Bill Harris and I had the privilege of travelling to Lubbock, Texas after Thanksgiving to join the leadership of the Vietnam Helicopter Pilots Association (VHPA) Legacy Committee to see how our Association might best support them in the future, as it plans its inevitable 'sunset.' Art Jacobs and Don LeMaster are the leads for the VHPA; Bill and I were totally impressed with their vision for the future of VHPA. Importantly, they are completing their Strategic Plan that will inform the execution of the myriad tasks and actions that the transition will require, ranging from event planning to publication and membership servicing. Art and Don have also established a strong relationship/partnership with the Vietnam Center and Archive (VNCA), located on the Lubbock campus of Texas Tech University. We honestly had no idea how extensive the VNCA collection is and how deep the expertise is that resides there. The VHPA will be leaving all their records and documents to the VNCA and have already been coordinating with the VNCA for some years. Their decision to get into a relationship with VNCA to maintain their legacy records could not have been more well placed. Check out the VNCA website

AAAA has also been a beneficiary of the VHPA's support and generosity. The VHPA was the very first "Heritage Matching Fund" scholarship established by the AAAA Scholarship Foundation Inc., in 2002 with a donation of \$10,000. Since that time, the VHPA has donated almost \$500,000, which this year supported 18 scholarship awards to deserving students in our merit-



THE DAY THE MEDICS SHOT THE BAD GUYS

1 APRIL 1970
APRIL FOOLS DAY

Somewhere north of QL9, the east-west road through Dong Ha to Laos. North of the artillery firebases such as Alpha 4 and Bravo 1, not that far from the DMZ, Demilitarized Zone, separating North and South Vietnam. Call sign "DMZ Dustoff 707" Aircraft Commander 1LT Gary L. Brink, Co-pilot Warrant Officer 1 Robin (Rob) Halvorson, Crew Chief Specialist 4 Tommy Johnson and Medic Specialist 5 Frank E. Crockett are on a

mission to evacuate wounded in UH-1H 67-17627, one of the original Huey helicopters that deployed overseas with the 237th Medical Detachment in November of 1968.

Brink remembers, "We had an early afternoon mission to pick up a wounded infantryman but we kept getting shot at; we tried a couple of times to get in, but there was just too much incoming." But, Halvorson thought he saw a way to get in on his (right) side of the aircraft, so he asked for the controls.

Approaching at treetop level and high speed, Rob had spotted a draw, or depression in the ground, that he thought he could use to their advantage. Settling into the low spot, Rob remembers, "We were sitting on the ground with the blades maybe only a foot off the ground at the tips, but it gave us the protection we needed and we got the wounded on board. After we lifted out and were pretty much at altitude, what appeared to be a rocket of some sort whizzed straight across

the nose of the aircraft, one side to the other. It's almost as if it went by in slow motion" but, of course, it was at "full speed". (This author has been told by more than one Vietnam helicopter pilot that they observed the enemy take aim at their heads, and even though the aircraft was sitting on the ground with no movement other than the blades turning, the enemy would then aim in front of the aircraft and finally pull the trigger. Apparently, these young enemy soldiers were taught to take a bead on the pilot, then lead the aircraft before firing. However, it seems that it was never explained to them that they should fire in front of the aircraft only when it was flying, not stationary on the ground!)

Brink and Halvorson were able to depart the area with no further enemy fire and were on their way to the hospital with their patient when a call came on "Guard". The UHF, Ultra High Frequency, radio has a position for transmitting and receiving "on Guard". When the UHF selector is tuned to Guard, a crew can make a radio call and every aircraft within many, many miles of that radio receives the transmission, unless they have specifically disabled Guard reception. As Dustoff crews, we always had the selector on "Guard Receive" as we never knew when an emergency call would come in. Of course, being young and stupid, full of urine and vinegar helicopter pilots, occasionally one would hear a transmission such as "This is God on Guard, the 1st Cav sucks!" Of

course, not to be outdone, a crew might then hear a reply such as "God on Guard, say again, you were cut out by a Mayday."

The emergency call on Guard was from a Long Range Reconnaissance Patrol, LRRP team, that was in trouble. Brink answered with his DMZ Dustoff 7-oh-7 call sign...the reply was "Hey Dustoff, we've got a mission for you!" "Where are you" was Brink's question. "Can't tell you, where are YOU at?" You can't tell me? Brink is thinking how do I know which way to go? He replies to the LRRPs "I'm just north of the firebases" was Brink's reply. "How are we going to find you?" "Just head North!" Uh, oh; 7-0-7 was already only a couple of clicks away from the DMZ and they want him to go closer! So, they head north and before long, they cross the river in the middle of the "Z". "I just crossed a river" with both parties knowing full well "which" river he was referring to. "Just keep coming north." The crew of Dustoff 7-0-7 was now in North Vietnam.

As they neared the pickup site, another call to the LRRPs (pronounced "lurps") sent a proverbial chill down the spines of the Dustoff crew. The LRRPs were now whispering on the radio, a sure sign that the bad guys were very close! "What are your casualties, and have you received recent hostile fire? From what direction?" typical need-to-know questions asked on virtually every mission to the guys on the ground. "One casualty at this time" and "We hear voices about 20 meters to the north" was another whispered reply.

