The "Best Headwork And Change Of Address Award" for 1995 goes to Steve Boulton. He moved from a place named "Clinton Township."

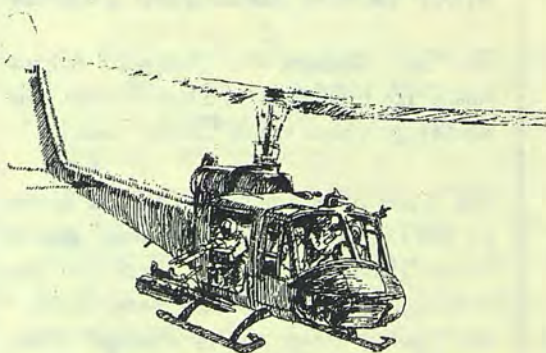

TUN TAVERN

.....the most celebrated event in the history of Tun Tavern occurred on November 10th, 1775. This is the officially recognized birthdate of the Continental Marines, forerunners of the U.S. Marine Corps. Robert Mullen assumed ownership of the tavern. And upon being commissioned by an act of Congress, he raised the first two battallions of Marines under the leadership of Samuel Nicholas. Nicholas was the first appointed Commandant of the Continental Marines, whose grandfather was a member of the Tun Tavern Lodge. He had fully recognized the importance the Tavern held to all residents and seafaring men of Philadelphia. It is this relationship between Mullen and Nicholas that the Tun Tavern is traced as the birthplace of The Corps. Each year on November 10th, around the world, the approximately seven million former and active duty Marines celebrate their heritage and the significance of this birthplace. These events are unprecedented in the annals of military history, mirroring the importance that Independence Day holds for all Americans. Virtually without exception, every Marine knows how important the Tun Tavern was toward the creation of the United States Marine Corps.
