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2. The dissertation will be written under the close supervision by Professor Merle Fainsod and Professor RUPERT Emerson at Harvard University.
3. In an attempt to reconstitute a relatively comprehensive view of the evolution of Western impact on the Vietnamese bureaucrat—and through him—the Vietnamese society, the following research and writing schedule has been worked out with substantial help and guidance by Prof. Dang:
