We had a wonderful time together. How kind you, & your family. I like your Dad very much - He walked with me to Bus station & gave a bus ticket for N.Y. City. It seems that all people want me to save money to buy other things - But I did not bring much money when I left New Haven & Boston - and I don't care very much about that. I know to whom I should send SOS in case of needs.

So, every thing will be fine -

People from Intercontinental Corp. like to have an idea about the situation of Hotel Business in Saigon - I will show them a good plan -

I am really busy I hope that I'll have time to have a sight seeing - I don't think so,

I try to set down everything with my people then I come back to E. Lansing. I don't like very much subway, I prefer to fill my lungs with the air of E. Lansing (almost it's better).

The big boss of IHC will be back from his vacation on Sunday 17th August - I try to meet him before I'll leave N.Y.C.

I have promised to see your family (Dad
& Step Mother) once again before I'll leave
N.Y.C.

I never thought that I am so busy
in N.Y.C. I hope that I shall relax ⁱⁿ few
days at E. Lansing.

Dear Thoi:

Please find enclosed your per diem check for the period from August 16th through the 31st. I know you will need this if the reports I hear about the Waldorf Astoria are true. In fact, I can't imagine that even this will be sufficient to any where near cover the expenses of living at the Waldorf. We figured it out that even with a 50 percent cut, it would cost you about \$10 per day, which leaves a meager allowance of \$2 to eat.

Also please find enclosed the mail which has arrived here for you.

If I had known that you were going to be at the house on Thursday, I would have called. In fact, my guess is that there was sufficient roast beef left over for you to carry back a few roast beef sandwiches to tide you over the next day. I mentioned to my parents that I hoped if you were able to return you would bring Pham with you. They seem to have enjoyed your visit very much. I trust that you enjoyed it as much. I hope this means that my father is now fully recovered and enjoying the company of friends as he always had in the past.

We are looking forward to seeing you next week. If you decide in advance, drop me a line and I will meet the plane.

60 dollars a month including room, board & laundries.

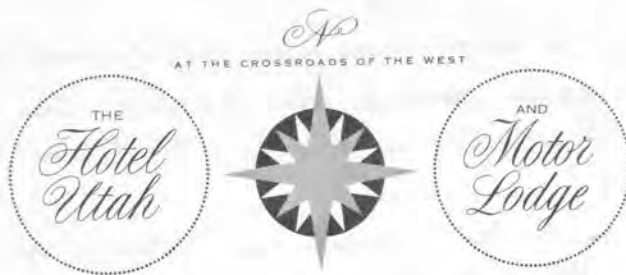
The curiosity asked me to get acquaintances with

Dear Elsie,

Today I have a full day to work out with Mr. Pronlx. As I told you, I have learned a great deal with him. I enjoy very much to receive his advice - yesterday, I thought that I was going for a sight seeing by Grey line - But I met a Vietnamese Mr. An who came from Sacramento by car - I never knew him before, but we made acquaintances quite quick, we took a ride together.

I think the management of this Hotel will complement me for the room - This morning I met the assistant manager, he told me that I am his "distinguished" guest. I guess that I don't pay anything - Anyway I will know that when I check out.

This morning when I reconfirmed my plane, the western Airline told me that I have a quick stop at Las Vegas. I thought that maybe it is worthwhile to spend some more money to know one more city which creates too much noises around the world - so that I have asked for a stop over for 24 hours - and I have paid 2.50 extra - so I will arrive at Los Angeles on 31st August instead of 30th August. I hope you will make sure I don't like gambling -

I don't enjoy very much my stay in Salt Lake City - except to get new ideas from Mr. Pronlx - I should say I do enjoy by that way - but not the way as a tourist -

Dear Elsie, I am a man who has to move out from a spot he loves and every mile I make I feel I run away from that city, from you, from everybody - If you were planning your trip few hours ahead, I should cancel my depart for Ecuador - In that way I think I will enjoy much more (as a tourist) and I will meet Mr. Pronlx

later on - now everything has done I just go on to my way home - hoping to hear from you only by mail about E. Lausing....