Twenty meters???. Wait a minute, that's roughly the length of a Huey, and that's how close the enemy is???. And we are supposed to come in, land and load them, all without "disturbing" the bad guys???. No way! The LRRPs would not pop a smoke grenade to mark their position, but they said they would flash a mirror or lay out a red panel to mark the LZ. Finally locating the red panel in a small field of tall elephant grass, the attempt to land, as always, was made, and here is what happened:

Brink spotted the ground guide. Usually, the guys on the ground would stand with their weapon over their head to show the pilots exactly where they wanted them to land, that was the normal procedure. "I had been to a party with most of these guys just a week or so before" Brink recalls. "For some reason, the RTO (Radio Telephone Operator) was this big Indian guy, (Native American) and was almost always the ground guide. Why they chose the biggest guy in the outfit to stand up in an LZ, I'll never know! It seemed like either myself or (WO1) Bob McKeegan was always flying first up when they got in trouble." Immediately as they touched down, Brink saw the ground guide "freeze" and then drop to the ground. Brink called to the guys in the back to get the ground guide, and then, almost immediately, the crew of Dustoff 707 started taking fire.

"We had to have landed in the middle of the bad guys, there were NVA (North Vietnamese Army) all over the place but the good guys were there and it was a hell of a firefight," said Halvorson. Brink remembers Johnson dragging the ground guide back to the aircraft and Crockett now found himself very busy on his side trying to get everyone onto the aircraft.

Halvorson looked out his windshield and saw an NVA soldier with an AK-47 pointed at him. "The guy could not have been more than 14 and he fired his whole magazine at us. Had I not been on the controls with Brink, I could have fired my .38 pistol at him and hit him without aiming, he was so close." The young enemy soldier was not done, however, and as Halvorson was congratulating himself on not being hit, the teenager loaded another magazine and emptied that one into the helicopter, too! Again, Halvorson got lucky and was not wounded, but as this was going on, things were heating up in the back of the Huey.

The LRRPs were jumping into the back of the aircraft while being shot at and the moment that Johnson got the ground guide on board, one of the LRRPs was hit in the head, sending blood and brain matter all over the inside of the aircraft, even onto the windshield. "Apparently the round came from the back of the aircraft, through the engine compartment" Brink stated. At that exact moment when the soldier was hit by enemy fire, Halvorson caught movement out of the left corner of his eye; "Lt. Brink's legs were flying out and I saw his head slump forward. With all the debris on the inside of the windshield, I thought for sure Gary was dead. There was even hydraulic fluid spraying around the inside of the aircraft. It was one of those moments where I thought to myself 'Oh, shit, Oh, shit, Oh, shit!'"

Lt. Brink, picks it up from here. "A bullet came from behind and nicked my helmet, then exited out the front window. I went into a prenatal position, trying to take off looking through my chin bubble. At about the same time bullets hit my seat exploding ceramic shards into my legs, but I didn't realize it at the time. Bullets went between my legs, right past my cyclic, and into the radios. What was strange was I can still see the bullets moving in slow motion into the center console. Realizing the situation we were in, I tried my best to assume the best possible fetal position I could, considering I needed to get my feet back on the controls! If I could have crawled inside my helmet, I would have!" Gary Brink's helmet was grazed by a bullet from behind, "just as I tried to pull myself into that fetal position" he recalled. Had he not made that movement when he did, who knows what damage that bullet would have done to him.

In the back of the aircraft on the right side, Medic Frank

Crockett has by now pulled his .38 revolver from his holster and has begun shooting in an attempt to protect the LRRPs who are also shooting and trying to scramble aboard the rescue helicopter on the right side.

On the left side, Crew Chief Tommy Johnson of Oklahoma began grabbing more bodies, pulling the one LRRP who is now dead, and then others, some of whom are now wounded, across the hard metal floor of the cargo compartment. "Sometimes we had to stack them like cordwood" he remembered, but this time it was just get them on so they could get the heck out of there!

Back up front in the cockpit, with all the bullets flying around, Halvorson is thinking he may be the only one of the crew left alive in the aircraft when he gets a slap on the back of his helmet from one of the LRRPs, shouting "GO,GO,GO!" Of course, all of this rescue so far has taken place in maybe 15 to 20 seconds at the very most, but the Huey is still on the ground. It's time to pull pitch...time to get out of Dodge City! Halvorson calls out "Brink's been hit! I've got the controls!" At the time, Rob didn't realize it, but no one could hear him.

Whether it was because both pilots were actually on the controls or because there was still some hydraulic fluid left in the helicopter's system or whether it was pure adrenaline pumping through their bodies, Brink and Halvorson were able to lift the Huey out of the LZ, making a left turn as most of the NVA seemed to be to the right. A Huey with no hydraulic assist is like driving your car when the power steering goes out, only much harder. One pilot can work the controls when this happens, but it is extremely difficult; two pilots on the controls are better, but it's still very difficult. Even though they were lifting out of the LZ, Crew Chief Johnson knew they were still in trouble. "The aircraft was all over the place as we took off." He could tell the pilots were having trouble with the controls; it was not a normally smooth departure.

