NCO CLUB ELECTS NEW BOARD OF GOVERNORS

1SG Chisler was the only nominee for the presidency and it can be said he won by a landslide. SFC Eng was opposed by SF7 Guardjo of A Co, but beat him by a healthy margin.

It seemed as though A Co was trying to get a second member on board, but why they didn't try for the presidency can only be left to the reader's speculation.

All the company representatives were unchallenged with the exception of SFC Burke from TI Co. OB member



Memorial Day commemorates the men and women of our Armed Forces who have given their lives in the service and defense of our Nation and way of life since 1861.

First proclaimed as Decoration Day in 1868 by General John A. Logan, it was to honor the men who had fallen in the Civil War.

After WW I it became known as Memorial Day and commemorated those Americans who died in all wars.

The occasion is marked by parades, patriotic observances, memorial services and decorations on graves of Servicemen and Veterans.

Since the Civil War more than 603,000 American Servicemen have died in battle.

On the bloody battle fields of Shiloh in the Civil War to Hill 881 in the Republic of Vietnam, these Americans unhesitatingly gave their lives for the cause of freedom and democracy.

45TH MI CO (II)


SP4 Joe Saliba has been chosen by II branch to represent the 45Th before the June Battalion Soldier of the Month Board.

b. Current requirements are the following:

Cholera	every 6 months
Plague	every 6 months
Smallpox	every 12 months
Typhoid	every 12 months
Typhus	every 12 months
Yellow fever	not required in Vietnam; repeated every 6 years in endemic areas
Tetanus	every 6 years

HOW US FOREIGN POLICY IS MADE

Foreign policy involves out of the nature of our nation and its people on one side, and the shape of the world situation around us.

In the 1st Article of the UN Charter itself which the US helped mold we are aware of the basic attitudes held by our country just after the purge of a great war.

In respect to agreements our government has always maintained a policy of strict adherence to them; as a result we now have 4000 treaties with other countries.

Being a democratic nation the main lines of our policy are set by the people and the kind of country that we are except in isolated cases in which the President or Congress take immediate action on their own initiative.

Public opinion is tabulated each day through letters to Congress, polls, and editorials all contributing to the formation of foreign policy.

The university acts as one of the more vocal sounding boards of public sentiment especially in regard to our present commitments in Vietnam.

The central issue I believe for all mankind is how to build a durable peace in the world especially when faced with the prospect of total annihilation by nuclear weapons.

Already the gradual thaw evidenced between the NATO and Warsaw Pacts could open up the possibility of resolving some outstanding problems between both groups.

Red China still looms over Asia but it is doubtful that free Asiatic nations confident in their national affairs and regional cooperation will follow in Red China's tracks.

In summary the US is drawn to those countries which strive for freedom of the individual and in which the government derives its just powers from the consent of the governed.

DA announces 12th Interservice Photography Contest.

Dept of the Army announced earlier this month their 12th Interservice Photography contest.

The USARV phase of this contest will be conducted from 15 June thru 15 July 1967.

The contest is designed to afford both the amateur and experienced photographer serving as a member of the armed forces a opportunity to compete on a world-wide basis and to have their work judged by competent authorities in the photographic field.

Competitions will be conducted at all contest levels in two groups:

Group I--Black and White photographs, and Group II--Color Transparencies.

In Group I enlargements may be from a minimum of 80 square inches to a maximum of 480 square inches, not to exceed 24 inches on the longest dimension.

A contact print must be submitted with each black and white enlargement.

In Group II, Color Transparencies, slides may be up to 4 x 5 inches maximum in size and will be submitted with plastic-type envelopes or other protective covering. All slides will be mounted on commercial mounts (or comparable) for operation in automatic projectors.

Prints or slides may be entered in any of the seven categories below:

Category A: People

Category B: Babies and Children

Category C: Animals and Pets

Category D: Action

Category E: Scenic

Category F: Military life

Category G: Experimental


