Thank you for your letter of April 17. I have delayed my answer until I was sure of the time that I would be in Washington. I now expect to stay at the Statler for two days (Monday and Tuesday, May 12 and 13) as there are several matters urgently requiring my attention in Washington.

I might also mention that Dr. Wesley R. Fishel, former Chief Advisor in Saigon, is expected on May 24 and I know that all the Vietnamese and several other persons expect to be at the airport to welcome him. Do you think that this might be an opportunity to do a series of tapes and pictures?

From a purely personal standpoint I would very much appreciate it if you could obtain for me the present address of Mr. and Mrs. Malcolm MacNeal. My friends and I seem to have lost track of Mrs. MacNeal who is, as a matter of fact, a former roommate of mine.
