

HE HAS A MATURITY AND A KNOWLEDGE OF ICA WORK AS WELL AS INTERNAL MSU PATTERNS WHICH SHOULD BE INVALUABLE. IF MR. GARDINER FEELS THAT HIS VISIT IS USOM-ORIENTED, WELL AND GOOD. AS FAR AS WE, MICHIGAN STATE, ARE CONCERNED, STAN IS MSU-ORIENTED, AND HIS LOYALTY IS TO OUR INSTITUTION; HE IS HELD IN THE HIGHEST ESTEEM AND CONFIDENCE BY PRESIDENT HANNAH AND OTHERS.

CERTAINLY YOU SHOULD DISCUSS WITH HIM YOUR VIEWS ON THE VARIOUS USOM METHODS OF HANDLING CERTAIN OPERATIONS. WE HOPE TO DERIVE GREAT BENEFIT FROM HIS VISIT TO VIETNAM AND LOOK FORWARD TO HIS REPORT UPON HIS RETURN.

Dear Lloyd:

We have had another Vietnam week-end with the Carmichaels in town. It so happened that the Rosenfelds visited from Washington at the same time as the Carmichaels happened to be passing through, so we had a few old Vietnam hands to the house on Sunday and caught up on activities. Both Mike and Beverly looked good and seemed to have enjoyed their trip, although it must have been exhausting at times. Your ears must have been ringing since Berdyne and you came in for so much praise. It is good to know that both of you are doing so well.

My main purpose for writing is to inform you of the visit of Stan Andrews. Andrews is a mature and well experienced technical assistance leader who is now serving as consultant to our office. Among the positions he has held in the past is the Point Four directorship. He is well known to most of the old ICA hands and he was instrumental in getting many things started in the late 40's and early 50's. The broad purpose of his trip is to review activities in some of the countries with which he is familiar and to take a careful look at the various problems of technical assistance. He plans to visit Saigon and he will be in touch with you. A copy of his itinerary is enclosed.

Mr. Andrews is well known to Arthur Gardiner and met with him recently in Washington. You will find that Andrews is a very well informed individual and his maturity and experience may be helpful to you if there are some things you would care to talk over with him. He is not coming out as an inspecting officer, but is traveling on a special arrangement as an MSU staff member.

I should add that Stan is non-academic, although he has a good deal of respect for university professors. He is quite "salty" in his approach to international activities and can go on at great length with intelligence on many subjects, particularly those relating to agricultural affairs abroad. Prior to joining our office on a one year appointment as consultant early this year he was the Director of the National Project in Agricultural Communications based at Michigan State University. This was a Kellogg Foundation sponsored project which established a training program for extension and other rural education people. Andrews is now serving on a committee appointed by President Hannah which is looking into problems of short course orientation for university and business personnel who are going abroad.

I am sure that you will be able to be of service to Stan. He will be in touch with you, Wolf Ladejinsky, Arthur Gardiner, and possibly others. I don't know what his mode of operation will be in Saigon, and I don't know how to advise you as to arrangements, accommodations, etc. Be prepared to spend some time with Stan and I assure you it will be time well spent.

We now have President Chien of the National Taiwan University on our campus and I have been working with him. He is thoroughly enjoyable, and in my opinion, very capable. Next time you see Dean Paul Ma, who I understand is now in Vietnam, you can tell him for me that the visit of his president has been a truly worth-while event, and will serve well to get our cooperative effort off to a good start.
