
Arrival of Pike Collection

On August 29, 1994, Texas Tech's Archive of the Vietnam Conflict received Douglas Pike's extensive collection of documents related to the Vietnam War. Comprised of several hundred boxes of material, the collection includes a wide range of materials relating to all aspects of the war. Acquisition of the Pike Collection marks a major step forward for the archive, which continues to seek donations of letters, documents, diaries, photos, and any other informational material relating to Vietnam and Indochina in general. While Douglas Pike is well known to every academic involved in the study of Vietnam, he is perhaps less well known to others interested in Vietnam. Mr. Pike is a retired U.S. Foreign service

officer who spent many years either in Vietnam or studying events there. During his government service he generally was regarded as the U.S. Government's leading expert on Vietnamese communism. Among his many credits are seven books, including: *Viet Cong: The Organizational Techniques of the National Liberation Front of South Vietnam; War, Peace and the Viet Cong; History of Vietnamese Communism; PAVN: People's Army of Vietnam; and Vietnam and the Soviet Union: Anatomy of an Alliance*. Mr. Pike has contributed to 24 edited volumes and written several hundred popular and scholarly articles, monographs and conference papers on Southeast Asia.

Mr. Pike is a member of the National Council of the Vietnam Center. He participated in the Center's 1993 Vietnam conference, *Vietnam: Paris +20*, and is scheduled to participate in our 1995 Vietnam Roundtable and 1996 Vietnam Symposium. We are honored to receive Mr. Pike's remarkable documentary collection, and to enjoy his continuing support.

After The Cold War: Reassessing Vietnam

Second Triennial Vietnam Symposium • 18-20 April 1996

The principal focus for the Vietnam Center's second triennial Vietnam symposium is indicated in its title, *After the Cold War: Reassessing Vietnam*.

A significant number of academics and principal participants in the war have already committed to present papers or to participate in discussion panels for this major Vietnam conference.

Admiral Zumwalt has been endeavoring to arrange a visit by General Vo Nguyen Giap to participate in the symposium. Should that visit occur, we envision a panel discussion with Admiral Zumwalt, General Giap and at least one senior U.S. Army Officer.

The principal papers of the symposium, we plan, will be published as the second volume in our conference proceedings series.

Ground Breaking for Texas Tech's International Cultural Center

Ground was broken on August 12th, marking the formal beginning of Texas Tech's International Cultural Center which, when completed, will house the university's international programs, including the Center for the Study of the Vietnam Conflict. The 40,000 square foot facility will include a formal theater and conference facilities capable of handling as many as seven conference sessions

simultaneously. The project's beginning marks six years of struggle by the local community and Texas Tech to establish a state-of-the-art facility to support and highlight the many international programs at Texas Tech University. The Vietnam Center will greatly benefit by this new facility which, when completed, will provide offices for the Vietnam Center and will be the venue for future Vietnam symposia.
