle. Fellow Marines ran a letter writing campaign to get Hathcock the MOH but failed.

An obituary article was written by Steven Hunter in The Washington Times and part of it is a real tribute to all infantrymen. This article appeared Feb 27, 1999 and reads: *"The academics write their mighty histories, the politicians dictate their memoirs, the retired generals give their speeches, the intellectuals record their mighty epephanies. And in all this hubbub attending wars either lost or won, the key man is forgotten ó the lonely figure crouched in the bushes, wishing he were somewhere else: the man with the rifle."*

For those of you interested in more information on Hathcock, there is an excellent book written about him titled Marine Sniper by Charles Henderson.

DEFENDING AMERICA

WHATEVER HAPPENED TO PRIVATE RYAN'S ARMY?

Army Lt. Gen. Claudia Kennedy tells audiences around the nation, "Today's Army is not your father's Army." Then she goes into why "Consideration Of Others" (COO) sensitivity training is the real deal in today's Army and why Private Ryan's kill-or-be-killed World War II techniques are as obsolete as Sherman tanks.

A sergeant major who sat in on one of her lectures says, "The general, wearing spit-shined paratrooper boots that came up to her knees, spent 15 minutes discussing our mission. And then, for the next 40, she stressed the need for equality and sensitivity and understanding of others. I couldn't help wondering if this was some event sponsored by a YWCA instead of the U.S. Army."

In my Army, the sergeants were gravel-road rough, and the mission was about knocking off the enemy and winning. Back then, the brass didn't care about COO stuff. They were into training soldiers to kill our enemies and win battles. Put simply, the philosophy was: The more sweat in training, the less blood in battle.

Back then, generals didn't hug returned POWs after they threw down their weapons, waved the white flag and then wrote "thank-you" notes to their jailers. They court-martialed the slackers.

No way I can imagine Gen. George Patton saying to three such cowards upon their release from a Belgrade slammer, "Welcome home, boys. Don't sweat that .50-caliber machine gun, those three M-16 rifles and all that ammo you handed over to those nasty Serbs without firing a shot. Bad things happen in wars. Oh, and on behalf of our president, here are six medals for all that discomfort those mean old Serbs put you through."

At Fort Benning, Ga., units must conduct "battle-focused" physical training three days a week. And these days at the home of the U.S. Infantry, guess what falls into that category? Aerobic dancing. A major says, "Now don't get me wrong, I'm sure aerobic dance can be a good workout. However, I can't help wondering what kind of message this sends to our soldiers. To me, this is just another sign of the continued feminization of the armed forces and further evidence that our senior leadership has lost sight of

what's important. This trend has converted me into one more member of the growing number of soldiers who've become frustrated with the current state of the Army."

At Fort Gordon, also in Georgia, four students were recently caught red-handed with marijuana. They were still allowed to continue a training course that includes classified signal instruction. A captain says, "The info they'll be exposed to closely resembles the data U.S. Navy spy (John) Walker sold to the Soviets. None of the top people here want to kick these birds out because it would violate what's got all the brass' attention -- 'Consideration Of Others' issues above all else."

During the Cold War, Walker did more damage to U.S. security than a thousand Soviet spooks. But since dope violations are ignored in the White House, I guess it's easy to look the other way with Army communication folks exposed to top-secret traffic. Besides, no one's willing to stand tall and be so flat-out insensitive as to boot them out just for being security risks.

Except for a couple of elite units -- Rangers and Special Ops -- the modern Army has just about lost it. It will certainly take a big change by the top leadership to correct the damage that's been done to the Army and the American profession of arms since the end of Desert Storm.

With the Gen. Kennedys and her ilk at the helm, it's no bloody wonder that grandfathers, fathers and older brothers are telling young folks not to join the Army. It breaks my heart, but not a day passes where I don't give the same advice.

If the old standards aren't brought back in a hurry, then the politically correct Army with its hundreds of maternity and child-care centers and a wrongheaded basic load of COO fixation should be given only support -- bringing up the rear -- missions. The fighting and killing jobs should go either to the U.S. Marines or, as in East Timor, soldiers like the Aussies should handle the Private Ryan stuff.
