May I ask you to make a presentation to President Diem on behalf of The Brookings Institution, Michigan State University, and myself? The David-Goldman-Bain Study of The Politics of National Party Conventions has just been published. Wes Fishel and I agree that President Diem would undoubtedly be pleased to receive a copy and that all concerned would be happy with the favorable publicity.

I have asked Herbert C. Morton, Director of Publications at Brookings, to send you a copy for presentation. I also have asked him to alert USIA and USIS people in Washington that a presentation would be made shortly.
