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Wanted: Conference 2003 Paper Proposals

Look ahead to this fall, and keep two dates in mind relating to the 40th anniversary of the late South Vietnamese President Ngo Dinh Diem. Beginning Oct. 24, the Vietnam Center will hold its 10th annual conference at Texas Tech University in Lubbock, Texas. Circle that date on the calendar, and an earlier date as well: Sept. 15. That is the deadline by which the Center seeks to have in hand scholarly studies and other papers focusing on Diem, the repercussions of his assassination and related topics.

Conference 2003, a two-day affair, was scheduled specifically to be held around the 40th anniversary of Diem's overthrow and death, which occurred on Nov. 1, 1963. Diem's assassination was one of two major events that November that altered the history of the times. Three weeks after Diem's death, John F. Kennedy was assassinated in the United States. Though their deaths were unrelated, the

political fortunes of the two leaders had been increasingly linked because of turmoil in South Vietnam, where Communist forces sought to take over the country. Mr. Kennedy, mindful of the stakes involved in Cold War attempts to prevent Communism's spread, viewed South Vietnam as a problem of growing concern, one having the potential to prevent his being re-elected.

Thus the theme of Conference 2003: "The Rise and Fall of Ngo Dinh Diem: Its implications for the United States and for Vietnam."

Two years from now comes yet a third date to bear in mind. In 2005, the Vietnam Center will host its 5th Triennial Vietnam Symposium. This will be a wider-ranging event, one featuring panels and papers covering assorted aspects of not only Vietnam but Laos and Cambodia as well. The date to circle on the calendar: 17-19 March.

High School Teachers To Attend VN Center's Summer Workshop

A member of Congress, a Medal of Honor winner, and a noted author of Vietnam era history are among scheduled speakers this summer for the Vietnam Center's second workshop for high school teachers.

Lined up to participate in the event June 26-27 are U.S. Rep. Sam Johnson, who was a prisoner of war in Vietnam; retired Army Col. Roger H.C. Donlon, the first to receive the Medal of Honor for valor in the Vietnam War, and Dr. Larry Berman of the University of California's Washington, D.C., Center, author of *No Peace, No Honor*.

The workshop will be the second of what the Center is endeavoring to make a regular affair. The first workshop was held in 1998.

Other individuals expected to speak at the workshop include Dr. Joe Dunn, Converse College, Spartanburg, S.C. ("First Person Sources for Teaching the Vietnam War"); Dr. Steve Potts, Mankato

From the Director

In recent weeks all of us have witnessed repeated scenes depicting young service men and women tearfully departing family and loved ones upon being deployed to Southwest Asia in America's preparations to deal with Saddam Hussein. Those emotional scenes remind me very much of similar scenes more than thirty years ago, when many of us responded to the call to serve in Vietnam. I am impressed and immensely proud of the young men and women of America's armed forces of today, and wish them good luck and Godspeed in their current deployments.

The beginning of a new year is a time to take stock. Fourteen years ago, a group of Lubbock-area Vietnam veterans met to discuss what we might do, in a positive way, about our Vietnam experience. We decided in that 1989 meeting to begin collecting materials from local Vietnam veterans so students at Texas Tech University would have some sources of information for their research. From that humble beginning, the Vietnam Archive has grown to proportions none of us at that first meeting ever anticipated. Our microfilm research collection alone, after an investment of nearly \$400,000, is one of—if not the—most extensive in the world. And thanks to the very active support of outgoing Lubbock Congressman Larry Combest and Congressman and former Vietnam POW Sam Johnson, all non-copyrighted materials in the collection are being posted to the Virtual Vietnam Archive website [<http://www.vietnam.ttu.edu>], thus granting global, free access to them by researchers, veterans, students . . . anyone interested in the Vietnam War.

While noting anniversaries, this year marks the 40th anniversary of the overthrow and assassination of Ngo Dinh Diem, an event that further destabilized the government of South Vietnam and proved an important milestone in American involvement there. With this in mind, we have shifted the date of our annual conference for 2003—to 24-25 October—to more closely connect the conference with the anniversary. Elsewhere in this newsletter you will find a call for papers for this conference. As an aside, for those of us who were in Vietnam or offshore at that time, the fortieth anniversary is a reminder that we have become members of the "older generation." Have you made arrangements for your papers to be preserved in the Vietnam Archive at Texas Tech? Shouldn't you?

