Dear Sir, (Colonel Noboru Masuoka, USAF(Ret))

I am in despair to learn that the ODP still refused my case after so much work which you and many well known persons have done in helping me. I have just received the negative answer from the ODP this noon. It makes me quite sad IS it the humanitarian act as the ODP have declared from the beginning of the Office when they refuse to help (to grant) a man who had fought on their side escaping from the enemy. I believe the way ODP did is not what the American does. I was trained in US and I have cooperated almost five years with the US Armed Forces. Consequently I know the Americans are helpful and friendly. I do not know if the ODP would change their mind in the coming days. If not, I am obliged to live in the enemy land for the rest of my life. To be sincere, they are condemning me.

I who was one of the King Bee Lead
am still proud of what we did
whatever were needed.

I still remember all my comrades
who were: Hobos, Coors
King Cobras, Sheds
Jolly Greens and Gun Fighters.

Some of them
are already on the arms
