Dear Elsie:

I have finished my summer session here, but I have to keep on studying Statistics in order to be able to take the qualifying examination which will be given on October 2, 1959. I will notify the Project the results of my summer examinations soon.


I feel that you like to know that I did go to Tennessee early last June. But at that time I was in such a position as I couldn't profit much of the opportunity: in fact I have shortened my absence from NY. And that helped me very much: I could see Dr. Carter Goodrich just as he dropped into his office, and as you know it, it's difficult to meet a professor during inter-session time.

I like very much to spend one week in the summer camp, organized by the Association of the Vietnamese Catholic Students in the United States, in Quaker Bridge, New York. Here is my projected schedule: Aug. 28, leaving NY for Buffalo, by plane; 30, leaving Niagara Falls for Salamanca, New York, a town near the camp; Sept. 4, leaving Salamanca for NY, via Boston, by train. Do you think that the Project finds some justification for giving me the necessary tickets? This trip is entirely for my well-being, indeed. I know that you have planned a Canadian visit for Than and me, after the seminar in East Lansing. So please correct my schedule as you find

it more convenient for me. But may I say that at least the second half of September must be fully devoted to review, to study, exactly, Statistics. So I think a trip as far as to Montreal, at that time, is probably not very good to do. However I can change my mind. Please accept my warm thanks for your perfect kindness.

I will send to the Project, a short outline of my paper for suggestions and approval before developing it.

Dear Toan:

I am quite willing to allow you to go to Buffalo, etc., enroute to East Lansing. If you can arrange to attend the Vietnamese Student Association conference enroute to East Lansing, this would be the best solution. The only problem I see is the prolonged period that you will be away from your studies. Also the fact that you must be prepared for the seminar with a paper. You could plan to do the paper while in East Lansing. In addition, we could arrange for you to have access to the library facilities.

Please let me have your decision at the earliest possible moment.

The itinerary I suggested would include Buffalo, Niagara Falls, and then East Lansing, rather than a return to New York via Boston. This is the first inkling I have had of any Canadian trip planned after the seminar in East Lansing. However, as you can see, the date of the seminar is so late that there will be no time before the fall semester for additional travel.
