I have just written my third letter to University of Chicago requesting an application form. I shall follow this up with a telephone call in a day or two. I have also written to Cornell.

In submitting Mr. Than's application to the University of Illinois I have indicated the need for speed in order to complete governmental formalities. In looking at the University of California admission procedure I see that Mr. Than will have to complete another form from the School of Business Administration (this is indicated at the top of the application form) and have requested that this form be sent to you. University of Illinois requests forms in duplicate and I have sent them a Themofax copy of Mr. Than's application.

In a memorandum to this office written on Sept. 23, 1957 David Cole mentioned in some detail the background of Mr. Than and Mr. Tzi and suggested courses of study. We have MSU application forms filled out by all three gentlemen. In addition there are transcripts of Mr. Tean's 1st Baccalaureat examinations.

Does Mr. Than believe that he can obtain a certificate of attendance or some official details on the certificate he obtained from the London School of Economics? His acceptance is quite probable without this but starting at an advanced level might have to be worked out at a later date.

1. All the applications have been forwarded to the universities as requested. It is difficult to make any accurate judgment on the possibilities of acceptance for Mr. Than and Mr. Toan except to say that Columbia, M.I.T., Harvard, U. of California and U. of Chicago probably have among the greatest number of foreign applicants and can probably only take a small proportion of these. My guess is that Mr. Than might have less trouble being accepted than Toan at Columbia; however, please find enclosed a letter from University of California which does not bespeak too well of his chances there.

3. Please find attached a small pamphlet from the University of Minnesota for foreign students.

1. Since Mr. Xuan's visit here last weekend, we have discussed the question of ability relative to the doctoral candidates who will be coming to the U.S. Under the graduate study program. Stan and I were pleased with Xuan's interest, motivation and plans regarding his present work at Vanderbilt and what he might do while working on his Ph.D. This entire program must by its very nature be more closely geared to academic requirements and achievements than the other sectors of the participant program.
2. This brings me back to the comment you offer in your "Weekly Report on the Status of Participants" of March 28. While what you say about elevating the value of an American degree is true, it is our hope that we might achieve more positive results by the conclusion of a successful program in which all the graduate study participants complete their Ph.D.s.
3. Have you received final acceptance for Mr. Than at Cornell? Has Mr. Toan received any word from Columbia?

Dear Miss Cunningham:

It is now possible for us to report progress on the materials submitted with your letter of March 24 addressed to Dean Wendell W. Wright on behalf of Mr. Tran Qui Than who wishes to work toward the Doctor of Business Administration degree in the School of Business and who is to come to the United States under the sponsorship of the Michigan State University Vietnam Project.

The School of Business is willing to accept Mr. Tran into the D.B.A. program for the academic year beginning September 10, 1958 provided he is able to meet all personal and educational expenses without assistance from Indiana University. We were not quite sure how to interpret his statements about income but suggest that he and his wife would probably need \$3000 or more for each academic year of study. This does not include an allowance for summer maintenance.

We assume your project will use its program number in bringing Mr. Tran to the United States. However, if you need us to issue a Form I-20 we will be glad to do it.

We are impressed by the fact that Mr. Tran's records are not in regular form. In fact this lack of official documentation caused great hesitation in the School of Business. We are sure he can arrange for Exeter University to send from the registrar's office a record of the examinations passed and his standing on those examinations at the time he was there. If he took formal examinations at the other schools, they also should be able to furnish records. It would appear, however, from the letters of recommendation submitted that he probably did not take formal examinations at the London School of Economics or the Graduate Institute of International Studies.

It has been suggested that the easiest way to reach the Vietnamese students already in the United States would be through Chuong Viet, a publication of the Vietnamese Catholic Students Association in Chicago. Father Jacques in this organization has wider contact than even in the Embassy and if the possibilities of selecting a Ph.D. candidate from those who are already in the States still exist, this would seem to be the best available to reach the Vietnamese students here in the U.S. If the scholarships for 1958 have already been committed and you are sure that these participants selected will finally depart for the U.S., it would not be wise to give this additional publicity; but if there is any possibility that a vacancy might exist for a well qualified candidate, it would certainly save us certain expenses and adjustments that seem to be very difficult for the current graduate study participants.
