A word of explanation: Phat was carrying 13 graduate credits, all but one course (510) in fields where he had little or no prior preparation and I feel that his grades are a real tribute to the amount of work and to his ability.

In the case of Buu Dich, things are still very much in a questionable state. Even given strong support, I am rather doubtful that the department will accept him on a degree level. It seems that Frank Cliffe, whose 500 level course Mr. Dich was in, would have real doubts as to his ability to carry on a graduate program. Particularly, if it were a full load as we anticipate everyone will take in the future.

In the case of Van, I know that he received the second highest grade in the final exam in 506-C. Vien's papers are presently in the dean's or department's office and it has not been decided on definitely yet as to his acceptance. Had he not misinterpreted one question, he too would have received an A in 506-C.

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Luong Nhi Ky sent me his grades but with no indication of the courses that these grades were for. My guess is that one of the two A's he received was in English and the B and the C respectively in political science courses. I have asked him to clarify this and hope to be able to give you this information very soon.

You have given no indication of what fields the two potential Ph.D. participants would be studying in and what universities they intend to apply for admission. I do not think it would be wise to send any additional Ph.D. participants to M.S.U. If Messrs. Pham Van Thuyet and Du Phuoc Long do not have additional degrees beyond the N.I.A., there will be considerable difficulty in their admissions on the graduate level. Perhaps the key to the past refusals on the part of the University of California and Harvard University lies in the application directly for admission to the Ph.D. program rather than applying for admission to the M.A. program.
