The University of Southern California is a private one. The School of Public administration is a part of the University. Through the School of public administration the University offers its services to the following groups:

- men and women engaged in public service who desire an organized plan of study.
- men and women who are preparing for careers in public administration, in research, and in the performance of official functions.

- college students
- persons charged with specific

governmental responsibility.

Currently, two training programs are carried on: ^{The first is} a post-graduate development program. The objective is to prepare ranking officers for increasing management responsibilities and to train them in good management practices.

The second is a fire administration program. This program designed to assist the chief of the fire department and administrative officers with their current and future management problems.

Besides these special training programs, there are regular courses for full-time students and government officers. These courses are carried out on a single academic standard basis.

Similarity is found between this institution and the N.I.T. in Saigon.

program of 12 weeks duration, designed
to prepare law enforcement

The "Youth Studies center" was established
in July, 1958 for 5 years period
at the University of Southern
California through a grant from

the Ford foundation.

The objectives of the Center are:

1. to mobilize and coordinate the efforts of faculty members in the social sciences, practitioners from youth welfare agencies in order to study the complex problem of youth and contribute to the solutions of those problems.
2. to focus on the needs of all children but with special emphasis on the problem of delinquency.
3. to communicate this knowledge to personnel working with youth.

The center is an integral part of the University and has a University committee plus an Advisory Council to provide guidance and counsel.

The center has three major divisions: Research, Community Demonstration and Education and Training with each division having an Advisory committee.