And Johnson had his hands full, too; one of the LRRPs was not inside the aircraft yet when they took off. With the soldier's feet on the skids and only one hand holding onto a litter pole, the other clutching his weapon, Tommy reached outside the aircraft and grabbed the guy by the belt to haul him in.

"I was halfway outside the aircraft myself", he said, "but I was tethered into the aircraft, so I knew that I wasn't going anywhere! If that guy had lost his grip on the pole, he would have been a 'goner'."

Clawing for altitude, Aircraft Commander (AC) Brink has difficult and sluggish controls and realizes he is also "kind of" fighting the co-pilot for the "advantage". Brink glanced to his right and says to Halvorson "Get your God-damned hands off the controls". Halvorson looked back at the AC "like he had seen a ghost" Brink said. Halvorson now realizes that Gary is, in fact, OK and is flying the aircraft, so he let's go of the controls. Without looking this time, Brink comes over the intercom again; "You're fighting me on the controls!" Halvorson

speaks back over the intercom "I'm not on the controls" but now realizes that he is not transmitting, he can't hear himself in the headset; he can only hear the others. (Bullets in the radio compartment can do that!) Again, Brink tells Halvorson he is fighting him. So, Rob holds up his hands towards the left seat, showing he is not on the controls. Brink looks over, and his reply? "Oh!"

Now out of immediate danger, but flying a very badly

crippled Huey, Brink tries to call Quang Tri

tower but gets no response. His radio is out, so he tells Halvorson, "Call Quang Tri and tell them we need a straight in (approach). Tell them to clear the area and get the crash trucks ready. Have them call the hospital and let them know we're coming. We won't be able to land at the hospital pad" as he continued to fight the controls. Rob pulled the microphone away from his face and mouthed the words to Gary "I have no commo." Noticing that the AC is not quite understanding him, Halvorson pulls out his grease pencil, and finding a clear spot on the inside of the blood spattered windshield writes "I have no commo". As it turned out, not only did Rob have no commo, most of the instruments on the control panel were not working either. However, a few flight instruments including the airspeed indicator and altimeter were apparently still

working properly.

In the cargo compartment of the Huey, Crockett and Johnson are tending to the wounded and they are trying to "take stock" of what they have on board. Johnson, monitoring what is going on over the intercom, noticed the message on the windshield. "Why don't you use your survival radio, Mr. Halvorson?" Early in the history of the 237th, for over a year, DMZ Dustoff crews were short on equipment and had to fly these single ship, single engine aircraft rescue missions with no emergency radios whatsoever. But fortune was trying to smile on this crew, and Halvorson pulled out his emergency radio to call Quang Tri tower. They needed a nice long paved runway to put this puppy down and their home base at "QT" was the ticket.

Grabbing the hand-held radio and transmitting on Guard, Halvorson alerted the tower to their situation. "This is Dustoff 7-oh-7 on Guard, north of Quang Tri about 20 miles out. We have multiple wounded on board, no idea of their condition, no hydraulics, and no instruments. We need a straight in. Clear everything, I need to be first in line." It

was about this time that Gary noticed one of the few instruments still working was the engine temperature gauge "And it was running pretty hot!"

All appropriate measures were immediately taken by the tower controller. Dustoff 707 was in serious trouble, they were fighting to stay in the air, yet they were still about 10 minutes away and limping home. Of course, transmitting on Guard alerted every other aircraft in the area and it wasn't long before the crew of 707 heard on their radio "This is Pachyderm 38, Dustoff, we're at your 9 o'clock and we're bringin' ya home!" Of course, it was somewhat comforting to know someone else was there. Pachyderm was one of the call signs of the CH-47 Chinook helicopters that the 101st Airborne Division flew, and there was more to come. Soon the Huey crew also heard

"Dustoff 7-oh-7, this is a heavy fire team at your 3 o'clock; we're takin' you home, too, buddy!" Now they had three Cobras, the heavy fire team, covering their butts!

Halvorson remembers, "There must have been 27 helicopters and fixed wings following us to QT. Yeah, I'm probably exaggerating the number a little, but not by much!" As they approached the runway at QT, the tower called back with landing approval and "The hospital wants to know how many wounded you have." "I don't know, several," was Halvorson's reply. "Just clear the runway." Still very busy on the controls, Brink is setting up the Huey for a long, low approach to the runway, the best way to make a landing with no hydraulic power. The pilots continue their narrative. "About the time we