With no annual conference this April, the Vietnam Center, cooperating with the Department of Education of the International Cultural Center at Texas Tech, is offering a summer workshop for high school teachers teaching the Vietnam War. Few high school teachers today have actual experience in Vietnam. It is essential that we provide a regular forum at which teachers seeking to

improve their treatment of the Vietnam War have an opportunity to acquire more information and develop new strategies for dealing with the war in their classrooms. That workshop is scheduled for 26-27 June.

The arrival of the late Peter Braestrup's papers at the Vietnam Archive marks a new level of cooperation between the Vietnam Archive and the Smithsonian Institution, and we particularly wish to thank the Smithsonian for redirecting this collection to us. Mr. Braestrup, who served in Vietnam as a reporter for the New York Times and later as Saigon bureau chief for the Washington Post, also was associated with the Vietnam Center. He was our keynote speaker at our 1997 conference.

As we begin this new year, permit me to thank each of you for supporting the Vietnam project at Texas Tech University. Without your support, encouragement and suggestions, our project could not have succeeded as it has. Without your support in the years ahead, we risk failing to attain our goal of preserving as much as possible of the record of the American experience in Vietnam.

State University ("Using Documents, Film and Oral History: A Critical Skills Approach to Teaching the History of the Vietnam Conflict"); Dr. Jane Hamilton-Merritt, independent scholar; and Lindi Poling of Millbrook High School in North Carolina ("To Teach a Nation: Implementing the Vietnam Curriculum in America").

Col. Fox: Remembering The Ashau Valley

Marine Col. Wesley L. Fox (retired), a recipient of the Medal of Honor in the Vietnam War, vividly recalls the desperation of Operation Dewey Canyon, which was launched in early 1969 in the Ashau Valley.

"We were way out in a valley far from any Marine Corps support other than what could be provided to us by helicopter — and a good number of those days were non-flying days due to bad weather.

"We ended up doing without water, food and ammo. But what really hurt us was not being able to medevac our casualties. So, for many days in that war, we carried our dead and wounded with us as we continued to fight and do what we had to do.

"It was a tough operation, but it was a good one in that we did what the enemy didn't expect — and we really hurt the enemy. There were 105 North Vietnamese army dead in the battle area, compared to my 11 Marines dead. "I don't say that lightly, because it was 11 Marines. And it's a hell of a price — one that I would prefer not paying."

Col. Fox, then a seasoned, up-from-the-enlisted ranks lieutenant, was wounded twice in that operation and later awarded the Medal of Honor. His recollections came in an interview with the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal shortly before he arrived in Lubbock, Texas, in January to speak to a local Marine reserve unit and to visit the Vietnam Center at Texas Tech University. The reservists had been mobilized for possible duty in the event of war with Iraq.

"I think if you've got a cancer, you need to cut it out—and you need to do it now," Col. Fox said of the current situation. "I'm with our presi-

dent, and I think that we need to get on with it. If we had done something in 1993, the first time the Trade Center was damaged, if we had done the right things then, we wouldn't have lost the 3,000 that we did in 2001."

In the interview, Col. Fox also recalled how the Ashau Valley operation claimed the life of Lt. Lee Roy Herron, a Lubbock man who subsequently was awarded the Navy Cross for his valor.

"In that fight I had lost a platoon leader, and Lee stepped forward to take over for the platoon leader," Fox said. "He led that platoon in the attack to make a difference in my fight at the point that it had stalled.

"That was my reserve platoon, and I committed that. Lee Herron was killed."

The Vietnam Center has established a memorial scholarship fund in Herron's name.

After Vietnam, Col. Fox went on to become deputy commandant of cadets at Virginia Tech. Now retired, he travels frequently across the nation, speaking about Vietnam as well as about valor, commitment and the continued importance of the military in today's different times.

"The young ones in the war ... I guess that's what it takes," he says. "Somebody who is young enough and bullheaded enough to do the impossible."

U.S. Team Set To Discuss Vietnamese Textile Interests

A trio of American cotton marketing experts is scheduled for a spring visit to Vietnam to conduct seminars in Hanoi and Ho Chi Minh City on textile-related topics of interest to Vietnamese businessmen and officials.

Traveling to Vietnam for the two-week visit beginning in mid-March will be Dr. M. Dean Ethridge, director of Texas Tech University's International Textile Institute in Lubbock, Texas; Ms. Nishi Whitely, director of international marketing, Texas Department of Agriculture in Austin, Texas; and Gary W. Taylor, past president of the American Cotton Shippers Association, of Memphis, Tennessee. Accompanying the group will be Khanh Le, language specialist and instructor, from Texas Tech's Vietnam Center.

During their visit to Vietnam, members of the team will tour Vietnamese textile mills and make courtesy calls on government officials. Their seminars will cover

such topics as cotton fiber properties, how to buy American cotton, and other items of interest to the Vietnamese.

The trip is a follow-up event to a visit to Texas last November by nine representatives of Vietnam's textile and garment industry. They attended a week of educational sessions about Texas cotton, its uses and products, and latest cotton- and textile-related marketing techniques.

The "U.S. Cotton Fiber Properties and Export School" for the Vietnamese visitors last fall was conducted under auspices of Texas Tech, using a \$100,000 grant from the U.S. Department of Agriculture's "Emerging Markets Program." Under a recently ratified trade pact, Vietnam has agreed to open its market to industrial and agricultural goods from the United States. Over the next five years Vietnam anticipates investing \$785 million in garment and textile production.

Collection From Ex-Newsman Braestrup Reaches Archive

The Vietnam Archive has obtained a major new collection with the acquisition of newspaper clippings, correspondence, tape recordings and other materials surrounding the journalism career and scholarly work of the late Peter Braestrup.

Besides letters, clippings and tapes, the collection includes manuscripts, magazine articles, floppy disks, transcripts, lectures, radio-TV reports, and minutes of meetings involving the former Washington correspondent. They offer important reflections and insights into Mr. Braestrup's works, including his renowned examination of news coverage of the 1968 Tet offensive, a two-volume "Big Story" published in 1977.

A former Marine with service in the Korean War, Mr. Braestrup covered the Vietnam War for both the New York Times and the Washington Post. He left daily journalism in 1973 to work at the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars, and in 1989

moved on to the Library of Congress to serve as the Library's senior editor and director of communications.

Mr. Braestrup died of a heart attack while vacationing in Maine in 1997. That spring he had been keynote speaker of the Vietnam Center's annual conference in Lubbock, Texas. A press release issued by the Library of Congress upon his death saluted his "gruff amiability, quick wit and sharp editorial skills."

Praise as well as some criticism greeted publication of Mr. Braestrup's "Big Story: How the American Press and Television Reported and Interpreted the Crisis of Tet 1968 in Vietnam and Washington." Peter Arnett, for example, said Mr. Braestrup's generalizations about media misbehavior in covering Tet were not well supported by the details. Others praised "Big Story" as a landmark work. One reviewer called it "the first dispassionate analysis of the role of the U.S. press in the Vietnam War, and the most extensive study ever made of print and electronic news coverage of a major event."

The materials now in the Vietnam Archive also relate to Mr. Braestrup's "Vietnam as History," the court libel case brought against CBS by Gen. William C. Westmoreland, former commander of U.S. forces in Vietnam, and the invasion of Grenada. The collection, involving materials ranging from 1950 to 1988, includes battle lines by correspondents in the field covering D-Day, Korea, Vietnam, and Grenada. The material contains information as well about the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund and Memorial, and Sigma Delta Chi's award to Mr. Braestrup for his research about journalism and how it was used to cover the Vietnam War.