Nearly a year round has passed, the sceneries of the whole year flew like a flash. Well, it should be like this, isn't it?

I have met Mr. Guyah in town. We have had a quick talk. He asks me my itinerry and says that he will meet me at Los Angeles & Tokyo. As I am not myself everything is ok now.

I tell you good bye now & I will write to you from Los Angeles.

Frankly, it is a relief to be out of the house where they are so many restrictions. As a matter of fact, unless someone told me about the drinking restrictions, how could you expect people to be so silly in an off-campus apartment.

At the moment I am trying to figure out how I am going to keep busy after the first flurry of activity accompanying the arrival of two new participants this month. Really it doesn't look like there will be very much to do and I am longingly thinking of a trip to Vietnam.

Dear Elsie,

It seems that I have forgotten all my friends in East Lansing, please do not believe that. I never forget them, I never forget you. How could I do that, a year round with somebody I like very much, a year round in an area where I got a part of my knowledge, do human beings so vulgar to be so? If some of them do, they are ~~xxx~~ just some amongst the whole mass. I suppose that I'm not the one who forget easily.

Well, I still keep me busy in my work. Frankly I haven't my own time. While we, it means the hotel, have less business, I run around and around to look for business - but as soon as we get more guests in the house, it keeps me busy, I hang around to watch my personnel - if they will do something wrong I think that it will hurt my reputation. I don't know how much it costs my reputation which equals, for the time being ZERO, why do I care of it? I don't know, may be just too much scrupule.

I have received 2,3, letters from you, greeting cards and so on. Thank you very much for that. I have received your attestation saying that I have followed such and such courses of hotel business, but it's not the one our Government needs. It will be a type of Diploma with a big head line MSU and so forth... We say: good wine needs no bush - sometimes it does sometimes it doesn't.

I have worked during the whole TET, as a part of my personnel got their home leave I did take care of the office, my wife took a day to pay a visit to my parents in low and I took care in the same time of our children, one of them got sick during TET, he all right now, so we didn't fully our TET, I was working and thinking the day I spent the TET in ~~East~~ Florida and the meeting we have had together at the International Center for our TET 1957. I am planning to run full house from now up to the end of this month, and already we have a lot of work for pre-preparation. The lease of our hotel will expire on May, we are not expecting to renew it - there will have ~~new~~ some chngement.

Chau's mother came to see me last week, she is so sweet, so nice as her daughter does, she speaks very frankly, she is not well built as Chau does but she is still very strong, I mean by good health.

Elsie, I would like to ask you, if you can, you try to manage any way to send to me some magazines about hotel and restaurant, ~~xxx~~ such as: Hotel managemnt, Institutions.

There were two fellows who got 2 years scholarship from USOM: Mr. TAY and Mr. THA, they came to me and asked me about the matter, I have tried to convince them the high rate of MSU's program of hotel school, it ~~seemed~~ to me that was very hard to our fellows to discuss with USOM's people for any chngement of their program- They are not like our friend Mr. Ky who persists to do what he is expecting to have. ^{quite} Any way, I have to tell you that they like me very much, they ^{quite} to see me many times before their departure. We are expecting to get a real collaboration between people in hotel field who have been in USA.

With the return of Dr. Austin I'm going to bring up the sore subject of my trip to Saigon once again.

Nancy just proved that ybe can manage quite well without me - at least no major faux pas occurred while I was away for a month - Believe it or not I have just returned from a month's vacation. Mexico City, Panama, Lima, Cusco & Machhu Pichu, Buenos Aires, Sao Paulo, Brasilia and Rio de Janeiro. I'm now suntanned, broke and relatively rested, Only wish that I could have had more money and more time.

I hate to be the bearer of sad tidings but the diplomas are still waiting the approval of the Dean (they went their just as I left on vacation but am really waiting for Dr. Austin to request an answer one way or another so that I can have them printed up).