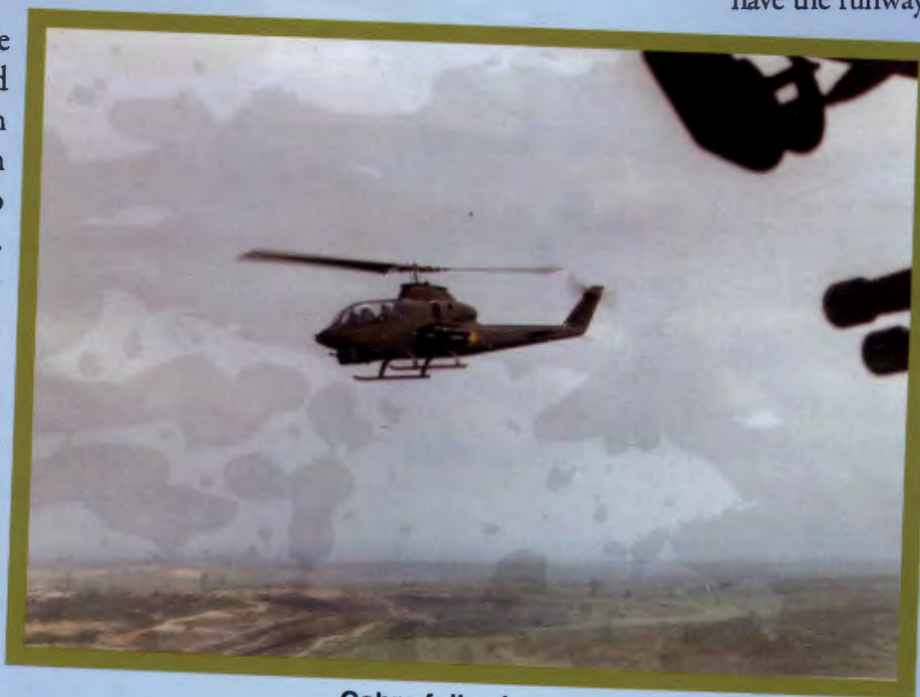
have the runway in sight, we get a call

from this Command and Control General from the 5th Mech" (5th Mechanized Division, which DMZ Dustoff supported for most of its time in Viet Nam). "He's in his Huey and is also following us. He's telling us 'Dustoff, this is Red Devil 6. Boys, just remember your training, just like in flight school. It's gonna be OK, Gentlemen, just

rely on your training,

you're going to do fine' and Rob is thinking, 'Just be quiet and let us land the darn thing!'"

Well, the boys did remember their training and with both pilots on the controls, they were able to put the Huey down on the runway, skidding to a halt, skid shoes smoking and smelling of that distinctive odor all Huey crews remember from practicing emergency procedures such as this. They were able to put it down, under control, with no further damage. The 18th Surgical Hospital had their ambulances waiting and took care of the wounded. Medic Frank "Davey" Crockett left the aircraft and accompanied his patients to the Emergency Room. While Crockett was put in for the Bronze Star for his actions on this rescue, I have lost contact with his family and do not know if it was actually awarded. Whether it was awarded or not, he

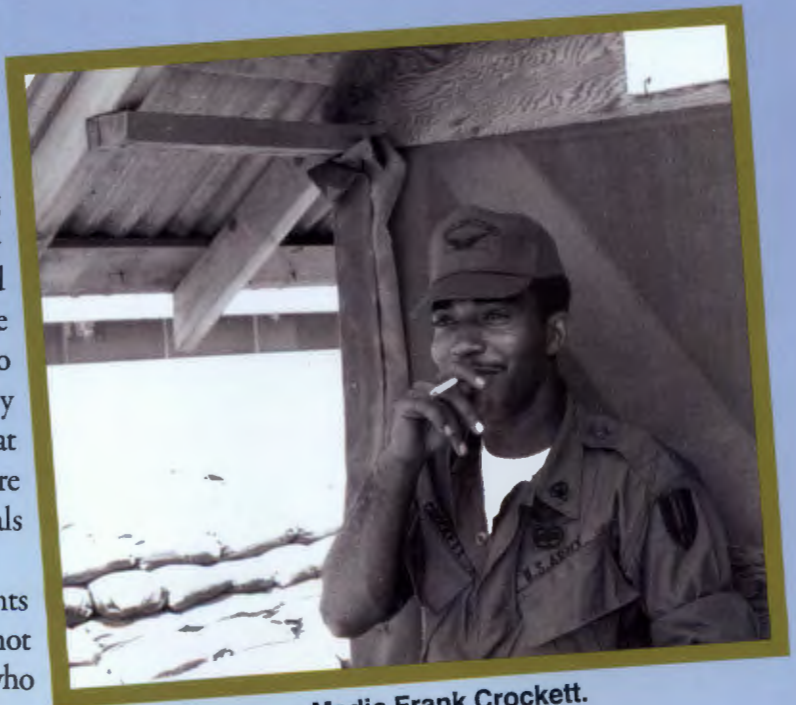
certainly deserved it for his heroism in defending his patients.

Also of note, perhaps because of his actions during this mission, WO1 Robin Halvorson was made an Aircraft Commander the next day, having proved himself under heavy enemy fire. Incidentally, other than the award for Crockett mentioned above, there were no medals awarded any of the crew on this mission, mostly because they went into North Vietnam "illegally". But after all, even if they hadn't crossed "the river", they were only doing what they were supposed to be doing; it's what they were trained for. They were all volunteers and medals were not expected.

