Dear Pham:

I am deeply and terribly sorry that we missed each other on the day you departed for Washington and New York. In addition, of course, you missed the copy of the enclosed letter from Mr. Rodgers in which he assumed that you would arrive on January 5th.

I hope that you had a nice Christmas, but seeing that you were writing letters on Christmas day I am afraid that you have had a rather lonely holiday. My family's telephone number is WEBSTER 90793. I am sending them a copy of this letter and requesting them to invite you to their home while several of the other Vietnamese are in town.

The easiest way to reach my family's home in New Jersey is by taking bus # 35 (Inter City Lines) from Platform #7½ in the New York Port Authority Bus Terminal at 8th Avenue and 40th Street. You should purchase a ticket in advance at window 20 or 21, to East Rutherford, and ask the driver to let you off at the Garden Spot Tavern. Our house is the first one on Hackensack Street beyond the tavern and the Garden State Supply Company. I am sorry to have missed the opportunity to show at least part of New York City to you but do recommend that you see as much as possible, preferably in small doses.

Please find enclosed your check for January 1st to 15th.

As you might suspect Thoi and Chau contributed greatly to the successful operation of the New Year's celebration for the Vietnamese here in East Lansing. Needless to say it sounds as if everyone had a good time although I am sure that they missed the able assistance of an additional willing worker.

It took me over a day to recover from the Chinese celebration of the same occasion and I am now beginning to feel normal again.

I was pleased to hear that you and Bob had made arrangements to lunch together and perhaps get together over a weekend. He is the most unlikely type of individual for the characterization of Brooklynite and in fact his accent is so remote from the normal in this environment as to make him quite distinctive.

I trust that the weather has been less distressing in the New York area than here. We have had a series of first of snow (which still remains on the ground) then sleet, then rain, and then sleet again. Everything is just a sheet of ICE, and my car remains in the driveway!

Thank you for your letter of February 17th. I am sure that the weather in New York City is no colder than the below zero temperatures of East Lansing, for the last few days. I also received a note from your wife the other day and I am pondering the possibilities of answering this in Vietnamese. Sheer imputence on my part. Also in the process of setting in the boss's chair the other day I discovered an English-Vietnamese dictionary in Mr. Sheinbaum's bookcase. Subsequently since he is now in Vietnam for three or four weeks I have borrowed same, -as a better source of answers than the small vocabulary available in the incomparable books on spoken Vietnamese.

Believe it or not I think I might make some progress especially if I were ever able to convince my "scotch nature" that a tape recorder was a reasonable investment.

You do not mention in your letters about the New Year's eve celebration in New York City. Mrs. Bach-Lan mentioned that there were 28 people there including three children whereas the group that celebrated here numbered 29 including the Ban family.
