Dear Elsie,

The days ~~the~~ passed by so quickly and I realize now that I get back ~~for~~ ^{since} one month without dropping a few lines ^{to you} about my stopover in Japan and my job in Saigon.

In fact I am swamped since my return I had only 3 days off and back to work. Since a person in my department will go to receive training in France, I have to keep abreast with all matters in the Foreign Department and this means that I have to bring files at home. I was promoted to be sub-manager of the Foreign Department: this means a little higher salary and much more responsibilities. In this connection, my training in your country was very useful to me.

The day after my arrival I called up Thor and Jane Erickson. I saw Thor twice in my office and on the eve of ~~Thor~~ the Tet to hand over me a gift from Boris. So far I haven't my opportunity to invite ~~Jane~~ to a dinner.

I met my wife in Tokyo in the 2nd week. We had a very good time.

I remember your country every day and hope I'll see you again in Saigon in the

near future.

By the way, I had a good time in Oregon. I was host of 12 people ~~in~~ a Vietnamese dinner. The result was most of them want to go to Viet Nam.

I was a little disappointed disappointed in Japan. Except Nikko, the country is not so beautiful as I expected. And the Japanese bank employees can't talk in English or French with me. I was able to converse ^{only} with the Section or Department Head. On the contrary, the Japanese are very hospitable and courteous. The big trouble was to make ourselves understood.

Please give my regards to your parents, Bob, the Gabis, the Higbees, the Adamsons, the Bans, Doris, Kim Han and all people at Viet Nam Project.

I was very pleased to receive your letter, especially knowing how busy you are.

Doris left the Vietnam Project just a week after I returned from my vacation on March 14th, and was married last Saturday. I am sure that she will be happy in her new life. Dear Pham:

I had been unaware of the death of Bob's father until I received your letter and on the same day one from Bob. Although I did not know his father personally, I am sure it was a great loss, particularly as Bob is so close to his parents.

There also seem to be problems with his new boss and I am sure that this does not help the situation any. I can sympathize with his great concern over the current situation in his office under the new management as this, in effect, is what has happened to the Vietnam Project over the last eight or nine months. It seems almost as if the Project continues only through the momentum created under the leadership of Stan Sheinbaum, and that the ultimate end may be a slow dying out. Actually though, the work load is so much less that I have had lots of free time -- which I could have used last year. I would still prefer being busy, but know that you have little time or energy left for yourself in such a case.

Both the Bans and Chau are expecting to return to Vietnam at the end of the summer. The degrees they will receive at the commencement will range from a Ph.D. for Ban to an M.A. for Quy and a B.A. for Chau. Quy may go back to work at the bank after their return.