1LT. Brink offered these additional comments on this mission: "The interesting thought that is not mentioned much is that poor wounded soldier who we had first picked up. I bet he avoided ever riding a DUSTOFF again." And this: "I have always felt that Tommy and Davey were the heroes on that mission, going back and dragging the ground guide LRRP into the aircraft after he froze there at the nose of the aircraft. As far as the bullet holes, many of the hits were in the underneath of the aircraft as the NVA were shooting as we were taking off." That same day, Brink filled out an after-action report, detailing the mission for headquarters. "It was tough. I knew those guys we picked up and now at least one of them was dead. Some of them I had just met at the party." What was even tougher was this: when 67th Medical Group found out 7-0-7 had crossed "that river", they grounded him! He was temporarily not allowed to fly because he violated the agreement with North Viet Nam. (Like the NVA honored the agreement!) But when Red Devil 6, a one star general, heard about the grounding, he overrode it, and Brink was back in the air two days later.

Here is one of those times where memories differ. Halvorson stated, "I don't think we crossed the river this day. I'm not saying I never did, I just don't think we did this time." Without a doubt, however, both agree that they were at least deep into the DMZ, whether they crossed the river of demarcation or not. Brink says they crossed, Halvorson says they didn't.

And speaking of 1LT Brink, remember those shards of his armored seat that knocked his feet off the pedals? Months later, Brink noticed his legs were itching a lot. While scratching them one time, he noticed that he pulled out a piece of the ceramic that surrounded his armored

seat. "I didn't even realize those pieces penetrated the skin.

I was pulling stuff out of the back of my legs for years after that!" The seat was stopping the bullets, but the rounds were disintegrating the coating and sending shards into his legs; he didn't even realize it at the time.

And the Helicopter? Oh, that! As a Huey is shut down, the normal procedure is to wait two minutes at a reduced RPM to let the engine cool down. Being the good pilots they were, Brink and Halvorson were waiting out the cool down period and at the two minute mark, Rob cut off the fuel, shutting down the engine. It was at this time, with no fuel forcing the engine to run, when the engine suddenly seized; "it just locked up" both pilots recalled. Looking at each other in disbelief, they couldn't quite figure out what had happened. As the crew performed a post flight inspection, they found the problem with the engine- there was no oil in it, a bullet had drained it all. Remember it was running hot on the way home? The engine had seized after shutdown, as good fortune had continued to smile on them; it just as easily could have quit in the air rather than on the ground. Further inspection of the aircraft also showed no transmission oil (the oil cooler had taken a hit) and no hydraulic fluid, as would be expected with the control problems. Oh, yes, they counted about 100 bullet holes. While Halvorson remembers 121 hits, Brink says, "That seems a little high, but it was at least high double digits!" Regardless of who is correct, they counted a whole bunch of incoming rounds in 6-2-7.

Since the Huey was still virtually intact, the common practice was to sling load it to the repair facility at Red Beach, on the west side of Da Nang Harbor, about an hour flight away. Poor ol' 627 was rigged for its inglorious ride South, having already served the 237th Medical Detachment for just under two years, and having flown for DMZ Dustoff a very honorable 1,212 hours. But at this post-flight part of the mission, we have another conflict of memories.

A few days after this last landing, and having saved literally thousands of lives over her career, 627 left the ground one more time as the Chinook that was sling loading her headed for the coast and the flight to Da Nang. Halvorson remembers that "at about 100 to 150 feet, the aircraft broke free of the rigging and crashed back onto the airfield". But Brink remembers it differently. He says, "I was told that somewhere over the choppy South China Sea, 627 came loose and was lost over water, never to be recovered."

Regardless of who, or both, is correct, the fact is that she had at least one more hard landing. Although there is some "paper" evidence that 627 did fly again months later, it is highly doubtful, considering the amount of damage it received, even if it wasn't dropped. Regarding the sling loading of 237th Hueys, Halvorson had this to say- "As I recall the mast broke when ours was slung, which was the reason it dropped. I also remember the skids being massively sprung. Of course, as I said, I have slept since then, so who knows. As to whether it could have been slung more than once, I am sure it was. Having our birds slung out to Da Nang was a semi-regular occurrence for a while there."

Whether the loss of this very heavily damaged Huey occurred over land or over water or both is still uncertain at this time, 40 years later. Was it "punched off" over the water because it was dropped over the airfield or because it was so badly shot up that no one in Red Beach maintenance wanted this wreck taking up space? We just don't know for certain. Both pilots could be correct, but one thing is unquestioned; UH-1H 67-17627 always brought her crew home, even when she was terribly wounded. Being dropped at either place or both, it was a fate she certainly did not deserve.

One final note. When I started researching another mission, I was told about Crockett having to fire his weapon to protect his patients on this mission. I had to know more about what happened. But the pilot who told me about it wasn't sure who else was on board except Halvorson, and no one knew how or where to locate him. When I finally found Halvorson months later, he told me Brink was the AC and who the crew chief was. "I know the crew chief was TJ (Tommy Johnson) on

this mission. He had that Texas drawl (Tommy says it's an Okie drawl, "it only sounds like Texas") and he carried this great big honkin' screwdriver in his tool kit, biggest one I ever saw. He used it to intimidate POWs when we picked them up. It was Tommy, for sure!" When asked about the screwdriver, Johnson said "We knew the POWs might go for our personal weapons and I didn't want any bullets flying around inside my helicopter, so I would just grab that screwdriver and make sure they saw it." And that's no April Fool!