Educators from U.S. visit Vietnamese Community College

War Interviews: More and More Come Online

The Oral History Project of the Vietnam Archive has conducted interviews with nearly 300 persons who participated in the wars in Southeast Asia. Oral Historian Steve Maxner calls attention to the fact that transcripts may be read or streaming audio may be heard online for many of these interviews. The Vietnam Archive Oral History Project also is partnering with the US Marine Corps History and Museums Division to transcribe its more than 3,000 Vietnam-related interviews. These will then be available online in transcript and in streaming audio format through the Virtual Vietnam Archive.

The Oral History Project is continuing its community outreach project by providing another Oral History Workshop to a group of more than 50 Colorado City, Texas, middle school students. Colorado City has received a grant to interview veterans in that community. The Vietnam Archive's Oral Project, TexasTech University's sponsor of this effort, will be providing several hours of instruction on the conduct of oral history interviews.

Recent additions to the Vietnam Archive's Oral History Project Website include interviews with:

Ambassador Nguyen Xuan Phong (RVN) - Originally from the village of Bac Tri in southern Vietnam, Phong served in a variety of posts in the government of the Republic of Vietnam. Born in 1936, Phong was educated at the Lycee Chasseloup Laubat in Saigon, the Lycee Michelet in Paris, the University of London, and Oxford University. Upon graduation from Oxford in 1960, he returned to Saigon to work for Esso, an affiliate of Standard Oil New Jersey, as an executive in charge of industrial relations. He joined the South Vietnamese government in 1965, at age 29, as Minister of Labor (1965-66). He

subsequently served as Minister (Chief of Staff) at the Prime Minister's Office (1966), as Minister of Welfare (1966-68), and as the first Chieu Hoi Minister (1967-68). In 1968, he was named Deputy Leader of the RVN's delegation to the Paris Peace Talks. He later became Minister-of-State in Charge of Negotiations in Paris and Head of the RVN at the Conference between the two South Vietnamese Parties at Celle Saint Cloud. Phong returned to Saigon in April of 1975. After the fall of the RVN to the North Vietnamese, he was sent for "re-education" in May 1975. He spent nearly

five years in prison outside of Hanoi in Camp A15 before being released in January 1980. Afterwards, he worked in Ho Chi Minh City as a private businessman. Ambassador Phong is now Senior Research Associate at the Vietnam Center at Texas Tech.

Vang Bee - served in the Royal Laos Air Force as a T-28 pilot.

Michael Morris served with the United States Army in Vietnam from 1967 to 1968. He served as an infantryman, squad leader, and platoon sergeant with the 25th Infantry Division, 4th Infantry Division, and Task Force Oregon.

Al DeMailo served with the United States Army in Vietnam from April 1967 to April 1968 as a Huey gunship pilot with the 1st Cavalry Division. He returned to Vietnam in January 1970 where he again served with 1st Cavalry Division as a Cobra Gunship pilot. He participated in the Tet Offensive, Cambodian Incursion, and Lam Son 719 (the 1971 incursion into Laos).

Timothy C. Lockley, originally from Jackson, Mississippi, served in the U.S. Air Force from 1966 until 1973. He first went to Southeast Asia TDY in December 1966 where he was based out of Tan Son Nhut AB as a member of the maintenance team with the 773rd Tactical Airlift Squadron (TAS) until April 1967. He was among the first crews to participate in the dropping of "Daisy Cutter" ordnance. Tim went back to Southeast Asia TDY from 1968 to 1969 to Mactan and Clark AFB, The Philippines, as a member of the 763rd TAS ("The Green Weasels"). He was based out of Saigon and Cam Ranh Bay during this deployment while flying in South Vietnam. Tim was eventually promoted to Maintenance Supervisor and Crew Chief. In 1971, he was sent to Ching Chuan Kan AFB, Taiwan ("Peppergrinder") and flew missions in South Vietnam and Laos. In 1972, he spent time at Udorn RTAFB with the 7th Airborne Command and Control Squadron. Overall, Tim served 27 months of his seven-year enlistment in Southeast Asia.

Ben Van Etten served with the United States Army in Vietnam from 1965 to 1966. After returning to the US and working at Fort Wolters as a helicopter instructor pilot, he went to work for Air America in 1968. He served in Thailand and Laos from 1968 until 1972, flying the H-34.



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
