Bill Plante now the CBS White house correspondent spoke of his background that he was in Vietnam four times. Plante joined CBS News in June 1964 as a New York-based reporter/assignment editor and served as a correspondent in the Chicago bureau (1966-76). During that time, he served two of his four tours of duty in Vietnam, reporting on the bombing strikes over North Vietnam, the Vietnamization and pacification programs in the south and the fall of the governments in Vietnam and Cambodia. Plante also covered the civil rights movement in Mississippi and Alabama, including Dr. Martin Luther King's historic march from Selma to Montgomery.

Plante was moved to Washington D.C. in 1980 and has been a CBS News White House correspondent during the administrations of Ronald Reagan (beginning in 1981), Bill Clinton and George W. Bush.

After speaking briefly of his career with CBS he mentioned that his wife had a far more interesting story to share here is some excerpts' from it.

RETURN TO VIETNAM

A Personal Journey of Family Closure

We were asleep when the telegram arrived. My mother, in her bathrobe and slippers, opened the door. Two marines in uniform, feeling out of place in Athens, Ohio, stood nervously on our front porch. Mom's face must have betrayed her deepest fear. The colonel, my father's friend, rushed in.

"Jane, he's only missing!"

Words filled with hope, to comfort a wife too young to be a

widow.

"I remember going out into the kitchen and falling down on my knees," mom told me years later. "And praying. Please, God, let him be alive!"


It has been almost twenty-seven years since my father became one of America's Missing In Action in Southeast Asia. I was a freshman in college when daddy - Lt. Colonel Robert Norman Smith, Annapolis grad, fearless fighter pilot - left for a thirteen month tour in Vietnam. He volunteered to go. Combat duty was mandatory for a gung-ho career officer determined to be the first aviator selected Commandant of the U.S. Marine Corps.

Sometime around noon on August 19, 1969, a lifetime of dreams was put on hold.


The telegram didn't tell us much about what happened that day. It said he took off from Danang on a "routine" flight, escorting a photo reconnaissance mission north of the DMZ. Our best guess was that his F-4 jet was shot down by enemy fire, but there were no concrete facts or information to support this assumption. All we knew is that my dad had disappeared - vanished without a trace.

Since my family first learned of these discoveries in 1992, I have wanted to go to Phu Thuy and talk to the same eye witnesses who shared their stories with the investigators. As an MIA daughter, I am acutely aware that I carry heavy baggage. My family's quest for information is tangled up in an emotional national debate that has linked "progress" on resolving the fates of missing Americans with normalization of relations with Vietnam. I resolved to go not only as a family member, but as a producer, I would document the journey - and whatever the outcome, share it with a national audience.

On April 2, 1995, my husband, Bill Plante, a CBS News crew and I landed in Hanoi and for two weeks relived the story that was in

the official reports. We visited Hoa Lao prison, the "Hanoi Hilton," which held hundreds of American POWs and is for many a symbol of torture and pain. For me, it was always a vessel of hope - the place my father could have been had he survived the crash.



500,000 Items in the Virtual Vietnam Archive

The Virtual Vietnam Archive has celebrated a number of milestones this fall, including the addition of our 500,000 item this week. The Virtual Archive became available to researchers ten years ago this month with just a few thousand items, mostly photographs and documents. Now the online archive contains over 3.3 million pages of material, including 330,000 documents, 130,000 images, 900 oral history

interviews, and thousands of moving images, audio recordings, maps, and more. In that ten year period, the Virtual Archive has been searched over 10,000,000 times and more than 3 million items have been downloaded. The 500,000 item, a newspaper article titled “Faint Hope for US Airmen Still Missing in Indochina” from the Garnett Bell Collection, was digitized by student assistant Brooke Boysaw.

Reaching half-a-million items in our digital collections is a great accomplishment for our project that couldn’t have been completed without the over 100 full time staff and part time student employees who have worked on this project since 2001. Without all of their great contributions, this project would not be the success it has been.

The Virtual Vietnam Archive project continues to digitize new materials, adding about 15,000 new pages each month from a variety of collections, including still images, individual donor’s collections, the CDEC Collection and, starting this month, the Cong Bao. We look forward to continuing this project for years to come.

DASPO Reunion Group Financial Report for 2009-2011

This Financial Report was given at the DC Reunion. It covered the period since the last.

Reunion on 10-1-09. We began that reunion with a balance of \$2405.11. Our deposits during the 2 year period from the yearly DASPO dues and additional contributions were \$1675. The checks written for DASPO expenses during the period were \$3Si7.3S. Our balance at the end of this period was \$563.06.

FYI: This DASPO account has no overhead. administrative costs or credit union costs. Each check has to be signed by two of DASPO's elected officers (eg. Reunion president, vice-president, treasurer) and the primary expenses are for the hosting & updating of our web site,

newsletter, memorials to deceased DASPO Reunion Group members-generally sent to our ReinYoho Endowment in their memory-and recently for a wreath for our DASPO Combat Photographers' Association which we laid at the changing of the guard at the Tomb for the Unknown Soldier and wreaths for Rick Rein and Kermit Yoho which, as part of a ceremony to honor their memory. we laid at the Vietnam Wall. Dear Ted and John:

I hope all is going well. I was working with our development office recently and am following up with you on the status of the DASPO endowment. First, I am very pleased to tell you that the endowment has reached a total of \$15,366.99. The current spendable income generated from the endowment is \$3,701.05. We are currently reviewing all of the DASPO Collection materials and determining the best way to use this spendable income to support the mission of the endowment, “to be used for expenses incurred in preserving the Department of the Army Special Photographic Office material.” We are considering the use of these funds to hire a part-time student assistant whose sole focus will be processing and digitizing DASPO collection materials. While the current spendable amount is not enough to cover a salary for a year, we will use other funds from the Vietnam Center to augment them so we can keep that person working for at least one year. Once we have a firm plan in place, I will be back in touch with another update. Until then, please let me know if you have any questions.

I hope the reunion is a great success! I am sorry we cannot join you this year. Please pass along our warmest regards to everyone there.