EPILOGUE TO MISSION 1

*Two years after this book was first published,
I received the following email:*

Dear Mr. Marshall,

I was in the Memorial Day Parade in Royal Oak, Michigan when I saw a gentleman wearing a jacket with "DMZ Dustoff" on the front. I was struck numb, hopefully I will be able to say thank you for the bravery of your crews so many years ago.

My name is Ayleet (Bud) Wease. In 69-70 I served with P Co. 75th Rangers. Before we became Rangers we were LRRP teams; name change but same job. I believe it was May of 70, my team and I were operating in the DMZ and set up an ambush. In short, we took on more than we should, we had two wounded and were trying to get to high ground and the only relief in site was one of your Medevac Hueys.

They said they they looked down and the NVA were all around us, they committed and came in anyway. I remember running for the chopper and seeing one of your medics standing there holding a .38, I thought are you shitting me. The NVA shot the shit out of the helicopter that day. I remember the pilots glancing at each other as the windshield in front of them disintegrated in front of them and them yelling when bullets hit the back of their seats. I figure at least one hundred hits that day. Only Shorty next to me was killed. Lucky we were on a hilltop because the helicopter's "up and down" didn't work. We slid in back at Quang Tri. (Author's note: Bud is referring to the loss of hydraulics when he says, "up and down" and also refers to the running landing that the pilots were forced to make due to the same loss of controls.) Our unit didn't know where we were as the radios were shot out.

I served with some very brave people (especially) your people that took my breath away with their guts and determination. Would you thank them for me, plus I can be contacted by email, my wife thanks you. Well maybe, but I know my kids and their families thank you. I've thought of you and your unit many times through the years and then reading about the mission in your book. Well, the emotions are still there. Again, thank you for my life and God bless all of the men from your Medevac unit.

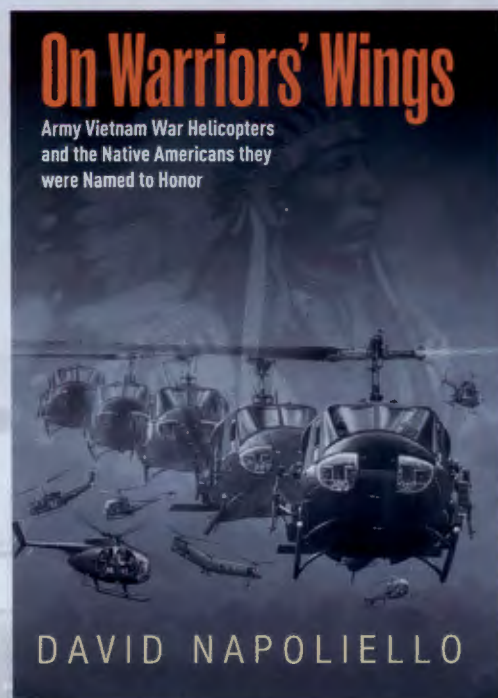
Bud (aka Killer Wease) in reality I was a skinny red head just keeping my head down.

A phone interview with Bud revealed the following information:

"We were a unit of six and we set up an ambush along a trail with about 10 Claymore mines. We sprung our trap on what apparently were the lead point men for a much larger force. We immediately took two casualties and headed for higher ground behind us. The wounded were able to keep up with us with assistance and that's when we called for the Dustoff. As we were getting on the aircraft, a round came from behind and went through the bulkhead, spraying hydraulic fluid all over the inside. Bullets were hitting the back of the pilot's seats and the windshield glass was flying apart. I could hear the pilots yelling at each other." (Author's note: remember, the intercom was shot out.)

When asked about his position as he climbed aboard, "I was not the guy hanging outside the aircraft, it must have been on the other side of the helicopter. I was trying to make myself as small as possible and didn't notice who it was!"

And when asked about the mission/story in general, he commented "Yes, it's true to form, that's how I remember it 40 plus years later."

VHPA Legacy Update

On November 28-29, 2023, VHPA representatives attended a Legacy Summit with representatives from The Army Aviation Museum, Army Aviation Association of America (AAAA), and Texas Tech University to discuss preserving the memory of Vietnam War helicopter operations, and indeed, the VHPA. The purpose of the summit was to determine steps needed to ensure our efforts and sacrifice are not forgotten. Some high schools do not teach the Vietnam War and colleges history courses are limited. Thankfully, we have people dedicated to preserving our service. This article provides an update while clearing up rumors and misconceptions.

IMPORTANT FACTS:

United States Army Aviation Museum and Foundation:

1. The museum prominently displays a VHPA plaque and poster. An original plaque presented in 2005 disappeared, perhaps mistakenly taken by a departing post commander.
2. The museum permanently displays the aircraft we flew, ensuring a lasting historical presence.
3. Current proposals include VHPA recognition of a graduating rotary-wing aviator from each flight class, and merit awards for the top enlisted member seeking aviation certification.
4. An additional project proposes moving the last remaining CH-47 "Guns A Go Go" from Huntsville, AL to the museum.
5. The museum has offered all VHPA members complementary life membership.
6. Lastly, the committee seeks to repeat our Arlington National Cemetery (ANC) success by possibly erecting a monument within the museum memorial garden.

