Dear Mr. Miniclier:

Dr. Ralph Smuckler has asked me to take over the necessary details concerning the program of Messrs. Borromeo and Rawiwatanawongs during the Spring Quarter.

It is in this connection that I am writing for any information you may have on several points that need to be clarified, if possible before their arrival here. First would you think that they would prefer to live in a dormitory or in off campus living accommodations. In either case the distance from classrooms, library etc. would be approximately the same. There will be space available during this quarter in a house where several Filipino students are now living. I am sure that housing on campus could be easily arranged. Second in the planning of meetings, field trips, etc. there may be some transportation expenses involved and so it would reassure me to know that we could expect either public conveyance or private vehicle expenses to be reimbursed. I am well aware of the regulation against participant's driving vehicles but feel that we may have to ask other people to accompany them on trips that might otherwise not be considered absolutely essential.

Dean Taggart just arrived back on campus last week after his trip. In fact there is a possibility that he might have to leave again shortly.

Any suggestions or modifications that you might wish to make in the biographical sketches I have enclosed would be useful. If there are other changes in the program indicated either by changes at home or in this country, I would also appreciate these.
