OFFICIAL

1. NEW HOSPITAL DEDICATED:

The new Hospital for the 27th Surgical Hospital was officially dedicated Tuesday, 11 June 1968. The following dignitaries were present for the ceremony.

2. USMACV Dir 37-6 specifies that when authorized US personnel have a bona fide personal emergency or when such personnel depart the RVN on PCS, leave, TDY, R&R, etc., unit commanders may authorize the purchase of additional US currency or dollar instruments or additional deposits in excess of the \$200.00 limitation.

3. ACCURAL OF LEAVE IN EXCESS OF 60 DAYS:

A member who serves on active duty for a continuous period of at least 120 days after 1 Jan 68, in an area in which he is entitled to receipt of hostile fire pay, may accrue 90 days leave. Leave accrued in excess of 60 days must be used by the member prior to the end of the fiscal year following the fiscal year in which the qualifying period of service was terminated, or will be forfeited. This entitlement does not change the current statutory maximum leave accrual allowance of 60 days for which lump sum settlement is authorized.

Christmas Mailing Deadline Set

WASHINGTON (AFPS)

The latest mailing deadlines listed by the U.S. Postal Department for surface and air includes: **FAL (Parcel Airlift)**--FAL mailing costs the regular parcel post rate to the APO or FPO departure point plus \$1 for air service from your city to the overseas base. Packages are accepted up to 30 pounds in weight and 60 inches in combined length and girth. Mailing is from Oct. 28--Nov. 30.

SAM (Space Available Mail)--SAM mailing parcel post rate to APO or FPO departure points is the only fee. SAM parcels can be up to five pounds in weight and 60 inches in combined length and girth. Packages are airlifted overseas from the APO or FPO departure point. Mailing is from Oct. 20--Nov. 23.

Air Parcel Post--For small package mailing. Air Parcel Post should be considered. On parcels weighing two pounds or under, airmail postage should be used and packages mailed Nov. 30--Dec. 11.

VIETNAMESE LEGEND

"What Did You Do In Civilian Life, General?"

Recipe for Sea Crab Pâté

The necessary ingredients for this delicacy are three crabs and three duck or chicken eggs, 200 grams of pork, 50 grams of pork fat, 150 grams of onions, 10 grams of carrots and 50 grams of green beans.

Procedure

- After boiling the crab, remove all the meat.
- Chop up the pork meat well.
- Cut the pork fat in little pieces.
- Cut the onions in little pieces.
- Remove the peel of the carrots and cut them in the form of little rods.
- Cut the green beans into thin slices.

Into a big bowl containing the eggs already well beaten, add three teaspoons of brine and one teaspoon of sugar and all the ingredients prepared above. Mix well for three minutes. Pour the contents into a covered frying pan containing a little bit of fat. Using a spoon or a fork make it into a bread 2.5 centimeters in thickness and place in the oven for a half hour. When the bread turns yellow, it is ready to be eaten.