AAAA:

1. The committee is encouraging the AAAA to grant VHPA members free life memberships.
2. AAAA has agreed to publish VHPA articles in their magazine.
3. AAAA has agreed to make the VHPA a virtual chapter of AAAA.
4. Although the VHPA will no longer add additional funds to the current existing fund, scholarships will continue. Individual contributions, such as those gathered during the VHPA Annual Meeting "passing of the

CAV hat" will be added. In 2023 the contributions totaled \$37,893.75.

5. The recap of our scholarship program with AAAA over the years has netted 956 qualified applicants with 489 receiving scholarships totaling \$801,500.00. \$213,500.00 have come from VHPA and \$587,000.00 from AAAA. Scholarships from AAAA amount to about 74% of total funds.

VNCA (Texas Tech University)

1. The Vietnam Center and Sam Johnson Vietnam Archive (VNCA) has an extensive collection of our war artifacts and oral histories, and importantly, possesses expert resident expertise.
2. Today additional collections continue to be added from members.
3. VNCA plans a museum of "Vietnam, The Helicopter War" where our contributions will be highlighted.
4. The existing VHPA endowment funds a merit scholarship to a student studying the Vietnam War.
5. Texas Tech takes student groups to Vietnam every other year and a merit award will be given to one deserving student.
6. Several years ago, the VHPA created the endowment fund, which is an interest-bearing fund paying for VNCA staff to catalog, store, preserve, and post information submitted by VHPA members. This will keep our history alive and available. Our funding of VNCA support was completed some time ago, and no further funds are required. Individual donations do continue, however.

The Legacy Committee continues to pursue ideas that will preserve our shared history and sacrifice, collaborating whenever possible to achieve important outcomes. Memorials such as the ANC Vietnam Helicopter Pilot and Crewmember Monument will be considered for all service museums possessing a memorial garden or appropriate viewing area. As ideas develop, updates will be provided.

INSTRUCTION AND INFORMATION SHEET FOR SF 180, REQUEST PERTAINING TO MILITARY RECORDS

- 1. General Information.** The Standard Form 180, Request Pertaining to Military Records (SF 180) is used to request information from military records. Certain identifying information is necessary to determine the location of an individual's record of military service. Please try to answer each item on the SF180. If you do not have and cannot obtain the information for an item, show "NA," meaning the information is "not available". Include as much of the requested information as you can. Incomplete information may delay response time. To determine where to mail this request see Page 2 of the SF 180 for record locations and facility addresses. Medical information may be withheld from a patient if determined that the information would be detrimental to the patient's physical or mental health or would likely cause the patient to harm himself or someone else. Online requests may be submitted to the National Personnel Records Center (NPRC) by a veteran or deceased veteran's next-of-kin using eVetRecs at <https://www.archives.gov/veterans/military-service-records/>.
- 2. Personnel Records/Military Human Resource Records/Official Military Personnel File (OMPF) and Medical Records/Service Treatment Records (STR).** Personnel records of military members who were discharged, retired, or died in service **LESS THAN 62 YEARS AGO** and medical records are in the legal custody of the military service department and are administered in accordance with rules issued by the Department of Defense and the Department of Homeland Security (DHS, Coast Guard). STRs of persons on active duty are generally kept at the local servicing clinic. After the last day of active duty, STRs should be requested from the appropriate address on page 2 of the SF 180 (See item 3, Archival Records, if the military member was discharged, retired or died in service more than 62 years ago).
 - a. **Release of information:** Release of information is subject to restrictions imposed by the military services consistent with Department of Defense regulations, the provisions of the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) and the Privacy Act of 1974. The service member (either past or present) or the member's authorized legal recipient has access to almost any information contained in that member's own record. The authorization signature of the service member or the member's authorized legal recipient is needed in Section III of the SF 180. Others requesting information from military personnel records and/or STRs must have the release authorization in Section III of the SF 180 signed by the member or authorized legal recipient. If the appropriate signature cannot be obtained, only limited types of information can be provided (DoD 6025.18-R C8). If the former member is deceased, the surviving next-of-kin (NOK) may be entitled to greater access to a deceased veteran's records than a member of the general public (DoD 6025.18-R C6.2.1.2). The NOK may be any of the following: unmarried/surviving spouse, father, mother, son, daughter, sister, or brother. Requesters **MUST provide proof of death such as the DD Form 1300, Casualty Report, a copy of a death certificate, newspaper article (obituary) or death notice, coroner's report of death, funeral director's signed statement of death, or verdict of coroner's jury.**
 - b. **Fees for records:** There is no charge for most services provided to service members or next-of-kin of deceased veterans. A nominal fee is charged for certain types of service. The COMPLETE address must be provided, INCLUDING any apartment/suite/unit/lot/space/etc. number. NOTE: If requester desires to send his/her record to a third party, he/she must fill out a DD Form 2870 authorizing the releasing agency to release the record and the timeframe of the authorization. The form may be downloaded using most commercial web search tools by entering "DD Form 2870" as a search term.
- 5. Definitions and abbreviations.** DISCHARGED -- the individual has no current military status; SERVICE TREATMENT RECORD (STR) -- The chronology of medical, mental health, and dental care received by service members during the course of their military career (does not include records of treatment while hospitalized); TDRL -- Temporary Disability Retired List.
- 6. Service completed before World War I.** National Archives Trust Fund (NATF) forms must be used to request these records. Obtain the forms by e-mail from inquire@nara.gov or write to the Code 6 address on page 2 of the SF 180.

through renaming their teams so as not to offend Native Americans. Not so for Army helicopters. Tribes are proud to be associated with Army helicopters; they participate in ceremonies naming the aircraft and the tribes actively approve the names. Proud warriors! And proud air crews!

In summary, tons of data and history is included here, both Vietnam helicopter and Native American history. Lots of research into the development of each model and detailed backgrounds of the tribes and chiefs that were so honored. Of course, there's more, lots more. Want to know how the UH-1 got it's Huey nickname? I think we all know it's due to it's original "HU-1A" designation but WHO is on record as coming up with "Huey" first is recorded here. 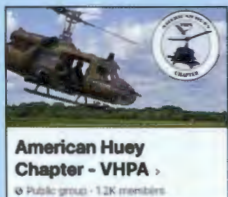

NORTH ALABAMA CHAPTER

On 12 December 2023, NAVHPA held its annual Christmas Dinner and Meeting at the Huntsville Country Club. Since our chapter was established, in mid-2010, this was our 13th Christmas Dinner and Meeting (would have been number 14 except for COVID in 2020). We had a record number of attendees – 92 members, spouses and guests attended. We had a remembrance table set up with a single place setting to remind us of those whom we have lost and a single rose to remind us of their families and loved ones. In April 2023, we lost Hal Stitt after an 18-month battle with cancer. Since 2010, our chapter has lost 11 members, seven spouses and three children of members. We honor and remember all these great Americans.

The December 2023 Business Meeting was called to order. All normal Board of Director and Committee reports were suspended until the January 2024 meeting (NAVHPA meets monthly).

President Marshall Eubanks presented a summary of our 2023 membership, activities and events. We currently have 68 members, including four Honorary Members. Fifteen of our members live outside of the North Alabama area – three in Birmingham, AL and 12 in the states of FL, TN, OH, TX, MO, MS, NC and WI. This has not always been the case.

Since our founding in 2010 when we had five dues paid members and we were living on donations by members/prospective members – as an example, the cost to submit a 501(c)3 application to the IRS was \$600. By June 2011, we had 30 dues paid members. We were off and running.

In 2023 NAVHPA participated in 13 events and activities. Five of the 13 were helicopter (BUC-3) display events: Alabama A&M University ROTC 50th Anniversary support; Armed Forces Week at the Veterans Memorial Museum; Support to American Legion Post 229 during Madison Street Festival; Cullman Alabama Veterans Celebration; and the Huntsville Vet-

erans Day Parade. Examples of the eight non-Buc-3 activities include: Cullman Alabama Huey Dedication; Ia Drang Valley AUSA Dinner; VHPA/AAAA's 160th Aviation Regiment tour at Ft Campbell, KY; Huntsville Memorial Day Ceremony and Wreath Laying; Gold Star Families Memorial Monument Dedication in

Decatur, AL; and Huntsville Wreaths for Veterans (our largest community support activity). NAVHPA purchased an 8x8 inch brick paver at the Aviation Museum at Mother Rucker (oops). The paver has a Huey picture and an inscription that reads "Blessed to Fly, Honored to Serve, Army Aviation, Vietnam 1961-1975".

After a festive Christmas dinner, our speakers for the evening were introduced – who do not need an introduction to NAVHPA (or VHPA). Mike Sprayberry and his wife, NAVHPA Honorary Member Julie Kink gave a very interesting talk about what they do to help the families of Vietnam MIA's by researching for a more precise location of MIA incidents. Mike served in Vietnam in 1967-68 as a Platoon Leader and Company Commander with 5/7th Cavalry. He received the Medal of Honor because of his actions on April 25, 1968, in the A Shau Valley. When Julie was eight years old, she lost her 19-year-old brother David while he was flying a helicopter in Vietnam. Her desire to know more about David led to a decades-long involvement with the VHPA and other Gold Star families, and her marriage

to Mike. Julie has made six trips and Mike has made eight trips to Vietnam. They follow leads and interview witnesses who might be able to provide more details on locations of incidents and in some cases burial sites. They do not do any digging – that is left up to others, like the Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency (What a story Mike has to tell about working with that agency!). Most of their work is centered around the A Shau Valley, where Mike's unit fought. He has a DVD (which he will give a copy to anyone) titled "The M.I.A.'s on Tiger Mountain". Their very interesting talk was much appreciated by all.

On 9/10 January 2014, NAVHVA members helped the Wreaths of Veterans organization retrieve and box around 3600 wreaths from Maple Hill and Valhalla Cemeteries in Huntsville. These boxed wreaths, at 10 per box, are trucked to the Huntsville City Schools warehouse to be placed on pallets and stored until November. NAVHVA has been supporting Wreaths for Veterans since 2013 and is our major community service project. Each year members spend two days in January retrieving wreaths, four days in November cleaning and preparing wreaths, and two more days in November placing wreaths on veterans' graves.

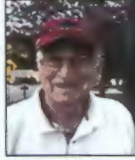

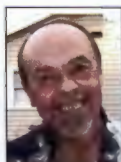
